The man set to the give the L keynote speech at Leisure World's July 4 parade has worked in the service of 11 U.S. presidents, from Dwight D. Eisenhower through Barack Obama.

For 60 years, Leisure World resident Charles Brotman was the official announcer for every single presidential inaugural parade. He's traded laughs with Bill Clinton, received a signed baseball from Richard Nixon and glimpsed the political world from closer than

few citizens ever could.

Brotman's association with the White House began when he was working as stadium announcer for the Washington Senators. It was his first year on what, at that point, the native Washingtonian considered the job of a lifetime.

But a year after he introduced President Eisenhower at a baseball game, he received a surprise call from the White House asking if he would be Eisenhower's announcer at his second-term inauguration in 1957.

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# Regency Residents Let **Energy Supply**

riving through The Regency on a sunny day, residents might catch a glimpse of solar panels affixed to homes.

The mutual is the only one in Leisure World where some residents have switched from receiving electricity from the public utility to generating it on their very rooftops.

Photovoltaic solar panels, the type of panels often found on the rooftops of homes and other buildings, generate electricity directly from sunlight via an electronic process that occurs naturally

in certain types of materials, called semiconductors, according to the Solar Energy Industries Association.

The sunny landscape of The Regency lends well to capturing sunlight. Buildings that receive "limited or no shade coverage" are best able to rely on solar power, according to Montgomery County's Department of Environmental Protection.

The Regency consists of single-family houses and is governed by a homeowners' association, rendering the mutual especially hospitable to residents' independent

# Residents Honor First Responders

Of the approximately 10,000 calls per year that Fire Station 25 in Silver Spring responds to, about half of them – nearly 5,000 – are at Leisure World. Likewise, Sandy Spring Volunteer Fire Department responds to about a thousand calls from Leisure World every year, about half of all calls received. # **Experts Predict Near- or Above-Normal Atlantic Hurricane Season**

The National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) says the 2018 Atlantic hurricane season, which runs from June 1 through Friday, Nov. 30, will most likely be near- or above-normal.

Any predictions of weather have uncertainty attached to them, depending on climate and other factors.

#### **Hurricane Predictions**

NOAA's predictions for 2018 include a 70 percent likelihood of 10 to 16 named storms (winds of 39 miles per hour or higher), of which five to nine could become hurricanes (winds of 74 miles per hour or higher), including one to four major hurricanes (category three, four or five, with winds of 111 mph or higher).

An average hurricane season produces 12 named storms, of which six become hurricanes, including three major hurricanes.

The first named storm, Alberto, made landfall in May.

Hurricanes typically strike the U.S. through the lower East Coast and move north along the Atlantic Coast.

#### At Leisure World

A hurricane's impact on Leisure World depends on the storm's path along the Coast; if it veers out across the Atlantic, the storm would have little or no effect.

But if it turns inland, the community could experience widespread wind and rain with power outages and other major damage. Leisure World has a history of both situations occurring.

#### **Preparing for Hurricanes**

The Federal Emergency Management Agency suggests the following common-sense tips for preparing for hurricanes. For more information, visit (www.ready.gov).

- Several days' notice is typically given when there is the possibility that a hurricane will strike. Stay tuned to radio, television or other sources for information on the approaching storm.
- Use the warning time to check your emergency preparedness kit to make sure it contains the suggested items, such as batteries, flashlights, radio, charged cell phone, etc., and replenish items as needed.
- Review your communications plan. Suggestions for a plan can be found at (www.ready.gov/

make-a-plan).

- Make sure to have plenty of water for sanitary purposes such as cleaning and flushing toilets. Fill the bathtub and other large containers, such as buckets, pots and pitchers, with water.
- Secure lawn furniture and other outdoor items.
- As the hurricane approaches, stay inside your home and keep pets indoors. Stay away from windows.
- If notified by local authorities to evacuate your home, listen carefully and follow their instructions.

NOAA tracks individual tropical storms and hurricanes as they develop and predicts their likely paths.

