PPD Changes Call Center's Menu Options

I n an effort to reduce wait times and improve the customer experience, the Physical Properties Department's (PPD) call center, also sometimes referred to as the customer service center, recently made several changes to its call center menu and operations.

The call center's automated option menu has been reconfigured, and callers are now asked to either "press one" to either check on an existing work order or open a new one, or to "press two" if they want to choose another service,

such as insurance claims, landscaping and pest control, trash and recycling, or the showroom.

The goal of the reconfiguration is for staff members to complete a call in just three minutes or less, according to Dave Merritt, senior business/systems analyst for Leisure World of Maryland Corporation.

Since the new option menu was implemented, the average call time has dropped from eight to two minutes.

"People can't stand talking to a computer," Merritt said. "We wanted to minimize that."

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Board Passes 2019 Budget Assumptions

The Leisure World Community Corporation (LWCC) board of directors approved the recommendation from the Budget and Finance Advisory Committee to adopt the 2019 budget assumptions as amended at its June 26 meeting.

The proposed 2019 Community Facilities Fee would be \$174.75 per unit per month within a 2.5 percent consumer price index increase, a \$4.25 increase from the 2018 fee.

The fee increase accounts for a slightly more than \$44,000 overall increase in the landscape/ snow removal, housecleaning services, fitness facility management and pool management contracts.

The board also passed a motion to renew the property and casualty insurance program at a total estimated annual premium of \$2,431,412.

Putting Pen to Paper: Part One Resident Authors Give their Unique Take on Chess, Politics

Ceveral Leisure World authors **S** have recently popped up on the bookshelves of online and brick-andmortar retailers. Here are two.

Bernie Ascher's humorous prose may be familiar to Leisure World News readers from his eclectic Chess Club articles, which begin by presenting a topic other than chess and then connect it to chess over the course of the piece. Each article includes a chess puzzle and its solution.

A few months ago, his collection of short essays was published as a book entitled "Everything Is Chess."

When Ascher started writing Chess Club articles nine years ago, they were aimed at readers who already played chess. To attract new members, he switched to writing more entertaining articles on a wide range of topics.

With research, he says, he can usually find a way to relate any topic to chess.

Something for Everyone

Despite its title and chess puzzles, Ascher would like "Everything is Chess" to be considered a general-interest book rather than a chess book. Most of his readers at Leisure World that he's met are not chess players.

The book is available for purchase online as well as for check out at the "Local Authors" shelf at Aspen Hill Library. Ascher says he doesn't expect his work to be a bestseller, but feels he's been successful.

He hopes readers will enjoy his lighthearted essays as short breaks from stressful lives – and presumably also, if they follow the catchphrase that concludes each piece, that they will "Play chess now!"

From Chess to Politics

Former U.S. State Department officer and university professor Stephen Kane's academic book, "Selling Reagan's Foreign Policy: Going Public vs. Executive Bargaining," examines President Ronald Reagan's and his administration's efforts to mobilize public and congressional support for seven of the president's controversial foreign policy initiatives.

Kane's 26 years at the U.S. State Department, much of which was spent as a public communications specialist, overlapped Reagan's two presidential terms. Kane served under six different presidents in total, from Richard Nixon to Bill Clinton.

Setting the Record Straight

After teaching foreign policy and public communication courses to university students who likened Reagan to great orators of the past, Kane "figured it was time to write a book that challenged the conventional wisdom of Reagan as the 'Great Communicator,' particularly in the field of foreign policy," he says.

"I wanted to separate and make very clear the real-world Reagan from the mythological one that existed in the public mind," he adds.

Published by Lexington Books this past March, "Selling Reagan's Foreign Policy" is Kane's first book and is available online for purchase. The book will also be available at the Clubhouse I library in the coming weeks.

Kane is currently writing a follow-up that examines how past presidential administrations responded to public protest against their policies.

Call Wait Times

A dashboard installed on the wall of the PPD call center tracks the number of calls that are being serviced and on hold at any given moment throughout the day, helping staff members stay mindful of each call's length.

If a caller is still on hold after six minutes of wait time, an automated message asks the caller to leave his or her name, phone number and a message, and informs the caller that a staff member will call him or her back shortly.

Callers who prefer a call back rather than be placed on hold can press a button that places their call in a queue. The caller can then end the call, and PPD will call the resident back later in the order that their call was received.

Field Service

PPD is also in the process of upgrading its field service management system.

Service call technicians will soon carry a tablet that provides information about each customer, such as his or her work order, service history, mutual information and maintenance agreements, appliance models and serial numbers and more.

When a ticket for a work order is opened, the system can automatically schedule the service request and assign it to a specific person, who can then see the request and make updates or changes to it as needed.

