Mind the Generation Gap

Novelist's First Book Explores Aging and Society

Rejection slips once piled up for Verna Denny, resident and member of the Writers of Leisure World — which makes it all the more impressive that she recently checked off "become published author" from her bucket list.

Denny's self-published first novel, a psychological thriller titled "Shadow of Youth," examines the oftenfraught relationship between older Americans and their Millennial children and grandchildren.

The novel's protagonist, Sunny, and her friends are 'living it up' in the Leisure

World-esque 55+ community of Regal Crest, or so it seems to a cadre of Millennials who feel embittered by a lack of available resources. To bridge this divide between the generations, Sunny must face her personal demons, including the challenges of aging as a woman.

The book is partly an ode to her experiences at Leisure World and partly a commentary on the wider social fabric that, at times, seems to be unraveling.

"Are our grandchildren and future generations going to be taken care of and have what they need to be able to live their life comfortably

Recommending Support for Maryland Legislative Bills by Stacy Smith, Leisure World News and safety of residents and

Board Approves

¬he Leisure World Community Corporation (LWCC) board of directors at its regular meeting Jan. 29 handily approved the Government Affairs Advisory Committee's recommendation to support four of the Maryland General Assembly's proposed bills.

The outcomes of Senate bill 46, House bill 27, House bill 207 and House bill 250 could impact directly on the lives of residents, said LWCC board member and Government **Affairs Advisory Committee** chair Ken Muir.

The board postponed a vote on whether to support a fifth bill – Senate bill 189 – "which would add language to the Homeowner's Act to permit members to elect a governing board under certain circumstances," Muir said.

Mold Remediation

The board authorized the **Budget and Finance Advisory** Committee's recommendation to approve \$65,000 for mold remediation in the Administration Building, with monies to come from the Contingency Fund.

Remediation has already begun in several sections of the Building for the health

employees.

The Building's design and age contribute to the mold issue, with water seeping into the ductwork and then requiring manual drainage, said general manager Kevin Flannery.

Approximately \$44,000 has been expended on remediation thus far, and another \$20,000 is expected to be expended on work that has yet to be completed, according to LWCC board and Budget and Finance **Advisory Committee member** Phil Marks.

Other Actions

The board approved recommended modifications to the Budget and Finance Advisory Committee's charter. The charter adds "review and update cash management policies" to its areas of responsibilities.

The board also approved the Leisure World of Maryland Corporation's organizational chart as recommended by management. The IT department now reports directly to Crystal Castillo, assistant general manager of support services, and the appliance maintenance and HVAC services of the Physical Properties Division have been consolidated.

Postponed Actions

Expressing dissatisfaction with their lack of clarity and presentation, the board post-poned taking action on two resolutions.

The recommendation that was made by the LWCC executive committee to approve amending Board Standing Rule 1.3 is postponed and will be returned to the executive committee for their review. The amended Rule as presented would give the board chair the discretion to include action items in the board's meeting agenda packet, or may be directly presented to the board in accordance with Board Standing Rule 2.2.

A resolution to approve recommended changes to the Golf and Greens Advisory Committee's charter was also postponed, and will be returned to the Committee for its review. Several board members expressed concern about new language in the charter stipulating that "unit owners" qualify for membership, which would ostensibly allow people who are not 55 or older to join the Committee, and would preclude renters from joining.

Strategic Plan

Special Strategic Planning Committee chair Dr. Arthur Popper presented an update on the strategic planning process, reporting the Committee's intention for Leisure World to sign an 18-month contract with consultants from George Mason University.

The first step in the plan is to distribute a resident survey, "which is really the heart of the whole process," Popper said. The survey will gather data about residents for the purpose of developing and implementing a strategic plan for Leisure World.

The survey is estimated to be ready and distributed to all residents by spring 2019.

Board Training

Long-standing board member Linda Wacha expressed her intention to develop and implement a new board member orientation program.

"New board members come to this table and they don't know what their function is or what their roles and responsibilities are," Wacha said.

Wacha plans to solicit current board members for their input on the orientation program's content.

The board voted to go into a closed session at the end of the regular meeting to discuss legal matters.

The next meeting of the LWCC board is Tuesday, Feb. 26, at 9:30 a.m. in Clubhouse I. LWCC board meetings are open to all residents unless legally closed.

and fully," she wonders. Her novel touches on this timely question.

Writer's Group

An English major and

lifelong writer, Denny made a New Year's resolution last year to publish a book by year's end. "I had done most of the writing about three or four years ago, and it had been sitting in a drawer," she says.

Denny pulled out her pages and started


sharing parts of them with her cohorts at the Writers of Leisure World, the community's group for writers.

"We're not a traditional writer's group in the sense of people who do fine line edits and discussions," she says.

