## **Court Rules on Lawsuit**

## Judge Sides with Leisure World on Governance, but New Complaint Filed

**¬**he Leisure World Community Corporation (LWCC) board of directors' selection process does not violate the Maryland **Homeowners Association** Act, the Montgomery County Circuit Court ruled April 22.

Judge Anne K. Albright granted Leisure World's

motion for summary judgment on Count I of a second amended lawsuit that was filed on April 16 by residents Richard Thornell, Jordan Harding and Priscilla Read Chenoweth challenging Leisure World's governance structure.

Albright denied the plaintiffs' request to delay a ruling

# **Board Adopts Design Principles for Trust Properties**

he Leisure World L Community Corporation (LWCC) board of directors passed a motion at its regular meeting on April 30 approving the adoption of design principles for Leisure World's Trust facility projects as recommended by the Community Planning Advisory Committee (CPAC).

The LWCC board also approved directing CPAC and management to review specific plans with architects, planners and advisory committees at the initial design stage to determine when a project may be enhanced to comply with these design principles that are intended to better serve the needs of all residents.

The design principles, which will apply to all new, remodeled and/or repurposed Trust facility projects, consider energy efficiency, effective use of space, safety and accessibility, especially for residents with limited mobility or difficulty hearing.

# **Bulk Internet Contract** in Final Negotiations

anagement is in the process of negotiating a contract with Comcast for bulk internet service at a reduced rate for Leisure World residents. The service is anticipated to begin on Wednesday, Jan. 1, 2020.

Under this new contract, internet service will be provided to all homes in Leisure World under a bulk agreement. Instead of sending a check or money payment directly to Comcast or another internet provider, residents will pay for internet service via their monthly community services payment to their mutuals.

In preparation for this new service agreement, residents who currently use an internet provider other than Comcast

are encouraged to contact that provider to learn about the terms of cancellation. Residents are also advised to hold off on entering into a contract for internet service with another provider.

More information about the bulk internet service agreement will be forthcoming after the contract has been finalized.

Past Trust facility projects include the Fitness Center in Clubhouse II and the Crystal Ballroom in Clubhouse I.

#### 2018 Fiscal Year Deficit

The board approved the LWCC executive committee's recommendation to have the 2018 fiscal year deficit of \$12,301 carried forward and charged against the 2020 budget and not charged back to the mutuals.

"Last year, we went into the final quarter with a surplus and then incurred two unanticipated deductibles for legal expenses of \$25,000 each," which turned the surplus into a deficit, said general manager Kevin Flannery, adding that a surplus can be "put aside" and used in the event of an unforeseen expense such as this.

#### **Audit Report**

The board approved the Audit Advisory Committee's recommendation to accept the 2018 audit report of the Leisure World Trust performed by the CPA firm of Malvin, Riggins & Company.

Although the board accepted the report, some members and attendees around the room expressed dissatisfaction with this year's audit process, and expressed interest in hiring a different CPA firm in 2020.

#### **Capital Purchase**

The board approved the recommendation of the Budget and Finance and Physical Properties Advisory Committees and management to approve the purchase of a replacement rear loader hopper refuse truck for \$173,000 this year. The Capital Equipment Fund will cover the cost of the vehicle.

The custom-built vehicle, which measures 20x3 cubic yards, is expected to take three to four months to construct, and will replace the truck currently used for trash pick-up by the Physical Properties Department.

The truck currently used was scheduled for replacement in 2020; however, its condition has deteriorated to an extent that it may not pass its next inspection.

### Site Plan

Montgomery County approved the revised site plan for the Administration Building and Clubhouse I Site Improvements project on March 28, with the condition that pedestrian crosswalk safety standards at a cul-de-sac turn-around and a truck-loading docking area outside the restaurant be met, said Tom Snyder, assistant general manager of facilities and services.

Management and CPAC are also in the process of procuring a new architect, as Streetsense will no longer be involved in the project. A request for proposal will be released to qualified architectural firms in the coming weeks.

The board voted to enter a closed session at the end of the regular meeting to discuss legal matters and the pending bulk internet contract.

on the motion, asserting that the material facts of the case are not in dispute and further discovery would not change the court's ruling. The summary judgment closes the case on this part of the lawsuit, originally filed by nine residents in July 2018.

With the lawsuit's original complaint against Leisure World's governance structure now settled, the second amended complaint requests the Court invalidate Leisure World's two percent resale fee, the resale administrative fee and the monthly assessment that Leisure World's mutuals pay LWCC, and claims Leisure World has breached fiduciary duty and the Maryland Consumer Protection Act.

The Court did not rule on Leisure World's request to limit the scope of discovery for the second amended complaint and instead instructed attorneys to attempt to resolve their differences on the matter out of Court by Wednesday, May 22.

The next regular meeting of the LWCC board of directors is scheduled for Tuesday, May 21, at 9:30 a.m. in Clubhouse I. LWCC board meetings are open to all residents unless legally closed.

The Court denied Leisure World of Maryland Corporation's (LWMC) request to be dismissed from the case given the expanded scope of the second amended complaint, which also adds the 33 members of the LWCC board of directors as defendants in the case.

