Second Bioswale Installed Veterans' Stories Get a at Pennfield Park

eisure World continues to do its part to help Montgomery County protect and preserve the Chesapeake Bay watershed, the largest estuary in the U.S.

In April, the second of a series of bioretention swales, or bioswales as they're sometimes called, was installed at Pennfield Park, a grassy section of Trust property located near the intersection of the Main Gate entrance and Rossmoor Boulevard.

Made of a compost-soil mix, this second bioswale connects to the first, installed in September 2017, in a conveyance design that collects, cleans and slowly releases filtered stormwater runoff into storm drains and waterways that lead into the Bay.

A bioswale is constructed in low or hollow areas of land where it can more easily catch runoff. Piled rocks act as "check dams" that pool and slow the water's flow, reducing erosion. The bioswale absorbs the water quickly - within 24-48 hours ensuring that mosquitos don't have enough time to breed in it.

Leisure World's bioswale, installed by landscaping contractor, McFall & Berry Inc., also helps control erosion that naturally occurs from rainwater gushing through a section of the ravine that is not yet filled in.

"[Leisure World residents and staff] saw the erosion and they knew they had an issue," said Aaron Tenley, grounds maintenance. "As long as we have a swale here, the water is going to continue to do what it does."

A third and likely final section of bioswale will fill in the ravine next year, absorbing some of

Jnder the auspices of the Library of Congress' Veterans History Project, Leisure World residents Dr. Naomi Platt and Debbie Shankman are conducting oral history interviews with military veterans in the community.

The veterans discuss their military service experiences on camera, often for the first time. So far, Leisure World's veterans have contributed over 170 interviews to the Library of Congress, collections.

By sending the recordings to be archived and made available to the public through the Library's Veterans History Project, Platt and Shankman celebrate veterans, provide a "validation of their lives," in Platt's words, and render individual memory into public memory.

Project's Origins

The Veterans History Project, which was created in 2010 by the U.S. Congress, attracted the attention of Platt, who has a background in gerontology and experience with interviewing, and Shankman, who has technical knowledge of videography from her work at a television news station. The Foundation of Leisure World provided the pair with a video camera to use for interviews.

The two decided to go beyond the original intention of speaking with World War II veterans, and they continue to interview veterans of other wars.

Finding Interviewees

Ruth Day was the only female Marine as well as the only Korean War veteran who stepped forward when Platt asked for participants for the

Voter Registration

Residents new to Leisure World or who recently moved from one location to another should make sure to update their voter registration.

To vote in the primary election, the deadline to register to vote or update voter information is Tuesday, June 5.

Residents who would like to register to vote or change their voter registration can use Maryland's Online **Voter Registration System** at (https://voterservices. elections.maryland.gov/OnlineVoterRegistration/InstructionsStep1) or submit a new voter registration application at (https://elections.maryland.gov/voter_registration/ application.html).

Where Do I Vote?

Leisure World has three polling places: Clubhouse I, Clubhouse II and The Inter-Faith Chapel.

Early Voting

Voters may go to any early voting site and cast a ballot. Early voting is from Thursday, June 14, to Thursday, June 21, 10 a.m.-8 p.m.

Early voting results are tallied on election night, just like votes cast on election day. Voters who vote early may not vote by mail or on election day.

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May 24: County Board **Considers MD-28 Traffic Amenities**

t its Thursday, May 24, Ameeting, the Montgomery County Planning Board votes on the proposed installation of a sidewalk and pedestrian amenities along the south side of MD-28 (Norbeck Road) between MD-97 and Bailey's Lane.

If approved, the Maryland Department of Transportation State Highway Administration would begin construction on the project, which includes a new traffic signal on MD-28 at Bailey's Lane/Norbeck Park entrance. The construction would affect traffic patterns outside Leisure World's Norbeck Road gate.

All county residents are welcome to attend the May 24 hearing, which begins at 9 a.m. at 8787 Georgia Avenue in downtown Silver Spring. Residents may also sign up online to testify at the hearing at (http:// montgomeryplanningboard.org/ meetings/signup-to-testify/).

project at a Veterans Day event at Leisure World.

