Clients Keep Fitness Trainer ‘on Her Toes’

While hopefuls pack the gym this winter determined to lose those stubborn holiday pounds, others, like lifelong fitness enthusiast Pat McConnell, will remain there long after the new year’s resolution crowd has fallen away.

That is because as a certified personal trainer, McConnell is committed to helping her clients at the Fitness Center stay motivated toward reaching their goals. Keeping her clients moving, McConnell says, helps her keep her own fitness goals on track, too.

“[My clients] are a challenge to me,” she says. “They keep me on my toes.”

During a late afternoon in December she heads to the Fitness Center’s doors to give a warm welcome to Greta, an 88 year old client she works with once a week. Greta seems to know the drill as she settles into one of the Center’s stationary bikes.

“You know I’m bad about slouching in a chair,” she cracks, and the two ride out this warm-up together as McConnell feeds her a healthy dose of smiles and encouragement.

McConnell is the only trainer at the Fitness Center who is also a Leisure World resident; many

may recognize her blonde pixie cut and high energy from the stage where she acts and sings as a member of the Fun and Fancy Theatre Group. She also recently founded a new Club at Leisure World for others who are interested in physical fitness and exercise.

As both a trainer and a resident, McConnell says she uniquely understands the challenges residents face when starting a fitness program and the importance of continuing healthy habits throughout life. She tailors her clients’ programs to meet their individual needs, paying particular attention to safety, balance issues and overall body strength for performing daily tasks.

McConnell and Greta continue their session in the Fitness Center’s studio room. Standing front to back for support, the two women stretch their arms from side to side in unison as McConnell checks on Greta’s form in the studio’s mirrored walls.

“Tall spine, taller confidence,” McConnell reminds her. The pair tackles exercises that

improve balance, stability and range of motion.

“There’s so much benefit to exercise, and it doesn’t mean you have to have a trainer,” McConnell says. “Just getting [to the Fitness Center] and getting some kind of physical activity is just so important for personal health.”

And the evidence bears this out. Physical activity helps people maintain the ability to live independently and reduces the risk of falling and fracturing bones, as well as lessens the risk of dying from several types of diseases, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

The session ends with Greta lying prone on a table as McConnell helps stretch her muscles. Greta reminds McConnell

to steer clear of the Life Alert hanging from her neck.

“You set that off and then three ambulance drivers will be here,” Greta jokes, and thinking better of it, she adds, “They better be tall, dark and handsome.”

Residents who want to start a fitness program they can maintain well into the new year may stop by the Fitness Center in Clubhouse II to speak with a trainer Monday through Friday from 7:30 a.m.-3:30 p.m. or Saturdays from 7:30-11:30 a.m.

The Fitness Center is open daily from 4 a.m.-9 p.m. For more information, visit (residents.lwmc.com) and click on “Fitness Center” under Amenities & Services.

Swimmers Must Show Pool Pass

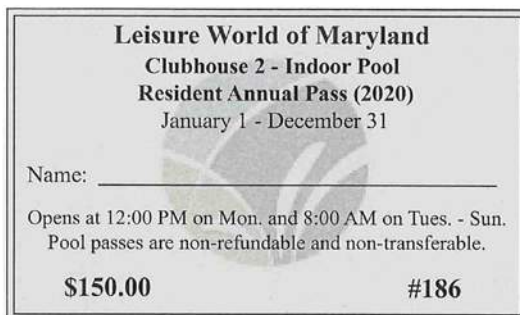

Residents are reminded that they must present their pool pass and Leisure World ID, sign in and shower before using the indoor pools in Clubhouse II.

Guests must be accompanied by a resident and must also show their pool pass.

Pool passes may be purchased for annual (\$150), monthly (\$40) or daily (\$3) pool usage. Daily guest passes are \$6 for adults and \$3 for children. Stop by the Clubhouse II E&R office to purchase passes.

Showering before entering the pools is required by Montgomery County regulations. Showers are available in the locker rooms located next to the indoor pools.

Pepco Upgrading Electrical Grid

Electric power company Pepco has begun upgrading Leisure World's electrical grid to modernize its equipment and improve its reliability.

Pepco is replacing underground cable and dozens of electrical transformers – some of which are nearly 60 years old – at locations along Leisure World Boulevard, a significant upgrade that will likely decrease the frequency and duration of any future power outages.