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# Preventing Unwanted Robocalls with Nomorobo

If you've recently noticed an uptick in the number of robocalls you receive on your landline, you're not alone.

Americans received about 4.1 billion robocalls this past May alone – that's roughly 12 calls per person, claims CNBC online.

"Robocalls are unsolicited, prerecorded telemarketing calls to landline home telephones, and all autodialed or prerecorded calls or text messages to wireless numbers, emergency numbers and patient rooms at health care facilities," according to the Federal Communications Commission (FCC).

Many telephone providers offer robocall-blocking technology for landline phones through Nomorobo, a cloud-based service that hangs up on or blocks illegal robocaller or telemarketer calls from calling the intended home phone number.

Nomorobo is not available on traditional analog copper landlines at this time.

#### Sign Up

To sign up for Nomorobo, visit (www.nomorobo.com/signup), scroll to the bottom of the page, and enter your landline carrier and email address into the box. Click the Next button, and continue signing up.

Many telephone service providers include a full list of instructions on how to sign up for Nomorobo on their website. Instructions for Comcast Xfinity customers are available at (www. xfinity.com/support/articles/ nomorobo).

#### **How It Works**

Once Nomorobo is installed, the service screens incoming phone calls to your landline telephone number and automatically hangs up if a call is determined to be from an illegal robocaller or telemarketer. Your phone will ring once, letting you know that the robocall has been stopped.

Wait for a second ring before answering incoming calls, as Nomorobo needs the first ring to detect robocallers. If you only hear one ring and then it stops, a robocaller was just blocked.

#### Who is Blocked?

The only numbers Nomorobo blocks are reported, illegal robocallers, so there's no need to worry about missing an important call, such as from a doctor's office, county weather advisories or other automated messages.

Nomorobo does block political robocalls. To enable or disable this feature, click the edit button next to your number when signed into your account on the Nomorobo website. Nomorobo does not block charity calls.

#### **Nomorobo for Cell Phones**

Nomorobo is also available as an app for iPhone and Android users by downloading it from the App Store or Google Play. Users can choose whether robocalls are identified on the incoming call screen or sent directly to voicemail.

suggestions, send an email to (support@nomorobo.com). It often helps to let Nomorobo know which numbers are producing unwanted calls so they can help block those calls in the future, according to the FCC.



# **Speaker**

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One summer Brotman was announcing strikes from a stadium box, and the following winter, he was addressing the leader of the free world.

"Life has been good to me, and I like to be good to it," he said.

#### **Military Time and Beyond**

Years before his presidential elbow rubbing though, Brotman, like many young men at that time, enlisted in the military right out of high school.

He worked in the Navy on a transport ship based out of San Francisco Bay that took servicemen and their families to Pearl Harbor and returned with the wounded.

With nothing more than a pair of binoculars and his own two eyes, he would stand atop the bow or the crow's nest, the highest lookout point on the ship, and scan the water for mines.

"I felt like John Wayne. The boat's [rocking] and the waves are coming over me, and I'm saying, 'bridge: This is bow lookout. I need some help here. I'm getting sick,'" Brotman said.

After repeated requests, his help arrived in the form of a bucket. His seasickness would always subside though, and he was discharged from the Navy in 1948 after serving two years.

After his discharge, Brotman hitchhiked all the way from San Francisco to Corpus Christi, Texas, and then home to Washington, D.C., accompanied by a buddy. It took him 31 days and cost \$773.

In their crisp, white Naval uniforms, the young men had no problem finding rides from sympathetic travellers looking for a pal with whom to pass the time or confide a story about their own son's military service.

After a stint at the University of Maryland, Brotman rediscovered his love of announcing, which he'd enjoyed in high school, and attended The National Academy of Broadcasting on the G.I. Bill.

His career in announcing and public relations took off, leading to his induction into 11 different Halls of Fame.

#### **Post-Presidential Announcing**

Brotman was dismissed as inaugural parade announcer to the president at the end of 2016, but that hasn't slowed him down.

