The Inter-Faith Chapel strives to be "A House of Prayer for All People" and, thanks to the crafty help of some volunteers from the wood shop, it's continuing to live up to its moniker.

Rick Kaiser, Bob Namovicz, Dave Miller and Paul Scheible, four volunteers from the wood shop, are working together to remodel a few of the Chapel's pews to provide handicap accessibility for up to six congregants, so that those in wheelchairs or scooters can easily find seating.

"We wanted to make it feel

inclusive," Kaiser said, adding that currently handicapped congregants must either sit in the back of the Chapel or in the aisle.

To achieve their goal, the volunteers are shortening the length of some of the pews and constructing new wooden end caps for them, before reinstalling them near the center of both the right and left sides of the Chapel's sanctuary.

Redesign Project

The modified pews are just one part of a larger redesign project planned for the Chapel's sanctuary and vestibule,

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Board Approves Cloud-Based Field Service Software for Physical Properties Department

The Leisure World Community Corporation (LWCC) board of directors unanimously approved the recommendation of the Budget and Finance Advisory Committee, Physical Properties Department (PPD) Advisory Committee and management to purchase AgileField software licenses for PPD at its regular meeting on July 31.

The motion states that the 2018 Contingency Fund will provide \$62,500 for AgileField's software and equipment. PPD technicians will use AgileField's cloud computing software and equipment, such as tablets, as part of their field service management system.

Switching from current field service product, Optsy, to a cloud-based product like AgileField has benefits that include shared folders and document recovery, automatic software updates and increased security, among many others, according to a report provided to the LWCC board by Dave Merritt, senior business/systems analyst for Leisure World of Maryland Corporation.

Aztec Calendar Stone Reproduction Ensconced in Montgomery Mutual's Boardwalk

I t may be that no one adheres to its cosmology any longer, nor worships the deity depicted in its center, but the 800-pound likeness of the famous Aztec Calendar Stone continues to adorn the Broadwalk in Montgomery Mutual.

The stone reproduction belonged to John Harlan, who lived in Montgomery Mutual during the community's early years.

In an interview published in a 1971 edition of Rossmoor News (the forerunner to Leisure World News), Harlan explained that he received the reproduction as a gift from the Mexican government for his legal services to Mexican industry.

"I had expected a much smaller copy of the calendar, perhaps six inches in diameter," he said. "I was stunned when this one arrived on a railroad car."

The stone is so large that Harlan ended up renting a moving van just to transport it to his home in Bethesda. When he and his wife later prepared to move to Leisure World, they considered donating it to the Smithsonian Institution in Washington, D.C. But they found it too difficult to part with.

The Foundation of Leisure World was enthusiastic to have the special gift on Leisure World grounds and funded the transport of the three and a half-foot stone.

Historical Context

Three and a half feet is yet small in comparison to the imposing original, which measures almost 12 feet in diameter. It is on display at the National Anthropology Museum in Mexico City, Mexico.

The Stone was found underground in 1790 during work on a cathedral in Mexico's Plaza Principal, according to 20th century archaeologist Enrique Juan Palacios.

The discoverers planned to rebury it, but the viceroy ordered that it be given to researchers and put on public display.

At the center of the Aztec Calendar Stone, also called the Stone of the Sun, is an Aztec deity, which, according to the Getty Research Insti-

tute website, is the god of either the sun or the earth.

The Stone's surrounding concentric circles represent the movement of astronomical bodies and are inscribed with dates.

Although it displays 20 days of the 260-day Aztec year, the Stone was not used

as a calendar, according to the Getty Research Institute. Rather, it was an altar for the Aztecs' well-known ritual sacrifices.

Leisure World's unbloodied reproduction, on the other hand, merely sits in silence near one of the community's peaceful walking paths.

Several software vendors were considered, but AgileField won out over its competitors because of the automatic inventory it can provide PPD's warehouse, according to Thomas Snyder, assistant general manager of PPD facilities and services.