The project, which is expected to extend through the year, may affect traffic times and patterns in some areas of the community. More information will be provided as it becomes available. Check (residents.lwmc.com) and channel 972.

The U.S. Congress created the Veterans History Project in 2000 as part of the Library of Congress' American Folklife Center. The Center collects, preserves and makes accessible the personal, never-forgotten military experiences of American veterans of all ranks.

Initially sponsored by the Foundation of Leisure World, Leisure World's veterans are interviewed and videotaped as a legacy for family members and for future generations. Interviews are private, take about an hour and are videotaped in Clubhouse I. Participants receive their own personal CD of the interview and the Library of Congress receives a copy.

GOOD TO KNOW: KEEPING UP WITH THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS

Leisure World is a self-governed community, so several discussions and decisions occur at its monthly Leisure World Community Corporation (LWCC) board of directors meetings that residents may find informative.

Comprising residents who represent each of the 29 mutuals, the LWCC board of directors is a voting body that controls the community's annual budget, makes decisions regarding major contracts and projects and determines Trust policies, programs and services.

Each mutual sends at least one representative from its own board to sit on the LWCC board of directors. Board members volunteer their time and leadership to sustain the community.

Attend a Board Meeting

Every resident can stay abreast of the community's governance activities.

The LWCC board of directors meetings are open to all residents. The next meeting is scheduled for Tuesday, Jan. 28, at 9:30 a.m. in Clubhouse I.

Residents may attend to listen to the proceedings and have the opportunity to comment on agenda items upon which no action was taken, community policies, or the operations of the LWCC facilities, during the meeting's open forum section.

Residents may also comment on an agenda item before the board votes on it. Residents who can't attend may have their say by sending an email to (board@lwmc.com).

Correspondence between residents and the board is included in the agenda packet of

the following board of directors meeting.

Are Your Smoke and Carbon Monoxide Alarms Up-to-Date?

Both the state of Maryland and Montgomery County have recently updated the laws and requirements for residential smoke alarms. In addition, Montgomery County has a new law that became effective in July 2019, which requires carbon monoxide (CO) alarms in homes that have a fuel-burning appliance — fireplace or attached garage.

Since some Leisure World apartments have gas-burning furnaces, and many single-family homes have attached garages — and may have fireplaces — this law affects many residents.

CO is produced any time a fuel is burned; it is an odorless, tasteless gas that is especially dangerous because often people don't know it's present until it's too late. CO poisoning is a leading cause of accidental poisoning deaths in America, killing more than 400 people in the U.S. every year, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

CO and Smoke Alarms

People need both smoke alarms and CO alarms to

protect their safety. For years, smoke alarms and CO alarms were separate units; but recently alarms have been manufactured with the technology to detect both smoke and CO.

These combination alarms must be installed near the ceiling to detect smoke which rises (although CO mixes with air and can be detected at any level). Also, a CO alarm has different beep patterns to communicate whether there is an emergency or simply a maintenance issue, so it is important to know the difference between the different beep patterns.

In addition to the combination alarms, there are a wide variety of separate CO alarms on the market, including battery-powered, plug-in and hard-wired units that meet the requirements of Montgomery County's new law.

Regulations and Installation

No smoke alarm — either battery or AC powered/hard-wired — may be older than 10 years from the date of manufacture. For properties built from July 1990 until the present, smoke alarms must be AC powered with battery

backup and interconnected to alarm simultaneously. One alarm must be located outside each sleeping area. For homes built or renovated after July 1997, one smoke alarm must also be installed inside each sleeping room.

Since AC powered/hard-wired smoke alarms and combination CO/smoke alarms must be installed by electricians, residents may call the Physical Properties Department (PPD) at (301-598-1500) for installation. Approximate costs for PPD

installation of interconnected smoke alarms are \$35 per alarm, plus \$47 for labor. Installation of combination CO/smoke alarms is \$54 for each alarm, plus labor.

Montgomery County Fire and Rescue Services recommends that residents check their smoke alarms and CO alarms once a month to be sure the batteries are still active.

The van will be located in the Clubhouse II parking lot, where the hours of operation are 10 a.m.-2 p.m. Residents are encouraged to arrive early as wait times may be long.

Services offered include renewal of non-commercial driver's licenses, Maryland photo identification cards and vehicle registration. You also can obtain a duplicate driver's license, a certified copy of a driving record, disability placards, substitute stickers, return tags and duplicate registrations, as well as apply for a change of address.