The customer receives a thank you call letting him or her

know that the service request has been assigned, the date and time and to whom. The customer can also opt to receive a text message notification when a technician is en route to their home.

When the technician has finished a job, the customer can sign the service ticket and verify the number of hours the technician worked.

"[The customer] can even get a copy of that invoice right then and there, emailed or texted to them," Merritt added.

If the technician is at a customer's home completing a service order but needs a tool or part, the technician has access to PPD's inventory system.

"Not only is [the technician] going to see everything that's sitting in the warehouse, [he or she] is going to see everything that's on every single one of the trucks," Merritt said.

All residents are encouraged to complete the survey and return it to their mutual management office, the Administration Building reception desk or the Education and Recreation office in either clubhouse by close of business on Friday, July 6.

A request for information regarding bulk internet service was recently completed by Leisure World's internet consulting firm Columbia Telecommunications Corporation and will be sent to 98 internet provider companies.

Other Updates

Work has begun on converting the old fitness center in Clubhouse II into a room for ping pong tables,

General Information

PPD's hours of operation are Monday through Friday, from 8:30 a.m.-4:30 p.m., except for holidays. Walk-ins are welcome.

The customer service/call center, walk-in service counter, warehouse and showroom are closed from noon-1 p.m. every weekday. Residents who call after hours with an emergency can press a button to reach the front gate, and a PPD service technician is notified and dispatched to the residence.

PPD generally experiences its highest call volume from 8:30-9:30 a.m. and again from 3:30-4:30 p.m. To minimize the likelihood of a wait time, Merritt suggests calling some time between 9:30-11:30 a.m. or 1:30-3:30 p.m.



Golf Course Controversy

There is land we own. Now it's an 18-hole golf course. To be clear, I am not in favor of eliminating the golf course. The question isn't simply about the cost of the golf course per condo/co-op owner per year. It's about how this resource is now being used and how the owners of this resource want to see it used in the future.

I have read some very vague discussion of "strategic planning" for Leisure World in this



newspaper. A strategic plan is just a tool to get you from where you are to where you want to be. So, what do we want Leisure World to be when it grows up? Eliminating or reducing the size of our golf course is not simply a question of what it costs to maintain it. It is a question of what else we could do with this land. An alternative use of the land might well cost more than maintaining the golf course. But it might also be something the Leisure World community, as a whole, values far more than the current golf course.

Leisure World can't be the first 55+ community that has faced this issue.

Leisure World Amenities

I moved to Leisure World about seven months ago, drawn by affordable housing, beautiful grounds, maintenancefree lifestyle and the numerous activities and amenities, including the golf course.

I have really enjoyed my time here and have participated in clubs, classes and entertainment options. I walk every day on the miles of walking trails, go to the gym, swim, and, yes, I joined the golf course.

I have been puzzled by the recent negative letters to the newspaper regarding the golf course and feel compelled to respond to some of the points raised. Regarding the participation of non-residents on the course, several of the classes I have taken include non-residents (In fact, in two of these classes, there were equal numbers of non-residents and residents). Non-residents pay more to participate, and in the case of the golf course, can only join for the entire season or play with a resident.

One of the letters noted that only about 10 percent of the residents use the course. If the 10 percent threshold for supporting an amenity were applied across the board, I doubt if there would be any amenities, including the walking trails.

Finally, it was noted that there are many public golf courses outside the gates of Leisure World that golfers can take advantage of. There are many recreation centers outside the gates also. Does that mean we should abandon our swimming pools, fitness center and classes because we could go to one outside Leisure World? We moved here to have these opportunities within our gates.

When I moved here, I was told there was something for everyone. Rather than pit one group of residents against another, I think we should celebrate all that our wonderful community offers.






Protect Your Eyes During Fireworks Displays

ccording to the American Academy of Ophthalmology (AAO), fireworks injure thousands of Americans, many of them children, every year.

In the most severe cases, fireworks can rupture the globe of the eye, cause chemical and thermal burns, corneal abrasions and retinal detachments - all of which can cause permanent, severe eye damage.

Those injured by fireworks are not necessarily handling the fireworks. In fact, nearly half of people injured by fireworks are bystanders.

Fireworks Safety Tips

The AAO advises that the best way to avoid a potentially blinding fireworks injury is by attending a professional public fireworks event and respecting the safety barriers at these fireworks shows.

For those who decide to purchase consumer fireworks because they live in states where they are legal, the AAO recommends the following safety tips to prevent eye injuries:

Never let young children

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play with fireworks of any type, including sparklers. • Wear protective eyewear that meets the parameters set by the American National Standards Institute when handling fireworks or as a bystander.