Since then, he has appeared on several local and national broadcasts, including two guest spots on the TBS channel comedy show, "Full Frontal with Samantha Bee." He also welcomed the national organizers for the historic Women's March on Washington in January 2017.

He's worked as a consultant

for LINK Strategic Partners, a strategic communications and stakeholder engagement firm, since 2015.

To honor him on his 90th birthday, the District of Columbia declared Jan. 9, 2018 as "Charlie Brotman Day."

A Leisure World resident for three years, his daughter, grandson and 95-year-old sister will be in the audience to cheer him on when he takes the podium at Veteran's Park on July 4.

decision-making about their property. By Maryland law, a homeowners' association cannot prevent residents from installing photovoltaic solar panels.

#### **Going Solar**

John Goolkasian and Antonio Rodriguez are Regency residents who adopted photovoltaic solar power at their households.

About a year ago, Goolkasian bought his photovoltaic panels with the assistance of state and national credit programs. Seeing his high electricity bills, especially during summer, he had set out to reduce his use of the public utility. He believed he could either cut back on his use of electricity or produce his own.

The measure turned out to be a sure means of saving money. Some months, Goolkasian pays only \$20 to \$30 for electricity compared to Maryland state's average of \$129, the fourth highest in the nation.

Other months, he pays nothing at all.

He was surprised to find that from time to time, power companies even pay him for the excess electricity he produces.

Rodriguez instead rents his photovoltaic panels. He pays a periodic fee for the rental, and using solar power has brought about only a small decrease in his monthly energy cost, he says.

Still, it's satisfying to see the tax breaks he receives for using renewable energy, he says.

Purchasing his solar panels rather than renting them would have meant waiting many more years for the energy production to recover the cost of the investment.

The rental arrangement is also easier because the company handles any technical problems with the panels, he says.

Both homeowners find solar power to be a convenient undertaking: once the panels are installed, life barely differs from life with conventional power.

Likening solar power to electric cars, Goolkasian says "it's better for society" without requiring a change in lifestyle.

#### **Environmental Benefits**

Indeed, solar energy has benefits to the environment over the energy most residents buy from public utility, according to the Montgomery County Department of Environmental Protection, which says the production of solar energy leaves behind less harmful byproducts and greenhouse gases compared to other fuels, and reduces the country's need to import fuels.

Pepco, the power company serving Leisure World, indicates on its website that in the past year, its energy sources have been mostly nuclear fission, coal and gas.

Furthermore, the Sun is a renewable resource: residents can harness it to keep their homes running with no worries of hastening its depletion.





## From Golf Balls to Ice **Cream Cones**

am writing in response to the golf subsidy letter in the May 18, 2018 edition of the Leisure World News. The letter provides a one-sided opinion versus attempting to show both sides that would include total operating and maintenance costs for the golf course.

The letter states the revenue generated by the golf course and that the golf course's "only cost" is the McFall & Berry Inc., contract. What is missing is the cost to operate and maintain four buildings belonging to the golf community, in addition to the McFall & Berry Inc., contract. There are also costs with salaries and other support given by Leisure World Management Corporation.

Let's accept the letter's figures of \$67 per year per unit subsidy and \$350,000 in revenue from about 500 people playing the 14,000 rounds of golf. Of the 500 people who play golf, how many of them are residents? Let's not count guests.

Out of the 8,000 or so residents living in Leisure World, it hardly justifies maintaining the golf course. I have no idea what value people place on having a golf course in the community. But if the letter had included a trend of membership increasing by a large percentage over the last few years, it may have helped his argument.

While I am not, at this point, advocating shutting down the golf course or any part of it, I would like to see more revenue being generated within the community. With the impending coup d'état, here's a thought for generating revenue using three of the four buildings supporting golfing.

Picture this. The golf pro buildings could be converted into a nice convenience store much like a 7-11 or the old mom and pop corner store. Underneath the convenience store, have a pizzeria.

Let's convert the lounge into a "fast food" café where you can get breakfast beginning at 6 a.m. and extend the hours accordingly. Can you imagine a café that serves pies, cakes, ice cream cones and sundaes and sandwiches within five or 10 minutes? You could even have takeout and delivery service.

