National Award-Winning Pickleball Player Set to Compete in Maryland Senior Olympics

n a Fairways South highrise living room, several of the more than 150 medals Jerry Clark has won playing pickleball and other sports over the years meticulously line the inside of his tall display cabinet.

At front and center is the largest and arguably most impressive of them all – the gold medal he received in the pickleball men's doubles event at the 2017 National Senior Games in Birmingham, Alabama. For that achievement, Clark and his playing partner, Tom Henry, were officially recognized with an award presented by Maryland State Sen. James Brochin on behalf of the State of Maryland.

Clark will test his skills

once again when he joins a handful of his fellow Leisure World pickleball players at the Maryland Senior Olympics (MSO), sometimes referred to as the Maryland Senior Games, on Friday, Aug. 24-Sunday, Aug. 26, in Bowie, Maryland, a competition in which he has already won gold in men's doubles for the past three years.

If he wins gold again in his 70-74 age group, he will qualify to compete in the 2019 National Senior Games held in Albuquerque, New Mexico, though he's unsure if he'll be able to attend.

Clark's friend and sometimes partner Scott Keenum, also a Leisure World resident and MSO medal winner, said he recruited Clark to move to Leisure World from Gaithersburg, Maryland, about two months ago because he knew Clark would enjoy all the opportunities to play pickleball and other sports the community offers its residents.

"[Clark's] a very accomplished athlete," Keenum said. 'He's bowled 300 games, made a hole-in-one in golf...we even play bridge together."

A former nationally ranked A- racquetball player, Clark took up pickleball about seven years ago when he walked into a local community center in

Pastry Chef Adds a Touch of Sweetness to **Clubhouse Grille Menu**

R esidents can find a fix for their sweet tooth at the Clubhouse Grille restaurant in Clubhouse I, where a variety of moderately priced desserts, made in-house, are offered up by new pastry chef Michael Porru.

Restaurant-goers can top off their dinner with a slice of chocolate mousse cake, choose between (or share) two kinds of New York style cheesecakes, or even crack their spoon into the caramelized top of a rich crème brûlée.

All three versions of these popular confections are the creations of Porru, who has been concocting desserts for the restaurant for about a month.

"I like to make what I would expect to see on a dessert menu," Porru said. "We come up with new things all the time."

The restaurant's dessert menu also includes a carrot cake with crushed pineapple, golden raisins and walnuts, slathered in a cream cheese icing; a coconut cake made with a splash of coconut rum; a sour cherry crisp and fresh baked bread pudding,

Putting Pen to Paper: Part Two From Russian Ambassadors to Nazi Hunters, Writers Explore Broad Range of Topics

wo more resident authors recently made contributions to the worlds of non-fiction and fiction.

"Here Come the Russians" by Stewart Lillard recounts the period from 1790-1922 when the Russian Empire's diplomats lived and worked closely with American governmental officials and the president.

Lillard's curiosity about Russian diplomats began in 2007 when he visited Decatur House in Washington, D.C. His ancestral roots in Decatur, Tennessee, compelled him to visit the former home of the town's namesake.

The house was rented out to several notable people over many years, including the first Russian ambassador to travel to Washington, D.C. Lillard found the scant details about the ambassador unsatisfying, so he used his experience

researching and writing about history to learn more at the National Archives and **Records Administration and** the Library of Congress.


He says archival research requires a familiarity with the subject and the ability to search in other languages.

The book's cover depicts Eduard Stoeckl, the earliest Russian diplomat of whom the Library of Congress had a photo. Lillard also obtained photos from the Decatur House and relied on his own photography skills as president of the Rossmoor Camera Club.

The manuscript was finished 10 years ago. It turned out to be an awkward length for publication – too long for some formats and too short for others – and Lillard could not find a publisher.

When Russia-U.S. relations came up in the news after the 2016 U.S. presidential election, Lillard retrieved his old manuscript and decided to self-publish instead.

He believes the U.S.'s wariness of Russian influence dates back to the 19th century. Many people, he says, don't realize that Russia was one of the primary countries the U.S. had in mind at the time of the Monroe Doctrine, a policy opposing European attempts

Race, Religion, Revenge

"Alternative Acts" by York Van Nixon III is a novel about an African-American retired police officer who partners with a Jewish attorney who hunts down Nazi war criminals. Both are pursuing the same killer, a former Auschwitz guard who, driven by bigotry, murdered the protagonist's black fiancée.