Leave the lighting of professional-grade fireworks to trained pyro technicians. If an eye injury

from fireworks occurs, remember to seek medical attention immediately. Do not rub, rinse or apply pressure to the eyes. Do not remove any objects stuck in the eye, apply ointments or take blood-thinning medications such as aspirin or ibuprofen.



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

July 11: Local Geologist, Engineer and Horticulturist Speaks on 'The Geology of Montgomery County'

According to Lewis, Montgomery County's geologic past has had a rough go during the past billion years. After continental drift and collision with Europe and Africa, the geology of the East Coast changed dramatically.

According to Lewis, his revelations about how and why pieces of Japan and Mt. Everest can be found in today's Montgomery County will give audience members goose bumps.

Montgomery County is situated in Maryland's central Piedmont Province. This province also includes the counties of Frederick, Carroll, Howard, Baltimore and Harford. Most of the rocks and minerals in the Piedmont are gneiss, schist, quartzite, marble, slate, limestone, dolomite, shale, gold, siltstone or volcanic.

Lewis grew up on a Howard County farm. After high school, he studied geology at Susquehanna University in Pennsylvania. His first job was in the oil fields of Louisiana. Eventually, because of his engineering expertise, he moved closer to home when he was hired as supervisor of construction at BWI Airport.

Ultimately Lewis decided to pursue his life-long love of flora, first by studying horticulture at the USDA Graduate School and then by becoming a master gardener through the county certification program.

He also is a certified professional horticulturist, and works for Behnke Nurseries Garden Center in Beltsville, Maryland, where he is garden shop manager.

slicing and trimming rough gem material; cabbing machines for grinding and shaping slabs into performs, and then carving and polishing these performs into finished cabochons.

Members who take shop training will learn how to produce beautiful, shining cabs for use in jewelry settings.



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LW Green More Harm Than Good: Know What Not to Recycle

t's gotten harder to do the right thing when it comes to recycling.

Until recently, China has been the U.S.'s biggest customer for recyclable waste, but it's becoming a fussy customer. China will no longer accept a shipment of recyclable waste that is even one half of one percent (.05 percent) impure, according to an article in the May 29. 2018 edition of the New York Times written by Livia Albeck-Ripka.

To complicate matters, China recently banned used plastic, and now many U.S. municipalities are no longer accepting plastics #3 to #7 - items such as yogurt cups and vegetable oil bottles.

Montgomery County, however, has not yet made this decision and continues to collect plastics #1 through #7, except for #6. Check the bottom of an item to find the number and act accordingly. An entire recycling batch can be contaminated by even one item: one-half of one percent of the batch.

Whether a resident lives in a villa and is responsible for his or her own trash and recycling, or lives in a high- or mid-rise building, everyone can take measures to assure they are recycling the correct items. Here is a list of what not to recycle:

• Pizza boxes – Since much

of the cardboard box seems free of pizza oil, many people think it's acceptable to recycle, but it's not. Toss it down the trash chute.

- Paper coffee cup Have you ever wondered how a paper coffee cup can keep the hot coffee from saturating and collapsing the cup? It's because an invisible polyethylene inner coating lines it. Again, just toss it.
- Food still in container -This seems to happen all the time in many trash room's recycling bins. A yogurt container half full, an ice cream container dripping with gooey, melted ice cream - these

are trash, not recycling. Placing them in with the recycling will contaminate the entire batch, rendering the good intentions of your recycling neighbors null and void.

- Plastic bags Plastic bags plug up waste managers' machinery. Plastic bags are the worst offenders in Leisure World, according to Brad Kline, Vehicle Maintenance, Sanitation and Recycling supervisor. They cost the staff time (and money) to separate all the bags residents throw in with the other recycling items. LW Green recommends residents take their plastic bags with them to the supermarket and toss them into the special receptacles reserved for them.
- Clear plastic carryout containers – If a couple scraps of pad thai are sticking to the plastic container, wash and recycle it. Recycled items need to be reasonably clean. They don't have to be scrubbed spotless, but a good rinsing is recommended.
- Dirty diapers Trash only



LW Apple Club The Magic of Contacts

ften, LW Apple Club members assist residents in the Apple Clinic who keep their friends and family's contact information in scattered locations, such as a Pages list, Numbers list, different email accounts or paper address books.

Storing information in this way can be cumbersome, inefficient and difficult to keep accurate and up-to-date.

Keeping contact information in **Apple's Contacts** keeps all information in one place on all devices and

makes it easier for the user to send emails and messages to individuals and groups.

Some shy away from Contacts because they don't want to enter the data. But consider the time saved and benefits derived; users can also delete outdated information in the process.