Bulk Internet

The LWCC board also passed a motion asking management to seek an arrangement during negotiations with any future internet provider that would allow the community to be charged a master fee, which would then be billed to those residents who use the service.

Proponents of billing only residents who use the internet service said that some segments of the Leisure World population are already part of another internet plan/package, or don't use internet service at all, and therefore would by unduly charged.

Management is currently reviewing approximately 1,500

resident responses to a survey concerning internet/broadband service utilization that was sent to all Leisure World residences in late June.

The survey's results will help the LWCC board evaluate the potential advantages of seeking bulk-rate internet service for the community.

Strategic Planning

The Special Strategic Planning Committee (SSPC) has received a proposal from a consulting company and anticipates receiving more before Friday, Aug. 3, the committee's due date for proposals, said SSPC chairperson Arthur Popper.

The LWCC board tasked the SSPC in April 2017 with developing a long-range strategic plan for the Trust. Approximately two months ago, the SSPC submitted a request for proposal from 17 consulting companies who have expertise in strategic planning for communities.

Upon completion of the bidding process, the SSPC will recommend its preferred

consultant to the LWCC board of directors for approval, and a contract issued for work on the strategic plan is tentatively expected by Thursday, Nov. 1.

Mutual 11 Crosswalk

A request by the Mutual 11 board through the Security and Transportation Advisory Committee (STAC) to approve the installation of a crosswalk at the intersection of Adderley Court and South Leisure World Boulevard was recently submitted to the LWCC board.

At its July 31 meeting, the board passed a motion to postpone a vote on a resolution that directs Mutual 11's request be sent back to the STAC for further information on pricing and distance from other crosswalks.

Other Updates

- Flooring work to help convert the old fitness center in Clubhouse II into a room for ping pong tables is expected to begin in early August. The ping pong tables are currently located in the Multi-Purpose Room in Clubhouse II.
- Roof and sprinkler pipe work at the MedStar Health medical center has been delayed because of inclement weather.
 Work will be performed on nights and weekends, weather permitting, and will not impact use of the facility.

The next meeting of the LWCC board of directors is Tuesday, Aug. 28. The board will start the meeting at 9 a.m. and anticipates going into closed session. The open session is scheduled to begin at 9:45 a.m. Unless they are legally closed, meetings are open to all residents.

surrounding hallways and the meditation chapel that includes reupholstered choir chairs, new carpeting, electrical work and updated outdoor signage.

"What we are trying to do is update the setting to keep it engaging, while maintaining the traditional character of this special place of worship," said Dr. Woodie Rea, senior minister.

Instead of the bright shade of crimson that pops out from the Chapel's pews and floors, congregants will see more muted colors that complement one another.

"It's going to be more relaxing," Kaiser said. "More meditative and contemplative."

Initial improvements to the Chapel, which included new lighting in the sanctuary and a sound system, began about a year and a half ago and coincided with the celebration of the Chapel's 50th anniversary, when many Chapel members and friends made donations.


This is the first major renovation to the Chapel to include carpeting and pews, according to Rea.

Kaiser, who does design work for churches on the side, offered his volunteer services to the Chapel after feeling inspired by the hours he himself has spent sitting in its pews.

"You come here and there's a choir, great musical program [and] both pastors are amazing," he said.

The Inter-Faith Chapel's redesign project is scheduled to be complete by Labor Day, Monday, Sept. 3.



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Explanation of 2019 Leisure World Annual Budget

esidents of Leisure World K of Maryland (LW) pay monthly fees for the upkeep of the community. Therefore, it might be helpful to have a basic understanding of what's in the budget, because that's what the fees are based on.

Two budgets affect each homeowner: (1) the Leisure World Community Corporation (LWCC) budget, and (2) the budget of each resident's mutual. "Mutuals" are the 29 individual common ownership communities – 27 condo associations, a co-op, and a homeowners association - that make up the Leisure World Trust.