The novel explores issues of religion and race, and Van Nixon wrote with a political function in mind. Revenge also features prominently.

He says his story contains "no predetermined outcome" for the reader. His manner of writing, inspired by poetry, can be interpreted in multiple ways, he says.

The novel begins in Washington, D.C., but the characters spend significant time in Leisure

World, with details that may be familiar to residents. He portravs the community the way he sees it: almost "an Elysium," he says – a nigh-perfect place for living and writing in a quiet environment.

He chose this setting after meeting another writer at the Writers of Leisure World group who set her own story at Leisure World. He says readers are drawn to settings they recognize, and that using a real location lends realism to a story that might be otherwise unlikely.

Feeling that not enough contemporary fiction aspires to the literary, Van Nixon fills his prose with wordplay and elegance. His crime-fighting team bears names that pertain to their personalities and situations, and he often writes in various dialects.

He believes well-chosen dialogue, rather than narration, should drive scenes in which characters interact.

"You really hear what's going on inside the person's head," he savs.

To Van Nixon, the novel has "something for everyone." It offers action, complex characters and pleasurable prose.

On July 18, Van Nixon held a book signing at the Book Club Network's African Heritage Book Club. He is also working on a sequel.



Did You Know? Leisure World Founder Helped Establish School for Gerontology

n the early 1960s, Leisure World communities became "control groups" for fact-finding

on how people retired and aged in place.

The concept of retirement communities was in its nascent stages, but Leisure World founder Ross Cortese understood that much could be learned from this "experiment."

Thus, in 1964, the Rossmoor-Cortese Institute for the Study of Retirement and Aging was established; it's now known as the USC Leonard Davis School for Gerontology.

It was the first school to offer doctorate, master's and bachelor degree programs in gerontology.

Cortese's vision and philanthropic desire played a crucial role in the school's conception

and, in early June, Cortese was posthumously honored with the unveiling of a plaque installed on a brick wall outside the school.

'We are grateful for his contributions then and for his family's continued support," said Pinchas Cohen, dean of the USC Leonard David School.

State Begins Call Check Pilot Program

Maryland seniors age 65 years and older can apply for a free telephonic service that makes daily checks on participants.

The program, sponsored by the Maryland Department of Aging, is the first of its kind in the country, according to the Department's website. Any Maryland resident who is 65 or older and has a landline or cell phone can apply.

How It Works

Every day a telephone call is placed to a participant at a regularly scheduled time. These calls occur some time from 8 a.m.-4 p.m. as close as possible to the one-hour time block preselected by the participant.

If the participant does not answer the first call, they are tried two more times. If those calls go unanswered, additional calls are made to notify an alternate contact person who is selected by the participant during program enrollment.

The participant's alternate contact person, such as an adult child, neighbor or other loved one, is then encouraged to check on the participant's well being. The participant and his or her alternate contact person must not have automated call-blocking technology, or they must disable that phone feature in order to participate.

How to Apply

Individuals who would like to participate in the program must apply on their own behalf. Information gathered includes the participant's first and last name, county of residence, telephone number, date of birth, name and telephone number of an alternate contact person and a time between 8-10 a.m. or between 2-4 p.m. when the participant prefers to receive a daily telephone call.

Keep the Golf Course

ecently, there have been a **C** couple of opinion articles in the Leisure World News expressing opposition to the Leisure World golf course and associated costs.

I would like to counter those arguments with some relevant facts concerning the positive asset of having a golf course in our community.

From an environmental standpoint, the golf course provides approximately 92 acres of open space, a major asset in any residential development, which we should covet and cherish.

This open space acreage primarily consists of trees and grass, which produce life-sustaining oxygen for all of us.

Further, it provides a beautiful and peaceful landscape

The U.S. Department of Agriculture provides scientific data that one acre of trees provides oxygen for 18 people annually. Also, one acre of trees absorbs eight tons of carbon dioxide and generates four tons of oxygen annually.