Day agreed to be interviewed because she is proud of having qualified for and served in the Marine Corps. At the time, the Marines were very selective of women and only accepted five a month.

Too small in stature for the highly stringent branch, she worked hard to gain weight and even an inch of height to become eligible. While women were not allowed in active combat at the time, she endured vigorous boot camp training that drove others to drop out.

World War II veteran George Jacobs is a former journalist, but he never wrote about his own military life; he was always on the other side of interviews.

He'd told his children about his time in the Air Force, and they encouraged him to document it and share it formally with the greater world. When he met Platt at a meeting of the Jewish War Veterans and learned about the project as a good opportunity.

Platt and Shankman recruit project volunteers at veterans' events and club meetings, while some veterans approach them having heard of the project by word of mouth. Generally, they prioritize veterans who served in earlier wars.

Some who served during peacetime or who were not active combatants have declined the invitation, believing they wouldn't have much worthwhile to say. But Platt and Shankman believe their experiences are also important and valuable to the project.

The Interview Process

Each veteran is interviewed twice: first a preliminary interview, and then a videotaped interview, which is sent to the Library of Congress.

At the preliminary interview, veterans show Platt their relevant paperwork and photographs and give her basic information such as their unit and time of service. Platt then uses the information for extensive research in preparation for the second interview.

During Day's second interview, Platt did her what Day found "a real generous favor:" Platt asked whether she knew what had happened to the sergeant major whom she had worked for. Day didn't, and Platt was able to inform her that he had been killed. Platt showed her the paperwork she'd found in the archive.

It's because of the potential for deeply personal stories and intense emotion that Platt and Shankman now schedule their meetings in intimately small, windowless rooms.

"It was intense," Day said, "but it was easy."

Storytelling

Platt begins the videotaped interview by asking questions to encourage the interviewee to open up, but afterwards, veterans tend to narrate their experiences.

Jacobs didn't know what would be expected of him during

the interview: whether he would be responding to a series of questions, or whether he would need to monologue like a storyteller. The interview turned out more akin to a pleasant chat, and he felt he could speak freely as though having a conversation with his children.

Platt seeks inspirational to know not only about the veterans' time in the military but also their lives outside it. "She wanted to know me as a perso

wanted to know me as a person, a whole person," Day said.

Day found that Platt had a way of dislodging good stories.

Day found that Platt had a way of dislodging good stories from the back of her memory. She recalled events she hadn't thought of in a long time.

A Record to Treasure

Leisure World technician Krishna Manohar volunteers to make DVDs of the videoed interviews, and a copy is always given to the interviewee.

A video reproduces veterans' voices and the emotions in their speech, making it feel more personal, according to Shankman.

Many veterans often show their DVDs to their families or to schools and religious groups.

One man who was interviewed held a family get-together where three generations watched the interview together, Platt and Shankman said.

Jacobs and Day both plan to give copies of their DVD to their relatives. In Jacobs' family, the interview will be an heirloom passed down alongside copies of the letters he wrote to his mother

> from 1943 to 1945. While his children have heard his story, his other relatives haven't, so they will be learning new things about him.

Meaning in Memory

Jacobs would like his interview to communicate "the stupidity" and "the uncivilization" of war. To him, taking up arms has sometimes been inevitable, as he believes was the case with the U.S.' involvement in World War II. Still, he hopes the experiences of veterans will deter future wars, and that nations will learn to settle their conflicts peacefully.

Day would like her viewers to understand the importance of service to others.

In her home she keeps four polished stones with the words "give," "love," "care," and "joy" written on them, which she clutches in times of trouble. They remind her of the joy that comes from giving love and care, and her belief that everybody should

"It's a good focal point – coming into the community and seeing something like this," Tenley said.

devote time to serving others in the military or otherwise.

She wants also to communicate that women, too, gave of themselves in wartime and made a difference in the outcomes.

For Jacobs it is important that researchers of the future can turn to the archives when those with direct memories of the war have gone.