The LWCC budget contains the income and expenses of the common, or "Trust," property, including the clubhouses, Administration Building, golf course and other properties. Similarly, each mutual budget covers its own operating expenses, such as landscaping and painting.

To handle the day-to-day

work in Leisure World, LWCC for approval. created the Leisure World of Maryland Corporation (LWMC), which currently has about 230 full- and part-time employees. LWMC is headed by a general manager (GM), who is accountable to the LWCC board of directors.

LWMC has also been hired by each of the 29 mutuals to be its agent, so LWMC works for your individual mutual as well as for the LW Trust.

Each year, the GM and his staff prepare a proposed budget for LWMC. The LWMC proposed budget is reviewed by many of the LWCC advisory committees such as the Physical Properties Department (PPD) Advisory Committee, Education and Recreation (E&R) Advisory Committee, and the Security and Transportation Advisory Committee (S&T).

The Budget and Finance **Advisory Committee also** reviews the proposed budget, and a forum is held for resident input. The LWMC budget is then submitted to the LWCC board of directors

Likewise, the proposed budgets for the individual mutuals are submitted for approval to each mutual's board of directors. Of course, each mutual budget is different from all the others. so each mutual's monthly fees vary, as well.

The LW budget is made up of a Community Facilities (CF) component and a Mutual Operating (MO) component.

CF includes services provided directly to the residents, and fees are charged on a per unit basis, so each unit owner pays the same amount, regardless of the size, age or location of their unit.

MO includes services that are provided to the mutuals, and fees are charged based on a contract with each mutual. The "Revenue Components" section of this article provides further details.

The operations of Leisure World are divided into "cost centers" such as E&R and PPD. Each of these cost centers usually has some

source of income and some expenses. For example, PPD should take in as much in revenue as it pays out in employee salaries and equipment, but that doesn't always work in practice.

Therefore, each resident has to pay a share of the PPD net loss, if any. The same is true for the cost of LW administration, the golf course and all the other facilities in the community. Careful monitoring of the cost centers is critical to the budget process.

The LW budget and the mutual budgets are extremely important to review and understand. Each resident has a say in what should be included in the budgetsacting through mutual or advisory committee representatives and/or attending meetings and expressing opinions directly to the decision makers. The more that is included, such as a proposal to add something new, the higher monthly resident fees must be. The more that is either eliminated or streamlined—or that increases income, such as higher user fees for the indoor swimming pools—the lower resident monthly fees could be.

REVENUE COMPONENTS Community Facilities

Fees: The Leisure World **Community Facilities Fees** and Expenses amount to \$174.75 per unit, per month in 2019. The chart at the top of page 5 shows the breakdown for 2018 and proposed amount for 2019 as a percent of the total and the allocation per unit, per month.

Again, keep in mind that this represents the net revenue required to fund that category, so if there is income (such as golf course greens fees or pool fees), it has already been deducted.

A specific example would be the indoor swimming fees expected to be collected in 2019; all fees collected are used to reduce costs for that cost center (in this case, the E&R part of the

budget). Total expenses in excess of the revenues are the residents' cost. This cost is divided by the number of billing units and are included in the Community Facilities Fee portion of your monthly mutual payment.

Once again, this Community Facilities Fee is only part of a resident's monthly mutual fee. The remainder of the monthly fee is made up of direct mutual costs.

Mutual Operating Fees:

This revenue is generated from direct expenses charged to the mutuals based on their Management and Operating Agreements with LWMC. It includes such costs as payroll and overhead costs incurred by LWMC in their work for the mutuals. It also includes such items as lawn mowing and snow removal. The fees for each mutual vary, depending on the services used.

PPD Services: This represents fees earned by the PPD from direct charges to residents and mutuals for work performed. It includes such things as maintenance agreement contracts with residents and specific work requested by a mutual or resident.

Other User Fees: This category includes revenue generated by other fees such as golf course greens fees, indoor swimming pool fees and registration fees for classes.