Trees provide us with clean air and water, erosion control for better stormwater management, temperature-reducing shade and effective sound barriers, privacy and screening of unsightly views.

Further, if the golf course were abandoned, what assurance would we have that this acreage would be preserved for recreational use, as one letter suggested?

We also cannot be assured that Leisure World would not build several more high-rise structures and homes in that available space.

Certainly, the Leisure World community, with its over 8,000 residents, is at full capacity for infrastructure and amenities. Severe overcrowding would be a likely outcome.

Lastly, the quoted \$67 per unit annual subsidy to maintain the golf course property comes to 18 cents per day per unit – certainly a sum worth paying for all the aforementioned benefits.





FISH (Friends in Sickness and Health)
FISH Offers Free Items

F ISH has walkers and canes to help with walking, wheelchairs to help with transportation and tub stools, also known as shower chairs, and commodes to help with safety in the home. FISH lends these items to residents and employees for free.

Residents thinking of purchasing an item can also borrow it from FISH first to see if it's right for them.

Free Items

FISH tracks certain pieces of equipment, but often gives away other items, such as incontinence items (pads, bed protectors) and pillows, trays for walkers and knee scooters, among others.

FISH stores these items in the Clubhouse II basement outside its storage cage. They are there for anyone to take, including residents and their friends and family members who live outside of Leisure World. FISH recommends checking with a medical professional before using certain items.

FISH Information

The FISH office is open Monday to Friday from 10 a.m.-4 p.m., except for holidays. The phone number is (301-598-1345).

After hours, an E&R staff member answers the call and can accept returns or help with a loan. If you are looking for Lost and Found, be sure to let them know. The found items are stored in the FISH closet.

It all began in July 1968, when 17 residents successfully entertained other residents on the Clubhouse I lanai. Shortly afterward in August, the Fun and Fancy Theatre Group was founded by Jessie Powell and 75 charter members.

At first, the Group offered skits, revues, one-act plays and other shows written and directed by members. Fun and Fancy presented its first three-act play, George Kelly's "The Torchbearers," in 1970.

These early productions were presented in the now Clubhouse I Crystal Ballroom, which had, at the time, a huge fireplace in its center. The Group used a portable stage, and sound and lights were minimal. Proceeds from the productions were used to make improvements to the stage and to build storage units for costumes and props.

Outreach Program

It was during this period that Fun and Fancy's outreach program was born to provide free musical entertainment to the entire community. The Club began providing entertainment for the monthly birthday dinners and for one or two community theatres sponsored by the E&R Department each year.

These were usually one-hour revues, one-act plays, or a combination. Revenue from these shows went directly to the community via the E&R Department. Fun and Fancy also provided free entertainment at functions sponsored by Leisure World organizations and at senior facilities outside of Leisure World.

The outreach program continues to be very active today, providing entertainment both inside and outside of the community.

Group Goes Pro

By 1971, the first attempt at raising money for a permanent theatre began, and admission was charged for productions. Acting and stagecraft workshops taught by professionals were held.

In 1973, the Group hired non-resident, paid director, Billie Jordon. She directed two shows a year until 1976. The Group then hired Carol Hillmann, who remained its director for several years. From then on, the Group has staged two plays a year, usually a Broadway musical in the fall and a comedy or straight play in the spring.

During the 1980's, the Group made contributions to Clubhouse I to purchase stage lights, microphones and a new piano to be used by the whole community. A \$3,000 donation was made to the Foundation of Leisure World to provide equipment for a theatre, which would be part of Clubhouse II when it was built.

In addition, \$5,000 was put into a special savings account to be used when needed for donation purposes. In 1981, the IRS recognized Fun and Fancy Theatre Group as a tax-exempt 501(c)(3) charitable and educational organization to which tax-deductible contributions may be made.

Fun and Fancy Today

Education and training in the various aspects of theatrical production remains the Group's focus.

Workshops in lighting, sound, make-up, set design, dancing, singing and acting have been offered to members and non-members over the years. Members also learn by participating in monthly meetings and outreach programs.

Revenue from the semi-annual shows, donations and membership dues are used to finance Fun and Fancy's activities. The Group uses these funds, in excess of operating expenses, for the benefit of residents and their education in the performing arts.