Leisure World has paid a \$25,000 Travelers insurance policy deductible toward legal fees related to the lawsuit, which was subtracted from the community's Contingency Fund and amounts to \$4.42 per residential unit in Leisure World. The remainder of these expenses is covered by Travelers' Directors and Officers insurance policy.

Members of the Emergency Preparedness Advisory Committee will also present a panel discussion focusing on financial preparedness and preparedness at the mutual level.

# May 10: Zen – The Art of Personal Mastery

A fundamental precept in life is that all happiness requires skills, that all skills require mastery and that all mastery requires learning. It's a strategy so deeply submerged in our unconscious that few bother to think about it, and fewer still are aware of the foundational principles behind it.

So when things go wrong, resolving the problem may become difficult because the person does not understand what is blocking them. The problem can compound itself as a vicious circle — what Buddhists call Samsara, when the short cuts used

end up resulting in more problems.

Zen approaches the question of happiness using a process of inversion – by understanding the causes of unhappiness and removing them. Discussion and an opportunity to share experiences follow the presentation. Compassion and Choices has prepared material to distribute to those wanting information about VSED, which will be available on the

Group's resource tables along with other information on a wide variety of end-of-life issues.





## May 8: Frank Roddy Speaks About the Dinosaur National Monument Museum

**¬**he Gem, Lapidary and Mineral Society (GLMS) of Leisure World holds its next meeting on Wednesday, May 8, at 7 p.m. in Clubhouse II. The meeting's speaker, Frank Roddy, will describe the Dinosaur National Monument museum in Utah.

Normally, scientists find fossils and move them to a museum. The Dinosaur National Monument is such an astounding collection of fossils in one place that they moved the museum to the fossils.

#### **Museum's Origins**

When the dinosaurs died off

in a mass extinction 66 million years ago, their carcasses were washed into a riverbed at what is now the border between Colorado and Utah. Sediment covered them and the bones were slowly turned into stone fossils.

Frank Roddy, courtesy The riverbed was later geologically photo tilted up at about a 60-degree angle. Scientists discovered fossils in the area in the early 1900s, sent them to museums, cleaned them up and displayed them at those museums. They kept finding so many fossils in the tilted riverbed that they decided to make the riverbed itself a museum, with the tilted rock strata as one wall of the museum.

### **About the Museum**

The Dinosaur National Monument museum is perhaps the largest collection of fossils in one place anywhere in the world. The fossils already removed from the rock strata are on display. However, thousands of fossils are half cut out of the rock but are still imbedded in the "wall" as bas-relief fossils.

Contrary to many museums, visitors are encouraged to touch the fossils themselves while standing on the first floor. The second

> floor of the museum is cantilevered out so that visitors can look with a panoramic view at the fossils higher up on the

A computerized system with touch screens allows visitors to identify and locate each type of dinosaur and their fossil

remains everywhere on the wall. A booklet identifies and locates each type of dinosaur on the wall. Both media help show how the bone structure

in the dinosaurs is similar yet different from humans.

Roddy is the president of the GLMS of Leisure World and has given talks on ice-age floods and unusual geological formations out West.

**Emily and Mary Edmonson** were the teenage daughters of Paul Edmonson, a freed black man who owned a 40-acre farm on what is now a part of Leisure World property.


On April 15, 1848, Emily and Mary were among the 77 enslaved people from Washington, D.C., and Montgomery County, Maryland, who tried to escape to freedom on the schooner named The Pearl. Unfortunately, they were caught and brought back, eventually being held in the slave market pens in Alexandria.

The brother of writer and abolitionist Harriet Beecher Stowe rescued the sisters from slavery, and Harriet paid for their education at Oberlin College. The sisters went on to travel around the North at abolitionist meetings with Frederick Douglass.

The city of Alexandria commissioned sculptor Erik Blome to create a 10 ft. bronze statue to commemorate the sisters. It was installed in May 2010 near the location where they were held prior to their sale.



would be no cuts to the earned benefits of retirees in the immediate future.

A study was cited that showed that salaries of government employees' lag behind the private sector by 31.8 percent for similar jobs and responsibilities. However, the recently introduced Fair COLA for Seniors Act amends the cost of living adjustments for federal and military annuities, Social Security benefits and veterans' benefits, which are currently based on the Consumer Price Index for Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers.

The Fair COLA for Seniors Act would require the calculation of these COLAs to be based on the CPI for the Elderly, which more accurately measures costs of consumer goods experienced by individuals age 62 and older that relies more on medical care, the pricing of which has far outpaced the price increases for other consumer goods.

# **Deactivating Your Facebook Account**

sers who have deactivated their Facebook account may still have their data tracked by the company, according to an article posted on the technology website CNET on April 11 by Jason Cipriani titled, "CNET Discovered That Simply **Deactivating Your Account** Doesn't Go Far Enough."

Even after deactivating, the social network will still collect information about what former users are doing online, and that information is tied back to their Facebook account, according to CNET. Here are a few tips to consider:

Deleting a Facebook account also deletes Facebook Messenger. Users should notify those they message, as well as their Facebook friends, that they are leaving Facebook, and tell friends how to contact them going forward.