Employees: Personnel expense is the largest single expense associated with managing the community (employees are those retained by LWMC, not by any outside contractors). The chart at the bottom of page 5 summarizes personnel in each department. The employee numbers are expressed in FTEs (fulltime equivalents), meaning part-time employees are added together and converted to equivalent full-time positions.

Contracts with Outside Vendors: A number of significant contracts for rental income or for work

This article was designed to provide Leisure World residents with a simplified and concise explanation of the budget process and a brief summary of projected revenue and expenses for the coming year.

Each of the line items has multiple supporting documents showing details, and a copy of the full budget is available on the Leisure World of Maryland residents' website (residents.lwmc.com). Printed copies for review only are available in the Administration Building, the E&R offices of both clubhouses, and the Rossmoor Library in Clubhouse I.

Residents with questions or comments about the budget are encouraged to attend an open forum on Thursday, Aug. 9, at 3 p.m. in Clubhouse I.



eisure World is a selfgoverned community. so several discussions and decisions occur at its monthly Leisure World Community Corporation (LWCC) board of directors meetings that residents may find informative.

Comprised of residents who represent each of the 29 mutuals, the LWCC board of directors is a voting body that controls the annual budget, makes decisions regarding major contracts and projects and determines Trust policies, programs and services.

Each mutual sends at least one representative from its board to sit on the LWCC board of directors. Board members volunteer their time and leadership to sustain the community.

But every resident has a responsibility to stay abreast of the community's governance activities.

The LWCC board of directors meetings are open to all residents. The next meeting is scheduled for Tuesday, Aug. 28, at 9:45 a.m. in Clubhouse I.

Residents may attend to listen to the proceedings or to comment on agenda items upon which no action was taken, community policies, or the operations of the LWCC facilities during the meeting's open forum section.

The Board of Directors folder therein contains the meeting agendas and minutes for 2017 and 2018, which may be downloaded, printed or viewed online. An upcoming meeting's agenda is typically posted on the website a few days before the meeting is held.

Residents who have not signed up on (residents.lwmc. com) can still receive a hard copy of an agenda, minutes or other document by contacting

their mutual's manager or assistant, or by inquiring at the Administration Building.

Video Broadcast

Residents who are unable to attend a meeting can catch its playback on channel 974 the following week. Board of directors meetings are broadcast on Monday, Wednesday and Friday the week after the meeting. All broadcasts are at 4 p.m. and 7 p.m.

Residents can contact their board representative by email, letter, phone, or in-person. Residents can find the name and contact information for the board of director for their mutual by contacting their mutual manager or assistant, or by calling (301-598-1000).

Leisure World **Board and** Management Showing Contempt for Residents

n Nov. 30, 2017, the Leisure World **Community Corporation** (LWCC) board of directors and management asked the Montgomery County Planning Board to approve their plans for a new Administration Building, despite much opposition from the residents of Leisure World.

The Planning Board refused to do what the LWCC board and management wanted. Instead, they deferred action and the Planning Board members told the LWCC board and management the following:

One Commissioner said, "It doesn't seem like there's consensus in the community. It's difficult for us to move ahead," and "Have better discussions and consensus," and the project was "not meeting the needs of the residents" who are paying the bills.

Another Commissioner said, "Our most successful projects are when the applicant truly engages the community," and "Talk to the people who live there and make consensus," and "It's just bad that you don't have your community behind you. It's your job to make sure you have engagement."

The Planning Board Chair said that the project was "not well considered.'

So what did the LWCC board and management do? They ignored all this good advice from the Planning Board. Instead, they made

very slight changes in the plans for the Administration Building, and then met with small groups of mutual board members, ignoring the vast majority of Leisure World residents.

According to a report handed out at the May 2018 LWCC board meeting, "The primary focus of the presentation [to mutual boards] was to update residents on the status of the site plan." How can such one-way communication possibly fulfill the Planning Board's recommendations?