Donations have been made to purchase equipment used in both clubhouses and to support community causes. In addition, Fun and Fancy has an ongoing scholarship program to aid deserving students in the performing arts.

■LW Green Plastics, Plastics Everywhere

W hen people shop at grocery stores, they often bring home purchases that are wrapped in some kind of plastic film. How does a person know if the plastic is recyclable or not?

Come to the next LW Green meeting on Wednesday, July 25, at 2 p.m. in Clubhouse I to learn more about recycling plastics.

Resident and chemical engineer Fred Shapiro will answer members' questions about plastics' fabrication and recycling and reuse possibilities.

As a chemist and a technical consultant to the packaging and printing industries, he advised companies on best products, practical usage and environmental issues and compliance.

He has taught about plastics and the environment in many locations in the U.S. and Europe.

This promises to be an interesting presentation that will teach attendees how to increase their recycling and keep recyclable items out of the waste stream.

Recycling Tips

Below is a list of other recycling tips:

- Place only clean bottles, cans and containers into recycling bins.
- Look for the numbers 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, and 7 within the recycle symbol; do not put #6 items in recycling bins.
- Plastic straws cannot be recycled. Keep a package of paper straws in your car and use as needed when out and about. Plastic straws and film products are among the worst offenders in the plastics pollution of waterways and oceans boat propellers get fouled in them, and fish and mammals get tangled in them or mistake them for food. Some birds have fed pieces of plastic film to their babies because, when floating in the

water, they resemble fish. Make every effort to contain all these products in closed recycling bins or in the trash if not recyclable.

- Avoid using Styrofoam and other plastic containers at restaurants by bringing your own container for leftovers.
- Plastic utensils are also big pollution culprits. Wrap and bring a cutlery set or two from home to use at any events where the plastic cutlery is offered.
- Carry your own water bottle with you everywhere. Plastic water bottles are a major cause of plastic pollution, and the vast majority is not recycled. They end up in the waste stream where they can take 450 years to decompose, according to the National Oceanic and Atmospheric

Administration Marine Debris Program.

- Plastics are petroleum products. Residents who want less drilling and fracking for oil
 - should use less plastic.
 Consider driving a fuel-efficient car to reduce demand for oil. Every drop counts.




Danuta Montorfano read a lovely poem, "Gifts from Nature," in gratitude for butterflies and fireflies.

LW Apple Club The Magic of Contacts: Part Two

• he Apple iPhone user has L many more options than just adding a name, phone number and email to a contact card. The user can also add ringtones, addresses, images and notes.

Ringtones

Ever wonder who's calling when your iPhone is ringing

in the other room or at the bottom of your bag. By setting up a different ringtone for frequent callers, the user knows by the sound of the ringtone if he or she wants to answer.

tesy of Ron Masi Here's how: Open Contacts > select individual's card > edit > ringtones > select from over 50 ringtones in the dropdown menu. Click "done."

Address

Users who have completed an address on a Contact card by clicking the pin icon (right of address) will get a map of the area around that address.

The user can use the map to get directions to that address, or they can use the Hey Siri function. They can also change the map's type between Map, Transit map or Satellite map by clicking the boxes at top right.

By clicking the directions tab at top left, the user can get directions to that address and also specify if they want Walk, Drive or Transit directions. Even traffic information is available at bottom left.

Of course, users don't have those capabilities if their address is not filled out on the Contacts card. Here's how

to add addresses: Contacts > select individual's card > edit > you'll notice gray spaces for Street, City State, Zip and Country. To the left of Street are the Contacts graphic cour-Work, Home, Other

> and Custom option use the tiny up/down arrows to select the appropriate one.

> Then fill in the data in each identified block, but don't be tempted to save time by pasting everything into one category.

Images

If the user has added an image to a Contact card, it is visible on that card and on incoming emails and messages. An image serves to remind the user who the contact is, the age at which they met the person and other information.

Adding an image can seem more complicated than it really is. The user has many ways to add an image, but here is one that is often used:

First, drag the picture/image from where it is in Photos, Email or other application, to the desktop. Open Contacts > select the individual's card > Edit > drag image from desktop into the gray circle (left of contact's name). A larger image appears in a box. Adjust the LW image to fit the

circle. To zoom in or out: Drag the slider to position picture. Drag it around within the circle. When it fits, select Save > Done.