If you need to register to vote and/or want to register as an organ donor, you can do that at the mobile office, too.

BROKEN WINDOW

Who bears responsibility for Leisure World golf course mishaps and Leisure World resident golfers who break windows?

Out of sheer frustration, I am respectfully writing Leisure World News in the hope that I will be heard, and not alone, in being told I am the one responsible for the broken window that was the fault of the owner of a golf ball with initials printed on it.

On Oct. 24, 2019, I pulled up the blinds in my guest room to find a window broken, a hole and multiple cracks. Outside, under the window, was a Titleist golf ball with initials.

I called the Golf Pro Shop. The person who answered said it was not their problem. The person would not give me his or her name, saying, "It's no big deal!" and hung up.

I then asked advice of my neighbor who advised me to contact our mutual assistant. I walked over to my assistant who drove to my home and took pictures of the window and golf ball. The mutual assistant left, saying [he or she] would report it and get back to me.

After two weeks, I called the Main Office to get the

mutual assistant's email address. But, very soon, I was told to contact someone in the general manager's office. This person eventually got back to me, politely saying there was nothing Leisure World was willing to do and I could call my homeowner's insurance.

I went further and asked Golf Course senior staff to please get the name of the owner of the Titleist golf ball with initials. This effort, too, was futile.

Cost of the window repair is \$175. My homeowner's policy has a \$500 deductible and I am told that not one responsible entity in Leisure World is willing to even consider reimbursing my outlay of \$175 for the broken window.

Why is this?

I accept that we Leisure World shareholders pay for the pleasure of Golf Course amenities, whether we play golf or not.

I do not accept complete lack of accountability and how entirely disappointed I am with the Leisure World of Maryland Corporation's and Golf Course's completely dismissing fiduciary responsibility (indeed sportsmanship) in their handling of this incident.

Greetings and Customs

During the new year, friends and relatives exchange greetings and blessings when they run into each other. One common greeting is "新年快乐" (Happy New Year). It is pronounced as "xin nian Kuai le" in Mandarin, and pronounced as "san nin fai lok" in Cantonese.

A common blessing is "恭喜发财" (wishing you wealth and prosperity), pronounced as "gung hei fat choi" in Cantonese and "gong xi fa cai" in Mandarin. When someone says this blessing, he or she usually wraps one hand over the other in a fist and holds it up to show sincerity and respect. No matter what Chinese dialect a person uses, the Chinese understand and appreciate these well wishes.

notion wrong. He bought a house in a black neighborhood with three and one half acres and began fashioning a garden

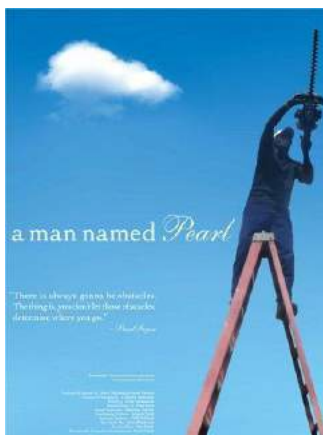
that would attract positive attention. His goal was to become the first African-American to win the Bishopville Yard of the Month award sponsored by the local garden club.

Fryar began cutting every bush and tree in his yard into unusual, abstract shapes. He didn't realize it at the time but he

had started one of the most beautiful topiary gardens in the U.S. that would eventually draw thousands of visitors to Bishopville.

"A Man Named Pearl" is a subtle and intriguing film that opens the heart and mind. It offers an upbeat message that speaks to respect for both self and others, and shows what one person can achieve when he allows himself to share the full expression of his humanity.

The FISH office in Clubhouse II houses lost and found items in its closet, but volunteers will soon empty a lot of the closet's contents.

The closet is very full and contains many hats, water bottles, gloves, a few jackets and sweaters. Stop by the office and look around – even if you don't recall losing an item!

Volunteers will not give away jewelry (mostly orphan earrings), phones, watches or a number of older books.

Residents who've lost something should check with the FISH office by calling (301-598-1345) or stopping by in person. It can take a couple of days for an item to get to Clubhouse II, so if your first inquiry doesn't recover your item, check back in a few days.

If you call and no one is in the office, call the Clubhouse II E&R office at (301-598-1320). An E&R staff member can assist you.