The third building, wooden-framed used to store golf carts, could be torn down and a guesthouse built in its place. What would we do with the golf carts, you might ask? Install a chain link fence and put the carts inside.

But Leisure World would have to find a skilled negotiator to make all this happen, and that is another story.

## Less, Not More Golf Subsidy

May 18 letter made claims about the Leisure World of Maryland golf course. Consider a different perspective.

The claim was made that studies available on the internet, show that having a golf course in a community increases its home values. There are indeed several reports on the web about golf courses and real estate values. Reports from the West Coast - one in 1994, and another in 2008 - made this claim. Other such articles question the premise. Let's put these reports into some perspective.

Golf has rapidly declined in popularity nationally in the past 20 years, from 30,000 to 27,000 since 2000, according to a 2015 article in The Washington Post. The number of courses has declined from 16,052 to 15,372, according to ESPN television channel in 2015. So data from before 2000 about enhanced real estate values is highly suspect.

Having a home on a golf course may be important to golfers, but no credible reports are offered to show that value extends to nearby homes. Leisure World of Maryland offers no such "on the course" homes. Only a few high-rise buildings and one other mutual immediately abut the golf course. Attributing such purported benefits to all of our homes is specious at best.

Citing anecdotal evidence that Montgomery Village real estate values plunged 20 to 30 percent after its golf course closed (in 2017), if true, fails to consider any other contributing

No actual examination of sales records for Montgomery Village are provided to support the writer's statement. If it is true, could the announced plan for 488 new homes in Montgomery Village have any bearing on values? Could poor upkeep of homes contribute to a decline in prices? One might as easily and erroneously attribute the 2008 real estate decline here to the presence of our "costly golf course."

Concluding that conversion to a 9-hole course or providing other recreation opportunities of broader appeal would be costlier is also unsupported. No reports or data relating to the value of a 9-hole course are provided to support the writer's stated conclusion. No analysis of the value to a far greater number of Leisure World residents is offered to support the writer's condemnation.

Denigrating the value of "walking trails and dog parks" is not only a red herring, but also deflects thought of such

potential uses as a miniature golf course, picnic ground, outdoor music pavilion or pro course – all of which family members might also find desirable.

Ninety-two acres dedicated to less than 10 percent of residents seems both thoughtless and selfish. Major green space in our midst is truly of high value; hoarding this valuable resource for the benefit of so few makes little sense.

Maintaining 92 acres as a golf course costs close to half a million dollars annually, but it is ludicrous to contend that any other use of this essential landscape would cost the same.

Park land need not be manicured daily; park land need not include sand traps; picnic tables or miniature golf courses need not be tended to daily by a halfdozen highly-paid employees.

There are 11 public golf courses within 15 minutes of Leisure World. Montgomery County funds several (but doesn't help pay for our course). Isn't that subsidy enough for our 500 golfers? Yet we are told we should continue to pay a subsidy to provide more?

Leisure World News is not adding all these advertisers to their content because it needs the money; it is financially sound. They increased their pages by 16 from the previous issue because they can, and understandably want to be even more profitable.

When I attended the May 17, 2018 Communications Advisory Committee meeting, I asked Communications Advisory Committee members in open forum why the important Leisure World Community Corporation Board of Directors, Executive Committee and Advisory Committee meeting schedules were always in the back of the newspaper. I also pointed out that this outlined block did not include that "these meetings are open to all residents."

These two outlined green blocks (see page 63, June 1, 2018 issue) should be permanently removed from the back of the newspaper and instead be enlarged and prominently displayed near the front of the newspaper in the "Governance and Information" section. The outlined blocks should also have a yellow background instead of green, for more visibility.

I understand that advertisers are a priority to the newspaper, but with respect to your own mission guidelines, as described on page two of Leisure World News, it would seem more beneficial to the residents, to permanently display information relating to every aspect of our governance, including meeting schedules, near the front of the newspaper.