Day likes the thought that one day, someone will encounter her video in the archives and see the remarkable life she lived.

"And they'll come across this name and say, 'Gee, that woman did something very interesting," Day said. "She proved this to me."

How to Access Interviews Online

The Library of Congress digitizes some of the materials it receives and makes them available on its website. While Platt and Shankman's videos aren't currently available, some recordings by other Leisure World-affiliated volunteers are.

What You Should Know About the Montgomery County Commission on Common Ownership Communities

M ontgomery County recognizes that a substantial proportion of all its citizens now live in condominium and homeowner associations, and in housing cooperatives, generally called "common ownership communities." In order to serve better the special needs of these communities, to act as their advocate, and to maintain and improve the quality of life in these communities, the County created the **Commission on Common** Ownership Communities. The Commission operates under the authority of Chapter 10B of the County Code.

The Commission has 3 basic duties:

Education: The Commission provides free information to both members and to governing bodies about their rights and duties under Maryland law, as well as advice on how to properly operate the association and to avoid complaints. Among other tools, it offers a "Manual and Resource Guide" for boards of directors, and detailed information on architectural control, assessments, and meetings. It publishes a newsletter summarizing recent developments affecting common ownership communities. Commissioners will also speak to communities and their boards on request and welcome invitations to do so.

Legislation: The Commission advocates for common ownership communities concerning proposed laws and regulations at the local and state level.

Dispute resolution:

The Commission can hear and resolve certain disputes between members of the communities and their governing bodies, and its decisions are legally binding on the parties. Copies and easy-to-read summaries of its decisions are posted on its website and reviewed in its newsletter.

The Commission is composed of 15 volunteers who are appointed for threeyear terms. Eight members must be residents of common ownership communities and the other seven must be professionals who work with the communities, such as property managers, lawyers, developers and realtors. Every Fall, the County publishes a request for applicants to the Commission to replace those whose terms are due to expire.

Bill of Rights and Responsibilities For Owners in Common Ownership **Communities**

This Bill of Rights and Responsibilities outlines twelve principles or 'best practices' founded on Maryland law and often included in most association bylaws and covenants. Common ownership communities (such as condominium and homeowners associations) play a valuable role in Montgomery County, Maryland, and generally operate amicably through the voluntary efforts of a board of directors, who are authorized to act in the best interests of the community. The Commission on Common Ownership Communities hopes this Bill of Rights and Responsibilities will assist residents and boards of directors to improve the quality of life and the conduct of self-governance in common ownership communities in Montgomery County and elsewhere.

- 1. You have the right to be informed before buying a home in a common ownership community of the community's governing documents, financial condition, assessments and fees, and its rules and regulations. You have the duty to ask for this information from the seller, to read and understand it, and to obey the rules if you buy the home.
- 2. You have the right to be treated with respect by your neighbors and by the directors and managers of your community. You have the duty to treat your neighbors, directors and managers with respect.
- 3. You have the right to privacy consistent with the law and the reasonable rules of the community. You (and your tenants, if any) have the duty to respect the rights of your neighbors to enjoy their privacy.
- 4. You have the right to prompt and effective service from your association's directors or management. You have the duty to pay your assessments on time.
- 5. You have the right to vote in elections, on the adoption of new rules, and on the assessments, when permitted by law or community rules. You have the duty to inform yourself of the issues, and to vote on
- 6. You have the right to fair elections and to run for office. You have the duty to make sure that elections are fair and that candidates for whom you vote are qualified.
- 7. You have the right to honest and reasonable government from your elected board and the managers it chooses. You have the duty to participate in the affairs of the community by volunteering your time and talent as needed and by informing yourself of the board's activities.
- 8. You have the right to be informed of your community's acts and financial condition. and to inspect its books and records. You have the duty to know and understand its rules, and to provide to the commu-

nity any information required by the rules.