Also, some mutuals may have their own lost and found. Residents may want to check there too, especially if an item was lost near that location.

Consider placing an address sticker on items such as canes and umbrellas. If the item is lost, it will be easier for FISH to find its owner.

More About FISH

FISH volunteers are in the office Monday through Friday from 10 a.m.-4 p.m., except for major holidays. FISH also closes if Montgomery County Public Schools are cancelled. If schools are delayed, the FISH office's 10 a.m.-1 p.m. session is cancelled.

FISH accepts donations of assistive equipment, which are then available to lend to residents and employees of Leisure World. Volunteers do their best to check the equipment for safety. The office has wheelchairs, commodes, walkers and shower chairs, and residents may borrow any item for free – a great way to test out a product before spending money on it!

Giveaway Items

FISH still accepts donations of canes, easy reachers and elevated toilet seats, but simply gives them away. FISH also receives some medical items, blood pressure stuff, diabetic items and incontinence products. All of these are kept in the front of the office. The giveaway items are not limited to Leisure World residents.

Registrants must read Ta-Nehisi Coates' 2014 essay, "The Case for Repa-

rations," before coming to the seminar, and bring a copy of it with them to the seminar. The essay is available online at (<https://www.theatlantic.com/magazine/archive/2014/06/the-case-for-reparations/361631/>) as well as a chapter in Coates' book, "We Were Eight Years in Power."

The prerequisite assures a common point from which participants may begin the discussion on reparations. Coates' essay revived interest in the topic and was much debated by advocates and critics.

The question of reparations has been around for a while. In 1989, Rep. John Conyers introduced a bill to establish a commission to study the question and reintroduced that bill, HR40, every year thereafter until he retired in 2017.

Since then, Rep. Sheila Jackson-Lee has introduced that same bill in successive sessions of Congress. In 2019, she was joined by Sen. Cory Booker, who introduced the same bill in the Senate (S. 1083). HR40 was never successful until 2019 when it did get a hearing in Congress. However, no action followed in the House

and action in the Senate is unlikely.

Levy is a popular instructor for CLL. He holds three degrees from the University of Massachusetts at Amherst and has spent 41 years in education as a teacher and school administrator in public and independent schools at the secondary and college levels.

His undergraduate degree is in political science, a topic that has remained his principal focus throughout his teaching career.

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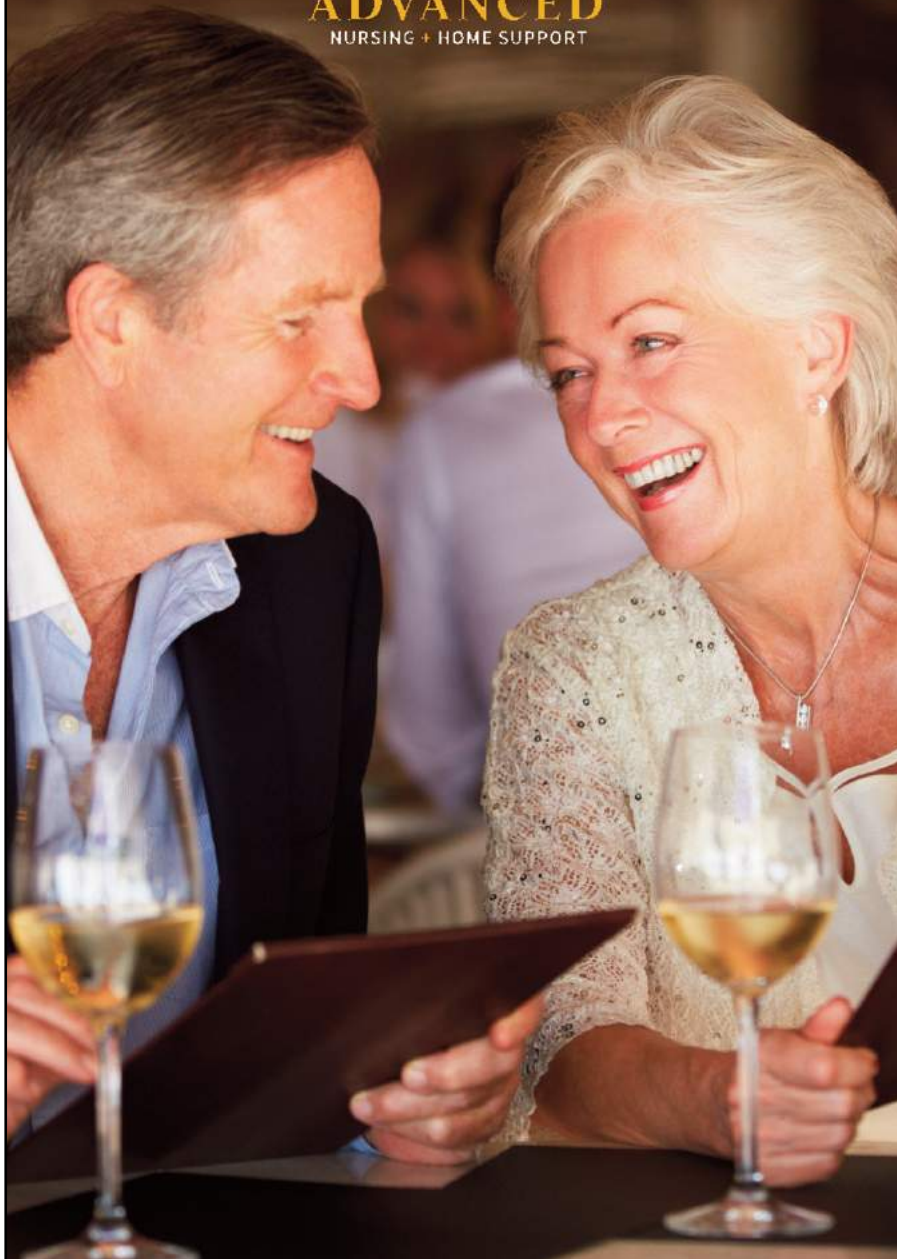
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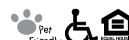