Don't forget about other logins. For example Spotify, Foursquare and some other third party apps let users log in using their Facebook accounts. When the user leaves Facebook, this sign-in method will no longer work. They have to change their login for each app.

To find which apps are linked to Facebook login, sign in to Facebook > Settings > Apps and Websites. For further help, contact the app's customer service.

#### **Removing Facebook**

CNET provides instructions for users who want to further sever themselves from Facebook:

Delete the Facebook app from your phone. Users can still access Facebook via their browser and other apps they may have that use Facebook to log in.

Download all of your Facebook data before doing anything else:

- · Log into Facebook via a browser such as Safari or Google Chrome
- Go to Settings > Your Facebook Information
- · Click View next to Download Your Information
- · Leave all of the boxes checked

under the Your Information section

- · Leave the date range to All of my data
- Leave the format set to HTML – doing so puts your data in an easy-to-navigate format

Users may still LW have some photos and videos in their Facebook account that they don't have copied somewhere else, so **CNET** recommends changing the media quality from Medium to High. Users can click Create File and then wait for Facebook to email them. Read through Facebook's final advice before deleting the account.

#### **Deleting Your Account**

The final step is to delete the Facebook account. To do so, visit (www.facebook.com/login. php?next=https%3A%2 F%2Fwww.facebook.com%2F help%2Fdelete\_account) and sign into your account.

Facebook provides a few tools on the account deletion page, including the option to begin the download process for the user's data before he or she deletes the account and a reminder to add an administrator for any Facebook Pages the user is the sole administrator for. Otherwise, when the user deletes their account, that Facebook Page will also disappear.

Click Delete Account, enter

your password and click Continue. Finally, click Delete Account again.

Facebook gives users 30 days to cancel their deletion. It takes the company up to three months

> to remove all of a user's data and, during the first 30 days, users can sign in to cancel their request for deletion by logging into their Facebook account and clicking the **Cancel Deletion** button.

Facebook will take up to 90 days to delete all of a user's account data from its servers.

Apple

For the first 30 days of that, users can still sign in and cancel their deletion request, and it will be as if they never left.

# Giving a Roman Thumbs Up for Chess

Roman amphitheaters featured gladiator fights, wild animal hunts and public executions. Many gladiators were slaves, criminals or prisoners of war who fought for their freedom.

People fought to the death against each other and against animals. These events, though bloody and barbaric, allowed spectators to escape their own troubles, at least for a day, and gained popular support for the emperor.

Amphitheaters made Romans proud of their engineering and artistic skills. Archeologists and historians have found about 230 of these round or oval, open-air structures, stretching across the Mediterranean, including dozens in France, England, Spain, Libya and Tunisia.


The largest – a classic tourist attraction – is the Colosseum built in the center of Rome, standing about 150 feet high over six acres and seating roughly 50,000. More than four million tourists visit the

Colosseum each year, one of 51 places in Italy recognized as world heritage sites by UNESCO.

Historians cite it as a "focal point of Roman society." Seating arrangements reflected social status: the lower tier for the emperor and the most elite (the royal family, senators, nobles, and priests); the second tier for equites or knights (14 sections of marble seats) and wealthy plebeians; and the third tier for poor plebeians or ordinary Roman citizens.

During its 390 years of use, the Colosseum saw the loss of more than 400,000 people and about one million animals. Thousands of Jewish slaves built the Colosseum in 10 years (72-80 AD). Estimates of the number of Jewish slaves extend to as many as 60,000, according to (around rometours.com). Emperor Titus brought the slaves to Italy after destruction of the Temple in Jerusalem.

Transportation of 60,000 people, in itself, would have been a great feat, considering that the Romans did not have access



to the 6,000-passenger cruise ships of today.

Rome had a heavy slave population of its own. According to some estimates, 30-40 percent of the entire Roman population was slaves at the time – millions. Parents would sometimes sell their children into slavery because they could not support them.

As forerunners of today's sports stadiums, people may wonder whether amphitheaters had adequate parking space for horses and chariots, tailgate parties and long lines to the ladies' rooms.

About 50 million Americans attend college football games each year. Stadium owners sell naming rights to advertisers. Mercedes-Benz, for example, is paying \$324 million to use its name for the new stadium in Atlanta for 27 years, according to CBS News. Emperor Titus would have probably appreciated this moneymaking concept.

Chess players, clad in armor, did not play games in the middle of the Colosseum while animals ran wild around them. Chess has not yet proven its value as a spectacle for mass entertainment in the way football

Meanwhile, at Leisure World, chess matches continue in Clubhouse II. In the diagram pictured on this page, Black's Rook is threatening White's Queen. What is White's best move?

The solution follows this message that the Chess Club meets on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays from 1-4 p.m. in Clubhouse II. Membership is free. For information, call Bernie Ascher at (301-598-8577).

SOLUTION: White's Rook checks the King at d8 and is captured by Black's Rook from a8, but White's Rook at d1 then captures Black's Rook. Checkmate!

So, do not wait for horses and chariots. Do not wait for gladiators and wild animals. Do not wait for the naming of a new stadium. Play chess now!