- 9. You have the right to meet with your fellow owners to discuss the community's and the board's conduct. You have the duty to obtain the information necessary to form a fair and balanced opinion, and to promote positive solutions for the good of the community.
- 10. You have the right to fair treatment if you are charged with a violation of the community rules. This includes the right to know what rule is involved and to a fair hearing. You have the duty to respond to any such claim promptly and honestly, and to cooperate in good faith and without resorting to personal verbal attacks in an effort to resolve the dispute.
- 11.If you are unable to resolve disputes directly with your community, you may have the right to bring your dispute to the Commission on Common Ownership Communities where it can be resolved without the need for expensive litigation. You have the duty first to bring your dispute to the attention of the community's board of directors and to allow the board a fair opportunity to respond, and to use whatever dispute resolution procedures your community requires; if you bring your dispute to the Commission you have the duty to cooperate in the Commission's complaint process and to treat other parties with respect.
- 12. You have the right to architectural and other rules (such as parking or pets) that are properly adopted and published, that are clear and reasonable, and that are fairly and consistently enforced. You have the right to seek changes to any rules that you believe are obsolete or inappropriate. You (and your tenants, if any) have the duty to obey the rules, to follow the proper procedures to obtain permission for the modifications you wish to make, and to keep your home clean, attractive, safe, and free of trash, pests, and other nuisances.



So What Do We Get For Our \$67 Subsidy?

You and I are the proud owners of an 18-hole golf course on 92 acres that comprises the heart of Leisure World.

It also means each housing unit pays about \$67 per year to subsidize the operation of the course (2018 golf course operation budget). That is about three percent of the total each of us contributes to operation of the community (personal communication, management).

What do we get for that subsidy? We protect an investment we have already made.

The proposed alternatives to the golf course do not eliminate or reduce the subsidy significantly and we lose our investment. The golf course protects the integrity of the community.

There are several published studies on the impact of golf

courses on real estate values available on the internet. These studies involve thousands of real estate transactions. They involve public, semi-private and private golf courses. They include both open and gated communities.

On the low end, a golf course increases the real estate value by seven percent. On the high end, it's a 27 percent increase for a gated community with a private golf course.

The actual impact on a unit is related to how close it is to the golf course, but every unit in Leisure World is within three blocks of the golf course, so it affects everyone to some degree.

When we bought our unit, each of us invested thousands of dollars in having a golf course in our community (TruliaBlog, RealtyNews-Reprt.com, SportsManagement). When Montgomery Village, a community a few miles from us, lost their golf course, it was reported that real estate prices plunged

20 to 30 percent (anecdotal, consistent with other research).

Over the years, people have made suggestions on how the golf course property could be used. The problem is most of these suggestions do not generate revenue unless we are going to go with the windmills or a cemetery.

Our golf course generates about \$350,000 in revenue from about 500 people playing 14,000 rounds of golf (annual golf report). This offsets about half the annual costs of the golf course.

Without a golf course, we will still have 92 acres to maintain. It is estimated that basic maintenance would cost about \$300,000 (Golf & Greens Committee, McFall & Berry, Inc).

Elimination of the course would only save a few dollars per year in the subsidy, while we lose our initial investment. Any restrictions on use of the golf course, such as closing certain days or hours, only reduces revenue it can generate and increases the subsidy.

Reconfiguration of the course to 9-holes both reduces the revenue it can generate and negatively impacts the real estate values – a 9-hole course does not have the same value.

Of course, without a golf course, the push to sell off some of the land to developers is also very possible and very likely. The golf course protects the integrity of the community by not allowing more development. How many walking trails and dog parks can we put on 92 acres?

Although developing some of the land may put money in the Leisure World bank account, it will decrease the value of each of our personal investments and place greater demands on existing amenities and facilities. As long as we have a golf course no further development can happen in the community.

No other amenity we subsidize has the same impact on real estate values as the golf course, with the possible exception of our community being gated.

For our \$67 a year subsidy, we protect our initial investment and our community. It also makes us unique among retirement communities in the region.

Little Known Races on the Ballot This Year

M ost people know that in 2018 we are electing a governor and Lt. governor, a U.S. senator, state senator and state delegates, county executive and county council members.

Most don't know that there are other races, just as important, maybe more so.