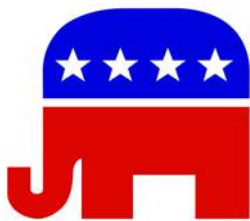

In the scientific community, these coincidences are called synchronicities. The Oxford American College Dictionary describes a synchronicity as the simultaneous occurrence of events which appear significantly related but have no discernible causal connection.

Synchronicities often make for humorous anecdotes, but they also have the power to transform lives. Their messages push, prod, heal and even test us. In many

cases, they completely upend our view of reality and our relation to it.

Happiness has even been linked to a longer lifespan as well as a higher quality of life, according to a study from Duke Medical School.

Attaining happiness is a global pursuit. Researchers find that people from every corner of the world rate happiness as more important than other desirable personal outcomes, such as obtaining wealth, acquiring material goods and getting into heaven, according

to Psychology Today.

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iPhone Tips for Quicker Access

LW Apple Club’s Tuesday, Jan. 28, program is “Fun with your Mac.” Jerry Berman will explain and demonstrate three things already on your Mac that he uses to just have fun:

- music visualizer to create mesmerizing images as you listen to music
- fonts and how to get more for free
- greeting cards

The program is at 10 a.m. in Clubhouse II. Berman plans on providing notes on his presentation.



iPhone (and newer iPad) Tips

For quick access to favorite features such as flash lite, camera, magnifier and more, swiping down top right reveals the Control Center where one tap opens an app. But there may be items there you’ll never use, and things you use a lot that are not there.

To customize, go to Settings > Control Center > Customize Controls. The user will see at the top a list of “Include” items (dash in a red circle) showing what’s in the Control Center. Farther down are “More Controls” (plus sign in a green circle) indicating those that are not in your control center. To add/remove an item, tap the red/green circle. Checking

out this list reminds the iPhone user of all the things the iPhone can do.

Widgets

An iPhone gathers all types of information (weather, upcoming calendar events, news, etc.) and presents it to the user in “widgets.” From the home screen, swipe to the right, and then scroll

to the very bottom and tap the small Edit button to bring up a list of widgets that the user can add and remove just like in the Control Center.

