Dedicated Neighbors Deliver the News

In another age, George Stephens was a paperboy.

A child of 10, he made money delivering newspapers to Washington, D.C., homes — four different publications. He's not sure anyone else even remembers one of those papers, The Shopping News, anymore.

Decades later, after a more gratifying career, he jokes, "I'm a paperboy. 84 years old, I'm a boy."

Back then, taking the paper around was a chore for him, especially on Sundays, but now, as a volunteer dropping off the Leisure World News in his part of Montgomery Mutual, he finds it pleasant.

While residents elsewhere in the community pick up their newspapers in their apartment lobby or mailbox, those living in Leisure World's houses have their papers delivered to their door by Stephens and other volunteers.

Stephens' knee prevents him from going running these days, so he appreciates the exercise he gets from these steady, peaceful walks. He fixes folded and crooked doormats — the result of leaf-blowers, he says — as he goes about from house to house.

He knows a bit about most of the inhabitants of those houses. He can point to houses and say which neighbor speaks five languages, which is spending time in the Carolinas for the winter, and which is getting ready to retire.

Along his route today, he sees his neighbor Linda walking her dog. He knows the name of the dog, too: Lexi.

Credit Union Helps Couple Remain in Beloved Apartment Building

B everly and Earl Pallas once thought they'd be forced to leave their Montgomery Mutual home, along with the neighbors they'd come to call good friends.

Earl's medical conditions made it too difficult for him to climb the stairs of their mid-rise apartment building. But with a mortgage loan and some assistance from Signal Financial Federal Credit Union earlier this year, the couple was able to sell their second story home and close on the first-floor apartment right below it.

"[The Pallases] have several accounts with us, plus they show up to everything we do. It's nice to know that they trust us," says Nabiha Zayat-Calcutt, branch manager at the Credit Union.

If not for the Credit Union's help, "I would have had to take a lot of CDs out or go into my 401k," Pallas says.

Short Story Group

The Short Story Group is a place for not only reading short stories, but for having one's interpretation of a story challenged and bent out of shape and, sometimes, ending with a curious, new appreciation for it.

Members come to each meeting having read the agreed-upon short story, and one volunteer leads the discussion. The leader introduces the work and provides background on the author. Today's leader, Pat Leanza, has prepared for the meeting by reading reviews and critiques of the story.

The conversation usually begins with the leader asking who likes the story and who doesn't, and then proceeds to cover the story in greater depth.

The Group is currently reading from "The O. Henry Prize Stories 2018." The prize, which is awarded to meritorious stories chosen for an annual anthology, is named after the American short story writer known as "O. Henry," who was revered for his witty narrative and surprise endings.

Generally, an anthology

such as this one is chosen by the Group and read from front to back.

The Group has recently brought up the possibility of reading a collection by a single author, but members decided they prefer a mixture of authors.

Contemporary fiction is the most common genre read by the Group, but readings have come from other centuries as well.

A Crossing of Interpretations

Beth Leanza, the Group's president, believes the short story is a "higher form of art" than the novel.

"It has to be so compact, and everything has to fit together just right," she says. "There has to be a reason for everything that's in there."

With how ripe short stories are for analysis, Leanza appreciates the Group's love of literature and Group members' ability to look deeply into a story and its themes.

A wealth of different perspectives informs the Group's readings. One member, George Stricker, understands characters' motivations using his expertise in psychology.

The Group includes book editors and students and

teachers of literature; others do not have an academic background in literature, but simply love reading and interpreting text.

The Group feels that the best sessions come from disagreement. Members recall, for instance, an unsettling Joyce Carol Oates story that some members really liked and others didn't, but it led to an excellent discussion nevertheless because it was rich with points to debate.

Member Mary Ann Chinni says sometimes she would read a story that doesn't do much for her, but after attending the meeting and hearing others' interpretations, she finds herself much more interested in it and wants to reread it when she gets home.

Despite the disagreement, Group members agree to remain respectful toward one another. "We may come from different planets, from different backgrounds, but we hear each other," says Group member Alisa Samber. "Many times it instructs us to think:

'Yes, we didn't see this,' or 'why did they feel that way?'"

According to member Betsy Starks, respect and the capacity to gain new insight from others were widely said to be hallmarks of the Group as far back as 2005, when she joined.

"I just love hearing what other people can see in [a story]. It may frustrate me, it may upset me, but it's never boring," Samber says.

The Short Story Group meets on the first and third Thursdays of each month at 11 a.m. in Clubhouse I.

They stop to chat for a little while in the fresh spring air, and then each moves on.