Leisure World residents have a right to know where, when and how they are being governed. Leisure World News can afford to demonstrate their flexibility to all residents – that they do indeed value the residents' needs above all.



She currently directs the University of Pennsylvania Benjamin Franklin Scholars in Nursing Program and two clinically based undergraduate inter-

national exchange programs in nursing – one in the U.K. and one in Australia.

In addition, Kagan teaches short-term study abroad for the University of Pennsylvania in partnership with the University of Hong Kong.

Her work is acknowledged nationally and internationally as innovative, sophisticated and clinically relevant.

Kagan received an Honorary Doctorate of Science from Oxford Brookes University in June 2013.

She has a master's in gerontological nursing and a doctorate from the University of California, San Francisco.

#### **Club Information**

FISH is an all-volunteer, service organization that accepts donations of assistive equipment that the organization then lends to residents and employees of Leisure World.

The FISH office is in Clubhouse II. Volunteers are there Monday to Friday from 10 a.m.-4 p.m. (except for holidays). The staff in the E&R office can assist after hours to lend out an item or accept a return or donation.



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## A Few Not So Idle Thoughts about Idling

ay you're picking up a S friend who has difficulty getting around, and so you leave your engine running to go help her downstairs.

"It'll only take a minute," you

Or you're dropping off a package on a hot summer day and leave the engine running to keep the air conditioning on.

Again, you think, "It'll only take a minute."


People give many reasons for idling their car engines without realizing the harm it causes. Consider the following four facts from the Environmental Protection Agency, National Resources Defense Council and the State of Maryland:

• An idling car can release as much pollution as one that is moving, thereby creating dangerous pollutants that are harmful to human health – aggravating asthma, heart

disease, bronchitis and other medical conditions.

- A car idling for just five minutes can emit a halfpound of carbon dioxide. Keeping an engine running while a car is stationary still emits all that CO<sub>2</sub> - a major contributor to climate change.
- · Idling on a warm day with the air conditioning on burns even more fuel than idling without air conditioning. On an 88-degree day, a car probably uses about one-quarter gallon of fuel in 30 minutes, or about 75 cents at a fuel cost of \$3 per gallon.
- Idling for more than five minutes (except under specified conditions) is illegal in Maryland.

So, idling harms human health, the environment and people's wallets by wasting both money and fuel while producing dangerous pollutants and greenhouse gases that

contribute to climate change.

A rule of thumb: If stopped for more than 60 seconds (except in traffic, of course), remember to turn the engine off. It's one way of combatting climate change.

Primary elections choose the candidates who will appear on the general election ballot. Maryland has a closed primary system, which means that only registered members of a party may vote in that party's primary.

Why should Independents go to the polls? Independents may vote for Board of Education candidates. With the critical issues facing the Board of Education, such as how best to allocate finite funding, how to assure pre-K for every eligible child, and how to prepare students for the 21st century workplace, it's important that every eligible voter select the candidate they think is best.

Remember that the ballot for the primary election is long. To save time and prevent long lines, read materials beforehand and mark your sample ballot.





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
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# Boomers Gather for Screening of War Film, Socializing and Snacks

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## Low Power Mode and Apple Pay

any people have awaited Man important phone call only to notice that their iPhone's battery charge was

iPhone users can save what 'juice" they have left by placing the iPhone in Low Power Mode (LPM). To place the iPhone in

LPM, go to Settings > Battery. Slide "Low Power Mode" to green. To turn LPM off, slide back to white.



Users can also turn LPM on and off from their

Control Center. Open Control Center either by swiping up from any screen or down from the top right on iPhone X, and then tap the LPM icon, which looks like a AA battery. Tap the icon to turn LPM mode on and off.

The icon turns white when on and black when off. This method is easier to use and to remember.

Users who haven't already included LPM in their Control Center can do so by going to Settings > Control Center > Customize Controls. Select "Low Power Mode," and then return to Control Center to

verify that it's there.

Keep in mind that while in LPM mode, there is significant performance cost, so use it only when necessary.