One is the race for circuit court judges. Those are the judges that handle the most complicated trials in Maryland. Unlike other levels of judges, the circuit court judges run in elections just like any other.

This year, there are seven "sitting judges" whose names will appear on both the Democratic and Republican primary ballots in June.

If the same seven win both,

they go on the general election ballot in November. If different ones win, all eight go on the November ballot.

Why is this important? Circuit court judges are some of the most important people in our government. What is the contest about? It's "sitting judges" vs. one person who is not a sitting judge.

On your primary ballot, the first six names and the last name are judges who were "vetted," meaning they were interviewed and evaluated extensively, and they have been judges for at least a year.

The challenger is Marylin Pierre. In the past, she was vetted and not selected. This year she is running, saying the vetting process is not a valid way to select judges.

Your choice is the seven sitting judges (one through six on the ballot, plus eight) or Marylin Pierre and any others you wish. You should look at their websites and make up your mind – (https://www. electsittingjudgesmcs. com/) and (https://pierreforjudge.com/). You can also call them and all would be happy to talk with you, and probably meet with you.

The clerk of the court is another race where the voters choose a winner. Barbara Meiklejohn (https://www. facebook.com/barbarameiklejohnforclerk/) was the deputy clerk for many years and moved up in recent years. She is being challenged by Alan Bowser (http://www. alanbowser.net/) who says he can do a better job, and that it is time, after over 200 years, for an African-American to hold this job.

Each major party has a central committee in our county (the Democratic one is abbreviated as MCDCC). This group makes all decisions for the party. The race I know about is the Democratic one.

Harold Diamond (no known website) has been the male member of MCDCC since 2010 for district 19 (where Leisure World is located). He is being challenged by two other males this year - Steven Cenname (https://www.facebook.com/CennameForMCD- CC/?ref=py_c) and Christopher Steven Jennison (jennisonformd.com).

Both of the challengers say it's time for a change in this office and they can do a better job than the incumbent.

There is also a race for the female member from District 19. The incumbent is Linda Mahoney (no known website) and the challengers are Deirdre Gallagher -(https:// www.deirdre4d19.com/) and Samantha Jones.

Again, both challengers say it's time for a change and they can do a better job than the incumbent.

The board of education decides how to spend more than half of the county's money (total \$5.5 billion). There are candidates for at-large (county-wide) and for each of 5 five districts.

Everyone in Montgomery County votes for all, regardless of district. (Districts are just to insure that candidates come from different areas.)

The eight candidates at-large (only one will be elected in the general election but the top two in the primary will move to the general) are: Ryan Arbuckle, Timur Edib, Marwa Omar Ibrahim, Julie Reileyl, Brandon Orman Rippeon, John A. Robertson, Karla Silvestre and Stephen Sugg.

The candidates in District 1 are Maria Blaeuer and Judith Docca (Incumbent). The candidates in District 3 are Lynn Amano, Pat O'Neill (Incumbent) and Laura Simon (top two will move

to the general election). The candidates in District 5 are Paul J. Pykosh and Brenda Wolff.

You can Google them to find out their platforms, and again, if you call or email them, they will be happy to tell you all about themselves.

I urge all voters to consider these races to be just as important as the more wellknown races, and to educate yourselves so you can vote for the best candidates.

Potholes Begone

ike me, you may have wondered why there are awful potholes that greet everyone entering Leisure World.

At two different meetings of my mutual board, I asked a senior manager about these potholes. On first asking, he responded, "We can't get any response from Montgomery County on our request." On the second occasion, I asked, "specifically who are you asking that refuses to respond?" The response was, "elected State representatives."

Since we have responsible elected representation, I found this puzzling. I can't imagine how any of them could fail to respond favorably to our general manager.

So I decided to explore the situation myself. It quickly became clear to me that the road from Georgia Avenue to the Georgia Avenue gate

is actually Rossmoor Boulevard, essentially, the community's "driveway." Research into this small strip, at Maryland 311 and the Maryland Department of Transportation's website, said Montgomery County maintained this short strip.