Soon, the LWCC board and management will go back to the Planning Board. I suspect they will claim they complied with what the Planning Board members requested them to do last November. If so, they will not be telling the truth.

It's not too late. If the members of the LWCC board and management really cared about the residents of Leisure World, they could schedule a town hall meeting. They could seriously consider compromises, such as making the new building a third Clubhouse for the use of residents. They have already changed the plans for the new building many times. They can make this change to benefit Leisure World residents.

The LWCC board and management claim their plans will make it easier for residents to walk to Clubhouse I from the parking lot. If they

made the new building a third Clubhouse, it would be far easier for residents to park anywhere in the parking lot and walk just a few feet to the clubhouse. Then, all or part of the existing Clubhouse I could be used to make more room for staff.

That – more room for staff – is the real goal of building the new Administration Building, as stated by management in the February 2017 LWCC board agenda packet.

I suspect the LWCC board and management will continue to ignore the huge number of Leisure World residents who do not want a new Administration Building to be built, and instead want a new clubhouse for the benefit of Leisure World residents.

I believe this will prove that the LWCC board and management have contempt for Leisure World residents.

communications in both directions is critically important for the future of our community!

I pointed out that it was very hard for residents to find contact information to enable them to easily get in touch with various administrators to share thoughts. I pointed out that there was no listing of individual department heads.

Moreover, even though a growing proportion of Leisure World residents communicate via email, there was no listing of email addresses for various Leisure World units to enable easy contact with people in Leisure World administration.

Within days of my letter I received a very nice email (note, email!) from general manager Kevin Flannery telling me that email addresses would be available very shortly both in Leisure World News and on the web in order to facilitate communications. And, as promised, the Leisure World News has a listing of new general email

addresses for five administrative offices. These have also been added to (residents. lwmc.com).

I do appreciate this effort, but it does not go nearly as far as I think is needed to enhance Leisure World communications. What residents need is not an email address that goes to "administration," but a direct email to specific individuals in each administrative unit (e.g., the head of the unit) with their names and job titles.

Moreover, I am concerned about who receives the emails sent to these new general addresses. How does one ensure that the material ever gets to the head of the administrative group? Indeed, the motivation for my earlier letter was that I specifically wanted to write to the head of the Physical Properties Department (PPD) to praise several staff members.

While we now have a generic email for PPD, we still have no idea if the administrator really ever sees the material. And, what if I

wanted to criticize someone and that is the very person who first gets the email to the anonymous address?

In contrast to the seeming lack of interest in direct and easy email communication with residents, other organizations seem to encourage communication from vastly larger groups of people. As an example, last week I wanted to complain about something to do with (www.amazon. com). I quickly and easily discovered that Jeff Bezos, the CEO of Amazon, not only has his email address widely available on the web, but that he writes that he wants people to send him issues so that his immediate staff can ensure that the issues are addressed.

I have found similar things with (believe it or not) the CEO of Comcast (and I had my issue resolved unbelievably quickly), Dell Computer, and many other major corporations. If Jeff Bezos can publish his email address, why can't the general manager and the heads of the

Leisure World departments?

I appreciate that management does not have a large staff to respond to emails. However, I suspect that they will not get inundated with emails. At the same time, since two-way communication would greatly enhance the living experience at Leisure World, I trust that creative ways can be found to deal with email. Moreover, perhaps getting emails and hearing from more residents will give our administrators and others a better sense of the community. And this communication will let residents feel they are more aware of what is happening in our community.

Right now, a very good baby step has been taken to improve communications, but bigger steps can be taken quickly by just listing names and contacts for critical people and enabling residents to know who works for them, and that they have a route to share thoughts and opinions and get help.





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

The Low Vision Support Group is for residents who have low or impaired vision and want to share tips or insight on living with the condition. It's not



FISH is a volunteer, service organization that lends assistive equipment, such as walkers and wheelchairs, to Leisure World residents and employees.