Bored with your screen’s look? Try Dark Mode. It’s found in

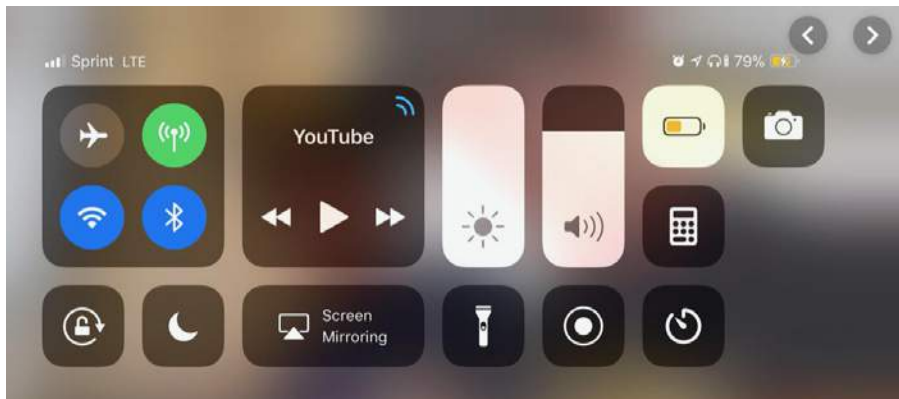
Settings > Display & Brightness, and then click on Light or Dark. Try experimenting with other options on that page. An explanation of each function is given.

Emergencies

Experiencing an emergency? Users who have Hey Siri set up can just say, “Hey Siri, call 911.”

Users can also go to Settings > Emergency SOS and follow the directions. (Different iPhone models may have differing procedures.)

What if help arrives and you are unable to provide your health history? Users can set up their iPhones to provide that information by selecting Settings > Health

and then completing the health profile and medical ID information, which includes prescriptions, allergies, drug reactions, medical conditions, blood type, etc. This information is available even when the iPhone is locked.

Disturbed by your iPhone at inconvenient or unsafe times? Select Settings > Do Not Disturb, and the user has many options: silence calls and notifications between selected times; allow calls only from certain people, etc. Here the user can also set up auto reply, or a setting for emergencies that allows a second call from the same number within three minutes to get through.

Also, if receiving a message with the word “Urgent” it will be delivered immediately. Perhaps the most important option is “Do Not Disturb While Driving.”

Don’t want to disturb others with the clicking of your typing keys? Go to Settings > Sounds & Haptics, scroll way down to

Keyboard Clicks and turn it off (not green).