Area Representative and Friend

Elsewhere in Montgomery Mutual, Marita Buscher, an early riser, checks before 8:30 a.m. whether the papers are available for her to pick up.

She likes to deliver papers on the same day they come out. Her schedule is busy, and "The people are always happy when they have the paper before the weekend," she says.

Buscher knows everyone in her area, so the people behind the mail slots are all familiar to her. As a Montgomery Mutual representative, she meets the new residents to help acquaint them with the community.

With her self-described affable personality, she finds it a joy to visit all her neighbors twice a month. "If their door's open, they always say, 'Come on in,'" she says.

Daughterly Neighbor

A few months after Lois Fuller moved in to Mutual 8, she noticed out her kitchen window her aged neighbor delivering papers on a windy day. The woman reminded her of her mother, and Fuller went out to ask whether she could walk with her.

Fuller found her neighbor a "lovely lady." She accompanied Ann Guerin on further delivery trips. Being fairly new to Leisure World, Fuller was glad to get to know someone else at her mutual.

Fuller offered to take over the responsibility of delivering the paper if the weather was wet or Guerin was tired. Guerin called her on occasion to take her offer, and eventually she passed her the delivery duty entirely.

During her first year in the community, Fuller got acquainted with her neighbors who were home when she came by with the paper. She says paper delivery is a good opportunity for newcomers to introduce themselves.

"It's a great little task that needs to be done, and I enjoy doing it," she says. "I'm proud to do it."

To her, delivering papers fulfills a responsibility to her mutual as well as continues

Guerin's legacy. The companionship that came of her volunteering has lasted as well: Guerin no longer walks the paper route with her, but the two remain friends and share baked goods during the holidays.



The Credit Union also worked with the couple to accommodate their time frame for moving, as well as helped them abide by the Mutual's rules regarding vacating a property.

Moving

When the Pallases decided to list their second-floor apartment, it sold after just one day on the real estate market, Beverly says.

They are set to move into their first-floor home after Easter weekend. Their new apartment allows for easy access from the sidewalk to a glass door entrance along the patio.

The Pallases have lived in the building since moving to Leisure World in 2002 and say they couldn't imagine living anywhere

else. They often host game nights for their neighbors and friends, playing the card game Tripoley and passing a bottle of Bailey's around the table.

Their new place is slightly smaller, so Beverly is trying to offload records, DVDs and CDs to someone who can use them.

"Do you have a DVD player?," Beverly asks Zayat-Calcutt, who has worked closely with the Pallases during this transitional period in their lives and has come to visit them in their home.

"She's like a sister," Beverly says of Zayat-Calcutt. "She'll do anything for you."

Like Old Friends

Beverly shows Zayat-Calcutt around her home and explains not to mind the boxes and clutter, the fallout from preparing for the move.

"It's so spacious; I might move in soon," Zayat-Calcutt quips.

The two ladies sit together in the living room and chat like old friends. They talk about their lives, and Beverly shows Zayat-Calcutt the pink blanket she's making for her great-granddaughter.

"She's always doing nice things for others," Zayat-Calcutt says, and then she turns to Earl.

"How are you doing, partner?," she says, and suddenly Beverly's subdued husband lights up like a Christmas tree.

"[Nabiha] can always get him

to smile," Pallas says.

The couple recently attended the Credit Union's art show, and say they always try to stop by events the Credit Union holds to show their appreciation to its staff.

Personal Touches

Bill, Zayat-Calcutt's supervisor, eventually joins the conversation via speakerphone to thank the couple for their 35-plus years of customer loyalty.

It's these personal touches that make Signal Financial such an attractive financial services option, especially for seniors who often need extra help filling out paperwork, Pallas says.

"Seniors forget their account numbers; we forget things," Pallas says. But when residents walk into the Credit Union, "they're all there to take are of you," she says. "You don't get that anyplace else." The Credit Union's loan officer Rob Cohen even drove Beverly to her settlement on April 16.

The Pallases joined Signal Financial Federal Credit Union so many years ago that it was then known as the Washington Telephone Federal Credit Union. Over the years, they've opened accounts at conveniently located banks, but never experienced the level of service they have with the Credit Union.

"I was so glad when [the Credit Union] came [to Leisure World]. I never met a credit union that was so pleasant and helpful," Pallas says.

Getting the Lowdown on Homeowners Insurance Coverage

Having personal homeowners insurance provides the security of knowing you are covered in the event that your home or belongings are damaged or stolen.

But do you know what your coverage includes, or the steps to take in the event of a fire, flood, theft or other incident in your home?