Entering Information Into Contacts

To enter information into Contacts, open the Contacts icon - a brown book with colorful tabs on the side.

Click the Add button (+) near the bottom center of the window, and then click on New Contact. A blank "card" appears with First (name) highlighted. Type in the contact's first name, and then then tab to the last name.

Continue down the card, clicking grey areas to enter information, such as home phone, mobile phone, email or home address. There is no need to fill in every field, just what will be most useful.

As a minimum, the Club suggests entering the contact's name, phone number and email address. As time permits, enter in information for all contacts.

Benefits of Contacts

After Contacts is populated, users can do many things with it, such as:

Print addresses on envelopes, including the user's return address, if it is in Contacts.

Print envelope labels and customize the font and even add images, a bonus for making holiday cards.

Print a list of all or selected **Contacts:**

Open Contacts, and then select

contacts desired by highlighting each. Click Command + P to open a print window showing a thumbnail of the printout on the left and several options on the right.

Look at the right side carefully; this Contacts graphic courtesy of is where the user checks what he or

she wants printed from the individual Contact cards. Check what you want printed and uncheck what you don't want. You'll see changes on the thumbnail to the left.

If a field is not completed on

an individual's card, it won't print. From the same pop-up window, select other desired setting, a useful tool if a user wants to share hard copy of the data or create a handout of club members.

Easily send email and text messages by starting to type the contact's name - the rest fills in automatically, or options are provided between

contact users with

LW similar names. Use Siri to call. email or send a text message by name: "Hey Siri, call/email/message Gladys." If the user has more than one Gladys, or if there is more than one phone number, say "Call Gladys Home" or "Call Gladys Mobile."

Create Groups of people, such as family members, Club members or mutual members, to send the same message to

many people at once. A person can be in more than one group.

To create a group: In Contacts, select (+), new group and then enter a name for the group and drag those contacts want into the group. To remove them, drag the contacts out.

Chess Club July Fourth is Big Business

While some 45 million Americans are traveling to celebrate July Fourth this year, the rest are enjoying the holiday closer to home with cookouts, picnics, parades, flags and fireworks.

About 90 percent of those traveling at least 50 miles during the holiday season will drive automobiles, according to the American Automobile Association, and four percent will travel by plane. On average, Americans will travel over 600 miles to reach their desired destinations.

The National Retail Federation estimates that Americans spend about \$7 billion on food and other merchandise to celebrate Independence Day.

More than 65 percent of Americans will attend picnics, and Americans will have approximately 75 million cookouts, according to Fox News.

On this holiday, Americans consume 150 million hot dogs along with roughly 70 million cases of beer. Consumers spend around \$105 million on hot dogs plus \$70 million for the buns, \$37 million for the ketchup and \$25 million for the mustard.

It is the top beer-drinking holiday of the year, accounting for more than five percent of the annual total, according to the Nielsen Company. Expenditures on beer exceed \$1 billion. Wine accounts for another \$560 million.

Many municipalities spend from \$5-30,000 on firework displays, about 16,000 in the entire country, viewed by nearly 45 percent of Americans. New York assigns 5,000 police to maintain public safety during the Macy's parade and fireworks demonstrations.

Some 15 million people watch the New York fireworks on NBC and three million watch along the Hudson River. The nation spends more than \$800 million on fireworks for this occasion.

Three states ban the sale of consumer fireworks: Delaware, Massachusetts and New Jersey. Since 2011, eight states have relaxed restrictions on the sale of consumer fireworks: Kentucky, Utah, New Hampshire, Michigan, New York, Georgia, West Virginia and Iowa.

The American Pyrotechnics Association reported that fireworks-related injuries declined by 43 percent since 2000, when the trend in relaxing consumer fireworks laws began.


According to (https:// wallethub.com/), a personal finance website, 65 percent of Americans own U.S. flags. Ironically, U.S. imports of American flags come predominantly from China, about \$5 million annually.

Americans celebrate the Fourth of July because Congress adopted the Declaration of Independence on that date. (John Adams thought it would be celebrated on July 2.) Britain did not learn of the Declaration until

Aug. 30, 1776, and did not acknowledge independence until the Treaty of Paris in 1783.

Americans celebrated the holiday beginning in 1777. In 1870, Congress made it an unpaid national holiday, applicable only to federal workers in the District of Columbia. In 1885, Congress extended coverage to federal employees outside Washington. It was not until 1938 that Congress made it a paid national holiday for the entire country.

Perhaps the only negative aspect of Independence Day is that people do not receive presents. For chess players, July Fourth is not big business, although various places conduct chess tournaments annually during the holiday, such as New Jersey.




Chess players at Leisure World do not need festivals and special events to play the game.