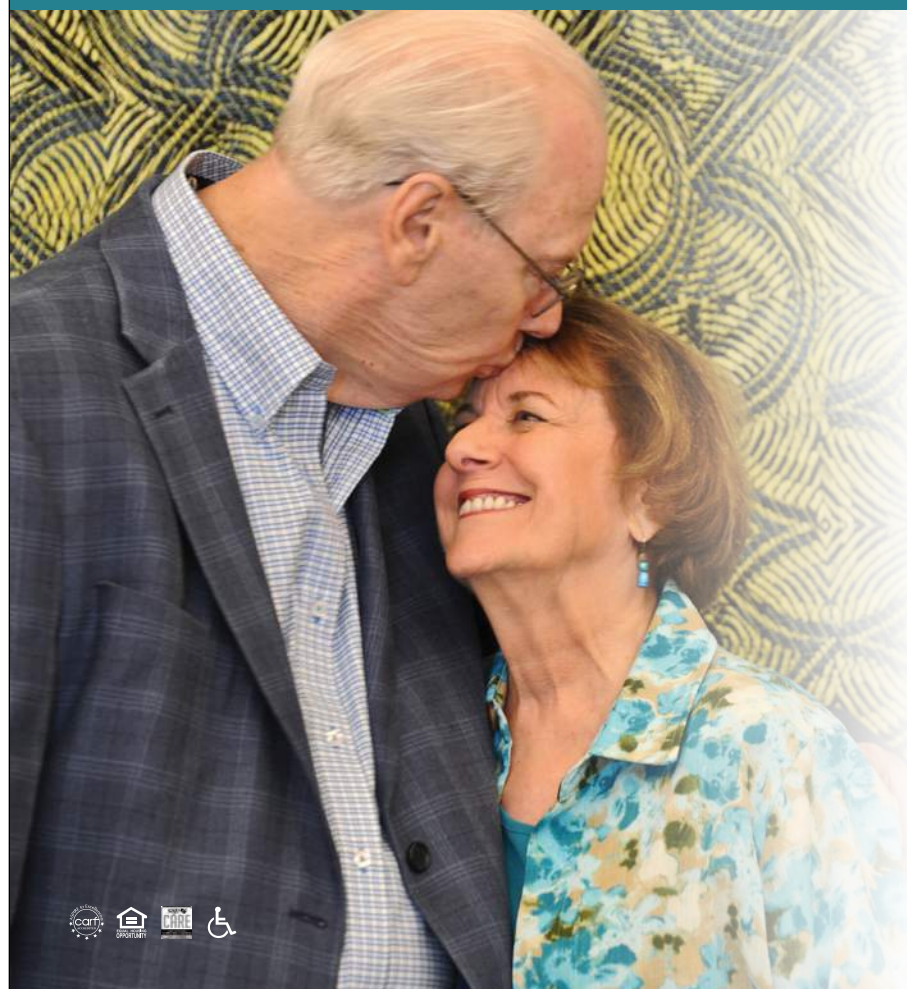

Chess Without the Panama Canal

The Panama Canal is drying up. How is that possible? Doesn't the canal connect the Atlantic and Pacific Oceans? Shouldn't the water flow straight across?

When the French started construction in 1881, they planned to build a sea level canal, like the Suez, which they had completed in 1869. Unfortunately, the land in Panama is not flat, but mountainous and hilly. Frustrated, the French ceased production in 1889 after spending \$260 million and experiencing 22,000 worker deaths, mostly due to malaria and yellow fever.

When the Americans took over in 1904, they built an artificial lake (Lake Gatun), that feeds the canal. The lake, 85 feet above sea level, stores water for operation of the canal locks, especially during the dry season. They built locks that operate like a staircase, lifting and lowering vessels as they cross.

Each ship passing through the locks releases 53.4 million gallons of water, which passes into the sea. With 35-40

vessels crossing per day (14,000 per year), the lake is losing large amounts of water that is not being replaced during the rainy season. Thus, the lake is drying up.

The lake also supplies drinking water for Panama City and Colón. The canal authority has imposed limitations on the weight of cargo carried on ships that transit the canal.

During the American period, workers moved millions of tons of earth and rubble (about 200 million cubic yards), "enough to bury Manhattan to a depth of 12 feet," according to the American Society of Civil Engineers.

At peak production, 40,000 lived at the site in drab barracks built by the French, and worked under harsh conditions. About 5,600 died.

Completed in 1914, the canal cost the U.S. \$375 million, including payment of \$10 million to Panama for rights and \$40 million to the French for rights, property and equipment. The U.S. also paid an annual leasing fee of \$250,000 for use of the canal.

Ships can move between the

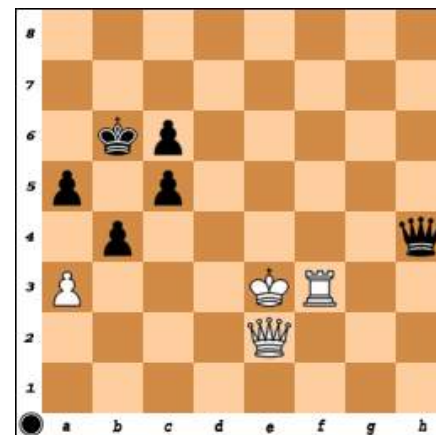
Atlantic and Pacific Oceans in eight-10 hours, rather than in two weeks going around South America, an 8,000-mile voyage. During the Gold Rush in 1848, travelers from the east spent five months crossing the isthmus to board a ship for California on the Pacific coast.

Panama earns \$2 billion annually from tolls based on weight, averaging about \$150,000 per voyage. The largest ships pay more than \$1 million to cross the expanded canal. Users must pay in cash at least 48 hours in advance.

Richard Halliburton, a swimmer, paid the lowest toll in 1928, 36 cents. He weighed 150 pounds. His swim time was 50 hours during a 10-day stay. The Canal Authority no longer allows people to swim the canal. They can swim in Lake Gatun. Fish enter and swim the canal freely, though.

Based on a 1977 treaty, the U.S. turned over operation of the canal to Panama in 1999. Negotiating the implementation process took more than 20 years – longer than it took the Americans to construct the canal (about 10 years).

Chess players at Leisure World are aware of the canal,



but have no need to use it. They play at the clubhouse in pleasant, temperature-controlled surroundings, without any need for long-distance travel.

In the game pictured on this page, it is Black's turn to move. What is Black's best move?

SOLUTION: Black moves the Queen to d4. Checkmate!

So, do not wait for the rainy season. Do not wait for permission to swim the canal. Do not wait for lower tolls. Play chess now!