But as luck would have it, as she was writing the novel, the group created a smaller sub-group for people interested in novel writing. Most of the sub-group's members had either completed manuscripts or had been published before, and were

comfortable with critiquing each other's work, she says.

"Having that commitment in my mind to go to the group kind of forced me to do another chapter, or to have something fresh to bring to the meeting," she says.

Publishing

Self-publishing her first book involved making a lot of decisions on her own, and has taught her a lot as well, notably the indispensability of a good proofreader.

"I proofed it; my sister proofed it; my husband proofed it;

and then I sent it out to a proofreader, and he came back with 25 pages of corrections," she says, with a laugh.

Denny then sent the book out to a group of people she refers to as "my readers," who read the edited draft and provided their input. "People who've read it have described it as a pageturner," she says.

GOOD TO KNOW: RIGHT-OF-WAY AT FOUR-WAY STOP SIGNS

Some intersections in and near Leisure World are marked with four-way stop signs. According to Federal Highway Administration guidelines, multiway stops may be considered for installation where the amount of traffic on all intersecting streets is similar.

It is important that drivers pay attention to these signs and heed the rules to avoid collisions.

Remember that under Maryland law, drivers should yield the right-of-way to the driver who is at or arrives before them at an intersection.

If multiple vehicles arrive at the intersection at the same time, the driver on the right has the right-of-way.

Still, the Maryland Driver's Manual reminds motorists not to go forth unquestioningly when the rules grant them right-of-way. Drivers should be observant of the situation at hand and proceed safely.

Search to Find Bulk Internet and TV Provider Narrows to Three Contenders

Lisure World's search to find a bulk TV and internet provider to replace the current contract when it expires in July 2020 narrowed in late January to three contenders – Comcast, Verizon and Hotwire.

Pending the three providers' responses to a final round of questions, a finalist will be independently recommended by telecommunications consultant CTC and an internal review team comprising four members of the Technology Advisory Committee (TECH) — George Moy, Phil Marks, Janina Sajka and Dr. Jim Leong — based on price and sustainability/experience considerations.

The contract's parameters will be considered in a closed work session of the Leisure World Community Corporation (LWCC) board on Friday, Feb. 15, and the board is expected to take action on a recommended finalist at its regular meeting on Tuesday, Feb. 26.

Leong and LWCC board chair Paul Eisenhaur will provide an overview of the contract and decision-making process and answer residents' questions during a forum open to all residents on Sunday, Feb. 10, from 4-6 p.m. in the Clubhouse I Crystal Ballroom.

Selection Process

TECH considered three primary factors – price, performance and problem resolution – during its selection process.

Price is strongly affected by

the amount of optical fiber used by a given provider. Fiber cables are substantially more expensive than copper coaxial cables. Hence, Comcast, which uses a hybrid fiber coax (HFC) approach, can be expected to be able to provide basic internet service at lower cost than the all-fiber providers Verizon and Hotwire.

In turn, Verizon and Hotwire could use more (or less) fiber depending on whether a single strand of fiber needs to be shared by up to 16 (or 32) neighboring residents.

Performance is enhanced when more fiber is used. Thus, all-fiber providers Verizon and Hotwire can be expected to offer higher internet download and upload performance ("speed") than HFC provider Comcast, but at generally higher prices.

So how much speed would an average resident need? Most residents likely would not require extremely high upload speeds according to TECH, with a few possible high-end user exceptions, such as a semi-retired physician residing in Leisure World needing to upload high resolution X-ray images from a home office.

Problem resolution for technical and billing issues is a critical selection criterion, particularly given some of the complaints received during the last several years. One possible solution is for the selected provider to have an on-site representative. However, a heavy investment in on-site representation could also unduly drive up the monthly price for basic services.



Background

TECH has worked to find a new bulk cable TV and internet provider since May 2017, when the LWCC board approved a resolution directing TECH and management "to develop parameters for a new Broadband Communications Services contract." A "bulk" agreement is one in which all residents must pay for a defined set of services, whether or not a given resident chooses to use such services, according to TECH.

The contract competition began on June 29, 2018, when LWMC issued a broadband services Request for Information (RFI) to 89 companies. Nine firms – Comcast, Verizon, Hotwire, RCN, Kent FIBER Optic Systems, Yomura Fiber, Fujitsu Network Communications, GigabitNow and Allo Communications – responded with expressions of interest.

Five firms – Comcast,

Verizon, Hotwire, RCN and Kent FIBER Optic Systems – subsequently submitted formal bids to provide bulk TV and internet services to Leisure World. The five firms also submitted detailed technical questions, which Leisure World answered via a combined effort by TECH and CTC.

The five contenders then submitted comprehensive proposals outlining how each intended to meet Leisure World's needs for bulk cable and internet services. Operating independently, both CTC and TECH came up with identical 1-5 rankings of the contenders.