When in LPM the following functions are unavailable or sharply curtailed: Hev

Siri, background app refresh, email fetch, automatic downloads, some visual effects, autolock (defaults to 30 seconds) and iCloud photo library (temporarily paused).

Apple

Some other things might take longer or may not work until

you turn LPM off or charge to 80 percent or higher.

### **Apple Pay**

Do you remember the last time you rummaged through your pockets, purse or wallet looking for that special coupon, movie ticket, rewards card, boarding pass or other item? Save the agony by putting all that stuff in the "Wallet" app.

Wallet is Apple's answer to digitizing all those cards and more and securely storing virtual versions of all passes, tickets, coupons and more, so that users can easily access them at any time.

Wallet also holds Apple Pay, which is linked to the user's selected current credit card(s). You use it by holding your iPhone up to the reader. Every transaction requires the user's authentication using either face or touch ID or the passcode.

Apple Watch requires only the user's passcode. The user's card number and identity are not shared or available to merchants or waiters, for example. When making a purchase, the merchant never obtains the user's actual card numbers. Apple Pay uses a device-specific number and unique transaction code. So the user's card number is never stored on their device or on Apple servers.

If paying within apps or online, the merchants only receive information the user authorizes to share for fulfilling an order. Also, when paying with a debit or credit card. Apple Pay doesn't keep transaction information that can be tied back to the iPhone user.





## Pony Express Rides Again

The Pony Express Re-Ride is from Wednesday, June 20, to Saturday, June 30.

To commemorate the historic delivery of mail by the Pony Express, about 750 riders will travel 1,966 miles from St. Joseph, Missouri, to Sacramento, California, with a pouch of mail, called a "mochila."

The riders, all members of the National Pony Express Association, will ride day and night to make the trip in 10 days. Sightseers wishing to see the Pony Express riders are warned that riders may be anywhere from two hours ahead to two hours behind schedule.

Riders will carry commemorative letters in the mochila, this year highlighting Pony Express history in Nevada. The envelopes are marked first class postage carried by the Pony Express with a

special U.S. Postal Service cancellation.

Only the letters actually carried will be available for purchase by stamp collectors (\$5 for a pre-printed commemorative letter; \$10 for a personal letter).


Stations along the way will issue reports on the riders' progress. The National Pony Express Hotline, (1-855-809-8589), will continually issue updates based on reports from riders, support staff, radio ham operators and an interactive GPS map.

This is the longest event held annually on a historical trail in the U.S. The trail runs through eight states, including Missouri, Kansas, Nebraska, Colorado, Wyoming, Utah, Nevada and California.

All this is to commemorate a private enterprise that existed for less than two years, nearly 160 years ago (from April 1860 to October 1861). The business, formally named The Central Overland and California Pikes Peak Express Company, became known as the Pony Express. Owners of the business sought to win a federal mail contract by demonstrating speedy delivery.

The enterprise required the purchase of hundreds of ponies, the establishment of relay stations and the hiring of stationmasters and riders. At the peak of operations, the company employed 6,000 men (including 120 riders), owned 75,000 oxen, 400 ponies, 165 stations, thousands of wagons and many warehouses.

Riders changed horses at each station, about every 10 miles. After 75-100 miles, a new rider replaced the previous rider. In summer, it took about 10 days to finish the route; in winter, 12-16 days, depending upon the weather, a remarkable feat at the time. A stagecoach took 24 days.



Riders earned \$125 per month (\$3,500 in today's money). The cost of mail was very expensive, initially \$5 per half ounce (\$138 in today's money), later reduced to \$1 per half ounce. Customers were mostly banks and newspapers.

Two days after completion of the transcontinental telegraph system, the Pony Express went out of business. It was never profitable. In fact, it lost money – \$30 for every letter it carried, according to the National Postal Museum in Washington, D.C.

Commemorative events help to preserve memories of adventure and excitement in the days of the Old West, even though the Pony Express operated only for a short time.

ANSWER: Black Queen moves to f6. Checkmate!

So, do not wait for a stagecoach. Do not wait for commemorative mail. Do not wait for pony re-rides. Play chess now!