Personal homeowners

insurance isn't always just for improbable emergencies. Even damage caused by a broken dishwasher hose or overflowing toilet may be covered in a policy.

While Leisure World's master insurance policy covers damages to the interior and exterior of a home, such as its walls, floors or ceilings, the policy's \$5,000 deductible means the unit owner is responsible for the first \$5,000 worth of damage,

and the policy doesn't cover replacing clothes, furniture or other personal belongings.

Montgomery Mutual is the one exception to this rule; as a cooperative, the mutual covers the first \$5,000 worth of damages before the master insurance policy kicks in, except in the event that the unit owner is negligent.

Prepare Ahead

Customers shouldn't wait until something bad happens to contact their personal homeowners insurance company with questions.

Homeowners in Leisure World are encouraged to call their personal homeowner's insurance and explain that they will report any future incidents to them, and ask their insurance agent these questions:

- If an incident takes place during non-business hours, what number do I call?
- If an incident involves water damage, do you send a water extraction remediation company to my home? (If the answer is no, residents can call the Main Gate for assistance, but will be responsible for payment to the vendor.)
- Does my current insurance cover out-of-pocket expenses?

Remember that it's each unit owner's responsibility to contact his or her personal homeowners insurance if the home or any personal belongings are damaged.

'Bingo Bill' Passes Maryland General Assembly

The Maryland General Assembly adjourned April 8, and three bills passed that may affect the lives of some Leisure World residents.

The Government Affairs Advisory Committee was a proponent of Bill (HB 564), which permits a Montgomery County over-55 community to conduct bingo games. Mutuals' activities committees may now hold bingo games in their own building. State law has restricted bingo sponsorship solely to charitable organizations.

For the past two years, the bingo bill had been held up in the State Senate by objections from the Senate President. This year, with direct lobbying from Sen. Ben Kramer, recently elected State Senator, the bill passed and goes into effect Monday, July 1.

The bill limits bingo games to once a week, forbids charging any fee other than for the price of a card or refreshments and limits the total amount of money or tokens to \$1,000 in a 24-hour period.

Sales Tax and Insurance

Bill (SB 283), sponsored by Sen. Kramer at the request of the Leisure World administration, forbids the state from charging sales tax for cleaning the common areas of a building used by a common ownership community or retirement community. This bill, which will help keep down residents' monthly fees, goes into effect immediately.

Bill (SB 46) may benefit some owners of long-term care (LTC) insurance. The bill permits LTC owners who bought a policy before April 1, 2003 and who have paid premiums since to stop paying, but retain the insurance value of their past payments if their carrier raises rates after Saturday, June 1, 2019.

Some LTC providers are finding other ways to help owners maintain or reduce premiums, but usually with some change in benefits. Policyholders should consult their insurance broker to see if they could benefit.

Sidewalk Construction in Progress Along Norbeck **Road Near Gate Entrance**

S idewalk construction has begun outside Norbeck Gate along the north (Bradford's Landing) side of Norbeck Road that may extend into the summer, according to Kwesi Woodroffe, regional engineer at the State Highway Administration (SHA).

The developer of Bradford's Landing, the housing development located across from Norbeck Gate, is constructing a 10-foot wide, asphalt "shared use path" for pedestrians and bikes along the frontage of their property at Norbeck Crossing and Bradford's Landing.

Construction of the shared use path is expected to extend to Bailey's Lane and East Norbeck Road at a later

date, according to Woodroffe. A SHA inspector is monitoring the project.

The SHA is also scheduled to build a five-foot wide concrete sidewalk for pedestrians along the south (Leisure World) side of Norbeck Road that will extend from Norbeck Gate to Bailey's Lane.

ADA Traffic Signals

An ADA-compliant push-button and countdown signal for pedestrians will be added to the current signal at the Norbeck Boulevard/MD-28 intersection.

The addition of a crosswalk at this intersection will enable pedestrians and bikers to safely cross Norbeck Road.

A second ADA-compliant traffic signal will be built at Bailey's Lane and

Norbeck Road with a crosswalk to allow pedestrians and bikers to cross safely into East Norbeck Park.

SHOULD WE ABIDE BY THE LAW OR **REJECT IT?**

eisure World of Maryland has been sued because its governing body, the Leisure World Community Corporation (LWCC) board of directors (BOD), has not been elected as allegedly required by Montgomery County's Commission on Common **Ownership Communities** (CCOC). It is the primary contention of the suit that no decisions by the BOD, since passage of the CCOC, have been made by a proper authority.