TECH members, although not as well versed in telecommunications contract negotiations as CTC, did have additional background information from TECH-hosted forums with four of the five firms, prior to the RFI process.

FISH is a volunteer organization that lends donated, assistive equipment, such as wheelchairs, walkers, commodes and tub stools, to residents and employees of Leisure World.

Italian Renaissance-Style Ceramics Exhibited in Clubhouse II Display Case

Carma Fauntleroy. Her Italian
Renaissance-style work is

Fauntleroy has painted ceramics since 2001 under the tutelage of Roberto Paolinelli at Casa Italian artistic ceramics, named after the historic village of Castelli in the Abruzzo region, an internationally renowned art center known for its handpainted ceramics since the Renaissance.

Featuring naturalistic depictions of historic and religious scenes, this decorative style of low-fire earthenware (or majolica), Castelli ware was especially prized in 17th and 18th century Europe. Its characteristic tonalities derive from a palette limited to seven transparent underglaze colors.

About the Ceramicist

With an abiding interest in historical ceramic techniques, Fauntleroy has studied the Deruta style with Nicoletta Malovolti in Florence, Italy, Hispano-Moreque tiles and raku with Esperanza Romero in Granada, Spain, and the Native American Pueblo pottery of Arizona.

After more than 25 years' experience as a museum director and fundraiser, Fauntleroy opened her painting studio in 2010. She has served in positions at the Queens Museum of Art, Textile Museum, Jane Voorhees Zimmerli Art Museum at Rutgers University, Louisiana State Museum, National Trust for Historic Preservation and Sweet Briar College Art Galleries.

She is adjunct lecturer in the Georgetown University Art and Museum Studies Program. She holds a master's in art history from George Washington University, a master's in business administration in international business from Rutgers University and a bachelor's in history from the College of William and Mary.

Fauntleroy joined the Ceramics Club in 2010 and her work has never ceased to amaze Club members. The Club invites all residents to come and view the colorful and beautiful work of this very talented ceramicist in the display case in Clubhouse II.

Feb. 17: Learn About Early American Photographer Mathew Brady

The Club's next meeting on Sunday, Feb. 17, features Club member Stewart Lillard, who will discuss his discovery of Mathew Brady, one of the earliest American photographers. The meeting is at 3:30 p.m. in Clubhouse II and all residents are welcome.

His program is an introduction to photography in America, with illustrations from glass plates and daguerreotypes, sun printing and photographs of the Mexican-American War, the Crimean War and the American Civil War.

Lillard will "visit" several of the sites related to Brady's career, which include New York City and Pennsylvania Avenue in Washington, D.C., where Brady had a shop.

Brady knew most of the famous personalities of these two cities and encouraged them to sit for photographs. Famous individuals needed "carte de visites," or visiting cards featuring their photograph, to spread their notoriety in the 19th century, just as people of renown today need their faces on magazine covers or appearances on television and social media.

About the Presenter

Lillard is a retired academic librarian and has published a Tennessee county history, edited and published a War with Mexico diary, and contributed a sketch of President Andrew Johnson and the Return J. Meigs Family of DC.



While a volunteer at the National Archives in Washington, D.C., he researched, wrote and published a history of early days in Bladensburg, Maryland, and a diplomatic history of the Russian ministers in Washington, D.C.

Feb. 28: 'Great Decisions in Foreign Policy' – Living in Chaotic Times

G reat Decisions in Foreign Policy" led by David Frager, one of the most popular ongoing courses offered by CLL, returns with new discussion topics on Thursday, Feb. 28.

This year's course takes a look at the disruptions occurring in foreign policy throughout the world caused by, and impacting on, allies and competitors alike. The daily news may give impetus to residents who want to discuss what is happening and where the nation is going.

The class will analyze and discuss the state of foreign policy relationships and the impact on Americans. To give substance to the discussions, participant fees include a text developed by the Foreign Policy Association (FPA). Each class covers a different but interrelated topic, using timely and vivid videos provided by the FPA.

Frager presents original

material in addition to that provided in the text, and guides conversations that give every participant an opportunity to express and defend their personal analysis and opinions. The class will address challenges arising from the policies being implemented by the Trump administration.

Media, including newspapers, provides the class with background for discussions. Topics include nationalism, immigration, changes in the role of the U.S. as a superpower in competition with China and Russia and the impact of international trade and tariffs on the welfare of Americans.

The class will investigate the ability of Americans to compete in a world where cyber warfare

and nuclear weapons threaten their way of life and the safety of their families.

About the Instructor

Frager has conducted "Great Decisions" courses at Leisure World since 2010. He is a retired federal program manager and Army

Signal Corps officer. Frager also served as a professor at the National Defense University in Washington, D.C., for three years.

He is a Phi Beta Kappa Honors graduate of the University of California, Los Angeles and earned a master's degree in administration from Johns Hopkins University.