This was confirmed by a Leisure World project manager - the County is responsible for the maintenance of Rossmoor Boulevard, but only as far as the cut-through.

What are we doing to get the County to meet its responsibilities? And, what about the remaining portion?

Montgomery County maintains the Connecticut Avenue strip up to the gate. But this road provides access to a major PEPCO power center, located just outside the Leisure World gate.

In addition to the (many) potholes, what about the depressions in pavement on Rossmoor Boulevard caused when Washington Metropolitan Area Transportation Authority (WMATA) buses park in the same spots in hot weather? Shouldn't WMATA pay to repair them? My answer is yes. What have we done to bring that about? These depressions have become a nearly permanent feature of Leisure World's main entrance.

We can do better. We need to continue to press the county to do its job, and our general manager to do his; we do pay taxes.

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

Committee chairpersons and elected officers all serve on the Club's board, which meets on the second Monday of each month at 10 a.m. in Clubhouse I.



Gaddafi Plays Chess While Tripoli Burns

M oammar Gaddafi was Prime Minister of Libya for 42 years, but the press is still unsure how to correctly spell his name in English.

Al Jazeera spelled his name Muammar Gaddafi. The New York Times spelled it Muammar el-Quaddafi. The Los Angeles Times spelled

it Moammar Kadafi and once published a list of 149 different possible spellings. The Arabic letter "qoif" could be pronounced "g," "k," of "q." Known as Col. Gaddafi, he

died in the Battle of Sirte in October 2011. At the time, he was the world's richest man, worth some \$200 billion, according to Forbes magazine. By comparison,

the wealth of Washington, D.C.'s, richest man today, Jeff Bezos, CEO of Amazon and owner of The Washington Post, is believed to be only \$110 billion.

A major part of Gaddafi's personal fortune is well hidden. Authorities have been unable to find most of the money.


Gaddafi had nine children. Misspellings of their names may be part of the problem, but some of the money has been identified. For example, as reported by Forbes on Feb. 28, 2011, the U.S. blocked some \$30 billion of Libyan assets held by American financial institutions. The money was frozen by an executive order issued by President Barack Obama.

The U.S. State Department issued warnings about travel to Libya, which is still a dangerous place. The country is unstable and operating under three authorities, each lacking full control.

A U.N.-backed government (the General National Accord) is located in Tripoli, but is not recognized by its two rival groups: the General National Congress in Tripoli and the House of Representatives, or "Tobruk government." Somehow, however, the oil and the oil money keep

Gaddafi wed Fatiha al-Nouri in an arranged marriage, but six months later they separated and he married Safia Farkash, who he met as a nurse during his operation for appendicitis. Over the years, they had seven biological children and two adopted children.

As reported by MSNBC, Gaddafi once played chess with a Russian visitor during a revolt. The game took place in June 2011, the fourth month of the rebellion against the regime, in an "administrative building" in Tripoli, as Gaddafi's compound in central Tripoli



had been under NATO bombardment.

The visitor, Kirsan Ilyumzhinov, Russian President of the World Chess Federation, said he got the best of Gaddafi during the chess game, but offered him a draw since it is not polite for a guest to win.

In Leisure World, chess games are played in the absence of bombardment and without secret bunkers. After a fierce battle on the chessboard, however, players may appear somewhat shell-shocked.

In the game pictured on this page, it is White's turn to move. White can mate in three moves. Do you see it?

The answer follows the usual reminder that the Chess Club meets on Monday, Wednesday and Friday from 1-4 p.m. in Clubhouse II. Beginner lessons are available. For more information, call Lark Kellar at (301-219-5955).

ANSWER: White moves the Rook from a1 to g1, checking the Black King. Black moves the King to h6, his only move. White moves the Bishop to f3. Black then moves the Rook from h8 to g8, challenging White's Rook at g1. White then moves the Rook from f5 to h5. Checkmate!

So, do not wait for a definitive spelling of Gaddafi's name. Do not wait for distribution of his fortune to the people of Libya. Do not wait for a stable government. Play chess now!