The BOD contends that since mutual directors are elected, and these directors appoint one of their elected members to the BOD, the BOD has been operating under the CCOC. An upcoming court hearing will make the first decision about the matter.

While mutual directors are indeed elected by the residents living in the mutual, mutual elections do not coincide with the elections of officers of the BOD. For example, my mutual held its election for directors on April 16, as is customary. But the officers of the BOD were elected, as is customary, last January.

This creates a potential problem: currently, the chair of the BOD is an individual who was elected as a director of a mutual.

While not at the end of term on that mutual board, he could be. If not re-elected by residents in that mutual, that mutual board would immediately select its officers, including representative on the BOD. What would happen to the BOD chairmanship?

In fact, there is no requirement in many mutual bylaws, stating that its representative to the BOD be an elected director! In fact, any mutual board could designate a non-elected resident to the BOD!

Apparently neither of these possibilities has ever happened, but either could. This possibility should be recognized by Leisure World of Maryland residents, the BOD and by the judge considering the lawsuit.

There is a solution that could be imposed by the court, or voluntarily. This is for each mutual to elect its representative to the BOD. This could be accomplished in either of two ways: First, mutuals could modify their bylaws to require that residents elect its BOD representative at the same time its elections of directors takes place. While this would continue the disconnect between mutual elections and BOD elections, it would at least yield conformance with the CCOC.

Another solution would be for each mutual to hold a separate election of its BOD representative; this could occur by paper ballot, thereby avoiding the need for a second annual meeting. It would also make it possible for newly elected directors to recommend their mutual's BOD representative, and even allow one of the mutual officers to assume this role. Election of BOD officers could still happen as it does now. Were it held in November or December, the two elections would coincide appropriately.

The court could impose such a solution; or the BOD could take necessary steps; or mutuals could change their bylaws.

FATE OF THE GOLF COURSE

There is controversy on the fate of the golf course at Leisure World. As a practicing economist, I see environmental assets such as our golf course as having two sets of value: use and non-use value.

Use value, in turn, has direct and indirect value. Direct is monetary value of golfers, approximated by gross revenues of the golf club.

Indirect value is pleasure that residents derive from the course. These include those whose homes face the course, all who walk around the course and those who watch lake fountains. Indirect value is generated by residents who enjoy the surroundings, even if they do not play golf.

Non-use value also has option and bequest value. Option V is generated by non-golfing residents and refers to value placed on the

ability of residents to play golf in the future.

Bequest, or existence value, is never used by current residents, but derived from satisfaction of preserving the course for future residents. At least in principle, all these values can be calculated.

What will happen if we close the golf course? There may be construction of new high-rise condominiums that could look like Hong Kong and other large cities. If the place remains vacant, it may quickly become messy with animal wastes and trash. I do not think either is what opponents of the golf course want.

Just relax, and be happy that we have the beautiful course right in the middle of our community. We all moved in here knowing that we have the course. Why change?

World News regarding the likely selection of Comcast as our bulk internet provider. As the incumbent service provider, Comcast indeed has a distinct advantage over any competing provider. Plus, I would argue that their Xfinity technology is superior to any likely competitor. For example, Comcast Xfinity Hotspots are ubiquitous in the MVA, giving subscribers Wi-Fi access on their mobile devices far beyond (and within) the confines of Leisure World.

At a proposed \$30/month for 60 Mbps download speed, selection of Comcast would seem to be a "no-brainer."

My monthly Comcast bill is \$62 for internet and an additional \$20 for TV (I own my own modem/router, so no additional equipment fees). With the possibility of a 50 percent savings, I would be open to using a reasonable portion of this savings to subsidize non-participating residents if such a scheme can be worked out.

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

The neglected and sad state of the Jewish cemetery in Goniadz, her grandmother's Polish village, prompted her to spearhead an effort to restore its dignity and have it function as a resource for learning.

Goniadz was a village of 4,500 before World War II, but its population declined after the Holocaust and is now just 2,000. The cemetery is the only evidence that Teck's

¬he biannual National ■ Prescription Drug Take Back Day is held on Saturday, April 27.

Leisure World has been designated an official site for this event and, on this day, holds it's third Prescription Drug Take Back event in which residents may turn in discontinued, outdated or unused medications at the MedStar Health medical center pharmacy, located at 3305 North Leisure World Boulevard.

The Health Advisory Committee and medical center pharmacy have also established an ongoing Prescription Drug Take Back program in which residents may dispose of their discontinued, outdated or unused medications year-round.