Originally planning an academic career teaching history and foreign relations, he has maintained his interest in the political environment over the years. He also serves the public as a docent at the Smithsonian's National Museum of American History.

Past attendees have expressed their appreciation for his presentation of issues and information and the respectful manner that he and classmates treat all comments. Participants are often impressed by each other's background and ability to add insight to class discussion based on their career and travel experiences.



The Center for Lifelong Learning (CLL) hosts Ieva Notturno and Jeff Prudhomme, fellows at the Interactivity Foundation (IF), to conduct a class on the topic of "Shaping Our Towns and Cities – a Roundtable Discussion."

The class meets twice – Monday, March 4 and 18 – at 1 p.m. in Clubhouse I.

The discussion will address what attracts people to certain towns or neighborhoods and why communities are designed the way they are, explore the forces and decisions that shape communities and consider whether these could be altered or redirected.

the family. He maintains a wide range of public policy interests, believing that citizens in a democracy have a responsibility to think broadly about emerging public matters.

Ieva Notturno is also a fellow at the IF, where she is currently directing a project on "Creativity and Innovation."

She has previously worked on IF's projects on "The U.S. National Security and Defense Policy," "Human Migration," and "Democratic Nation Building," and in three training courses designed to teach university faculty from Eastern Europe and Asia how to conduct student-centered discussion courses based on IF's democratic discussion process.

Hamilton formed the Tuesday Club, a social club for prominent men in Annapolis, and contributed many articles to local publications.


He was known for his insight and his humor. He successfully ran for a seat in the Maryland Assembly.

The dumpsters located near Clubhouse I and II are designated for clubhouse trash disposal; they are not for individuals' trash or other discarded or unwanted items, such as furniture or household items.

Battles On and Off the Chessboard

Why has Hollywood not made a movie about the French and Indian War?

Although Hollywood has made movies about life in the colonies in the 1750s (e.g., "The Last of the Mohicans"), it has not focused on the key battle, which took place at the Plains of Abraham, the turning point of the war.

The so-called French and Indian War started in 1754 when the French claimed ownership of the upper Ohio River Valley, thus denying British colonists from Virginia and Pennsylvania the opportunity to trade and settle there.

The War was the North American conflict in a broader, imperial war known as the Seven Years' War (1756-1763). It marked the end of a century-long struggle between France and Great Britain for dominance in North America and supremacy in the world.


In his "A History of the English-

Speaking Peoples," Winston Churchill called the Seven Years' War "the first world war." Fighting did take place in several parts of the world, but mostly within Europe, where armies of tens of thousands entered into battles.

The Treaty of Paris of 1763 ended the French and Indian War and the Seven Years' War. It was a victory for the British, as France gave up all its territories in mainland North America. As stated by the U.S. State Department's Office of the Historian, this "effectively [ended] any foreign military threat to the British colonies there."

In any event, Hollywood has neglected a most colorful and important battle, which took place at the Plains of Abraham near Quebec. Here is the scene:

On a September night in 1763, General James Wolfe and 4,500 British troops arrive in small boats at a landing near Quebec City. They must climb a steep 53-meter cliff to engage the French. Imagine the spectacle as thousands of



troops clad in red uniforms with rifles scale the cliff to reach the Plains of Abraham (owned by a farmer named Martin Abraham).

When the French troops arrive, dressed in gray and white uniforms and led by Marquis de Montcalm, they are about equal in numbers to the British troops. Thus, 9,000 troops engage in battle. Weapons drawn, the French march to within 120 meters of the British and start firing.

The British wait until the French are closer before they open fire. During the battle, both leaders are mortally wounded. Wolfe dies on the battlefield. Montcalm dies of his wounds the next day.

Each side suffers casualties of about 650 men dead or wounded, according to military historian Stuart Reid in his 2003 book, "The Battle That Won Canada." The French retreat. Quebec City is evacuated. The British occupy Quebec and win the war. (Hurray for Hollywood!)

Chess players at Leisure World do not experience such adventures. Their battles are limited to action on the chessboards. At least they do not need to climb cliffs or face gunfire to win their battles.

In the game pictured on this page, it is Black's turn to move. Black can mate in two. Do you see it?

The solution to the puzzle follows this message that the Chess Club meets on Monday, Wednesday and Friday at 1-4 p.m. in Clubhouse II. For information, call Bernie Ascher at (301-598-8577).

SOLUTION: Black moves the King to f7. White's only move is to advance the Pawn to c8, promoting it to a Queen. On the next move, however, Black moves its Queen to e7. Checkmate!

So, do not wait for more troops in red uniforms. Do not wait for evacuation of Quebec. Do not wait for a war-ending treaty. Play chess now!

A thank you goes to Jim Cowie, who spotted a third checkmate move in last issue's puzzle: Qg7.