Other ways to add an image are included in Current, Defaults, Camera and Photos.

Birthday/Anniversary

Have you ever forgotten important dates like birthdays and anniversaries?

There's an easy fix in Contacts. By adding these dates to the individual's Contact card, the user is reminded of the date with a screen message; the date also shows up in the Calendar.

In Contacts, select contact > Edit > select Anniversary/

Birthday/Custom > enter date or event > Done. When done, go to Calendar, select Preferences and then check the Show Birthdays Calendar (near the bottom), and the new birthday will appear on the Calendar.

Note

Apple

Note is useful for users who want to include something they should remember about

the person, like a pet's name, where and when they met the person – anything the user wants to recall about that person.

In Contacts, select contact, and then at the bottom of the

card, type or paste in the area called Note. Note is the only entry the user can add to or change without first clicking the Edit button.

Chess Club Throwing Checks vs. Calling Checks

Stanley Cup" is not the name of a hockey player. It is the name of the trophy awarded to the champion team in the National Hockey League (NHL).

This year, the Washington Capitals won the Cup for the first time since 1998. It took 20 years for Washington, D.C., to build a top notch winning team. Oddly



enough, they won the championship series against a team that's been in existence for only one year – the Golden Knights of Las Vegas, Nevada.

In the National Sports of Canada Act of 1994, Canada recognizes ice hockey as its national winter sport. Lacrosse is its national summer sport. The regular NHL hockey season begins in October and ends in April, but the playoffs do not end until June, which is not exactly in winter.


The Stanley Cup is named after Frederick Arthur Stanley, known as Lord Stanley of Preston, a British politician who became the sixth Governor General of Canada in 1888. Stanley became intimately involved in amateur hockey and beginning in 1893, he donated the Cup to Canada's top-ranking ice hockey club.

Over the years, it has become the trophy for the playoff winner of the professional NHL. The current Stanley Cup, made of silver and nickel alloy, stands 35.25 inches and weighs 34.5 pounds, making it a challenge to hold it over your head and skate around the rink with it in celebration.

When the Cup originally was designed, Canada had been a country for only about 20 years. The British Act of North America established Canada as a single Dominion on July 1, 1867, merging three colonies: New Brunswick, Nova Scotia and the Province of Canada (later divided into Ontario and Quebec). Thus, Canada became a self-governing entity within the British Empire.

Eventually, Canada grew from four provinces to 10 and became fully independent in 1982, almost 100 years after creation of the Stanley Cup. Canada celebrates its independence day on July 1. In 1879, Canada named the national holiday Dominion Day. In 1982, Canada renamed the holiday Canada Day.

Some places in Canada celebrate both July 1 and July 4 with



fireworks. Canadians charge that Americans know less about Canada than Canadians know about the U.S. In fact, Americans sometimes accuse Canadians of thinking of its country as the 51st state.

In Leisure World, chess is played on solid ground, usually indoors. No need to wear skates or other equipment. No need for a 35-pound trophy. Players simply seek intellectual stimulation and appreciate the beauty of the game.

The U.S. does celebrate a National Chess Day on the second Saturday of October. President Gerald Ford proclaimed the first National Chess Day in 1976. Chess enthusiasts celebrate by playing chess. Numerous chess tournaments are held on that day.

In the game pictured on this page, White can force checkmate in three moves. Do you see it?

The answer follows this reminder that the Chess Club meets on Monday, Wednesday and Friday from 1-4 p.m. in Clubhouse II. Membership is free. For further information, call Bernie Ascher at (301-598-8577).

ANSWER: White moves the Rook from d2 to d7, threatening the Black Queen. Black moves the Queen to e4. White then moves the Queen to f7, checking the King. Black's only move for the King is to h8. White's Queen captures the Black Bishop at f8. Checkmate! (If Black's Queen captures White's Rook at d7 instead of moving to a safe square (e4), White still wins by checkmate, capturing the Black Queen at d7 with the same result.)

So, do not wait for a 35-pound trophy. Do not wait for a firework celebration. Do not wait for National Chess Day. Play chess now!