A green collection bin is located in the medical center's waiting room, and residents may drop off medications Monday through Friday from 8:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. The disposal service is free and anonymous. Keep in mind that needles, illicit drugs, thermometers, inhalers, aerosol cans, hydrogen peroxide, lotions and liquids are not accepted.

This service is provided for the safety and convenience of residents. Medications that may be

ingested by accident or misused pose a health hazard to residents, children and pets.

The National Drug Enforcement Agency implemented a National Prescription Drug Take Back Day in 2010. Each year, two days are designated as drug take back days - one in April and one in October.

May 6: Retired Surgeon Shares 'Dying Wish'





Her program promises to provide an eye-opening view of this topic and what we can hope for in the near future to reduce waste and live cleaner.

About Zero Waste

How often do you think about what people throw away and where it goes – everything from food leftovers to "disposable" razors, toothbrushes and plastic utensils?

Montgomery County recycles paper, plastic containers and metal cans. But what happens to the other stuff that goes into the regular trashcans?

Zero Waste does not have a single definition, but rather, is a set of materials management strategies and sustainable practices that includes avoiding waste creation, recycling, reusing and repurposing. It also includes composting a wide range of organic matter. In addition, Zero Waste means the creation of energy that doesn't result in hazardous byproducts.

Many organizations have made important contributions to defining Zero Waste, including the Zero Waste International

Alliance, which states that Zero Waste means designing and managing products and processes to systematically avoid and eliminate the volume and toxicity of waste and materials, and conserve and recover all resources rather than burning or burying them.

"Implementing Zero Waste will eliminate all discharges to land, water or air that are a threat to planetary, human, animal or plant health," according to (http://zwia.org).







Hebrew and Arabic with international organizations, the Settlement Community, and officials from the Palestinian Authority.





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No Embargo Against Chess

▼ uba may become a more popular destination for American tourists. After all, the U.S. supported Cuba's drive for independence from Spain in 1898 – how ironic that the two countries are not on better terms now.

Problems arose following Fidel Castro's revolution in 1959, which turned Cuba into a communist country with strong ties to Russia. The U.S. imposed trade and travel sanctions on Cuba, cutting off direct air transportation, mail and telecommunications between the two countries.

Even with these restrictions, Americans continued to visit Cuba illegally. The U.S. estimated 20-30,000 per year. Cuba estimated 60,000. Nevertheless, U.S. restrictions drastically reduced tourism to Cuba. American tourists had provided 90 percent of Cuba's tourists prior to the sanctions, according to Cuba's Tourism Ministry. Although eased, restrictions remain in effect today. Removal requires an act of Congress.

To send pictures from Cuba to the U.S., NBC News had to transmit the pictures from Havana to Prague by Russian satellite, then to Frankfort for transmission to New York by American satellite, a 6,000-mile journey from a country only 90 miles off the U.S. coast.

U.S. mail had to go through third countries, such as Panama, Mexico and Canada. Delays were common. Cubans had to go through other countries to visit relatives in the U.S. U.S. carriers could not make direct phone calls to Cuba and had to use a non-U.S. carrier for the final connection

After five decades, President Barack Obama eased the sanctions in December 2014,

announcing that the U.S. and Cuba would begin a process to normalize relations between the two countries.

Thus, in February 2015, the U.S. and Cuba reached an agreement to exchange international, long-distance telephone traffic and later, agreed on regularly scheduled air passenger and cargo service and direct mail between the two countries.

In August 2015, Secretary of State John Kerry presided at a ceremony raising the U.S. flag and reopening the U.S. embassy in Havana, and in March 2016. Obama became the first U.S. President to visit Cuba since 1928.

The situation changed again in September 2017, when mysterious, invisible attacks harmed U.S. government personnel in Havana. The U.S. reduced personnel at the embassy by 60 percent, imposed new travel



restrictions, placing more than 180 military-run hotels and restaurants "off limits" to Americans, and issued a travel warning urging all Americans to stay away from Cuba.

Americans may be curious to see how 11 million people live in a nearby communist country on an average monthly salary of \$30. The closeness of the island, the music, the weather, the rum, the cigars and the 1950s autos should attract many Americans.

In recent years, millions of Americans already have visited other communist countries, including Russia and China.

About 600,000 Americans visited Cuba each year in 2017 and 2018, up from 300,000 in 2016, according to reports from the Cuban Tourism Ministry. Most arrived on cruise ships. A recent study reported in the Miami Herald expects two million American visitors by

There are no restrictions on chess in Cuba. In fact, chess classes are compulsory in Cuban schools, from elementary to high school. The Chess Club at Leisure World knows no restrictions either.