In practice, the organization does not pursue its loans. If a person continues to need an item, FISH is happy to let them keep using it.

Borrowed Items

Residents who have stored away an item that they are no longer using, such as a commode, walker or even wheelchair, are asked to return it to the FISH office in Clubhouse II.

Borrowers are also asked to remind other members of their household that an item belongs to FISH. Items that belong to FISH have a sticker on them that reads "property of FISH" and an inventory number.

Donations

All of FISH's medical equipment is donated. FISH also accepts other useful medical items that it gives away.

Giveaway items are stored in the Clubhouse II basement, to the left of the FISH storage area. Residents and employees may take these items without returning them.

Compassion and Choices holds its next meeting on Wednesday, Sept. 5, at 2 p.m. in Clubhouse I.

How far would you go to sustain the life of someone you love, or your own? When the moment comes and you're confronted with the prospect of "pulling the plug," do you know how you will respond? The real decisions of how people die are made quietly behind closed doors, increasingly on the floors of America's intensive care units (ICU).

From tomato cake to cucumber salad, gardeners have found many inventive ways to use their crops, and they all sound delicious. Attend the potluck and lets all share in the hard work we have done to accomplish such terrific dishes.

Weeds

The fastest growing crop this year seems to be weeds, according to Elena Peterson, field supervisor inspector. Gardeners are asked to remove their garden's weeds as needed. If left alone, they take over and spread into other gardens.

Some gardeners seem to have their weeds under control, but unfortunately, the weeds seem to have the upper hand in the majority of the garden plots.

Remember to weed both inside and outside your fence line. McFall & Berry Inc. doesn't want to get too close to the plots' fences for fear of cutting them.

not permitted to grow small trees and bushes in the garden plots. Small bushes, such as roses, should be trimmed and kept within the confines of the plot's fences.

Gardeners should also prune bushes so that they do not cast a shadow or shade another garden. Planting should not exceed five feet.

Remember that under current garden plot rules, 75 percent of the garden should be in ground planting. Approximately four-six planters are acceptable. A couple of pots, used as planting boxes, are also acceptable, as long as they drain well and are planted and not left barren.

Occasionally a basket or other planting container can be used as long as the item follows these potting guidelines.

Unused planting boxes and pots should be turned over so that water does not accumulate. Do not store several unused bins, pots and buckets in the garden plots.

Place excess fencing, posts and even empty pots next to one of the sheds so that they are available to other gardeners.



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Sept. 13: Jewish Veteran Presents the Film 'True Honor' - the Story of Jewish Medal of Honor Recipients

n Thursday, Sept. 13, the **J**Jewish War Veterans Post 567 presents Lt. Col. Sheldon A. Goldberg, who will show and discuss a video entitled "True Honor" - the story of Jewish Medal of Honor recipients.

The program is at 2 p.m. in Clubhouse I and coincides with the celebration of Patriot Day. Tickets are \$10 per person, (check only, payable to JWV Post 567), and available beginning Tuesday, Aug. 7, at 8:30 a.m. in the Clubhouse I E&R office.

The Medal of Honor was created during the American Civil War and is the highest military decoration that can be presented by the U.S. government to a member of its armed forces. A recipient must distinguish themselves at the risk of their own life above and beyond the call of duty in action against an enemy of the U.S.

Since its inception, 3,473 have received the medal in total. At least 27 of its recipients have been American Jews.

The first Jewish recipient was Benjamin Levy, just 17-years-old, of the 1st New York Infantry Regiment, for his service at the Battle of Glendale on June 30, 1862.

The citation for his Medal read, "This soldier, a drummer boy, took the gun of a sick comrade, went into the fight, and when the color bearers were shot down, carried the colors and saved them from capture."

Henry Heller and David Orbansky also received the Medal for their actions during the American Civil War. Samuel Gross, who served in Fort Riviere, Haiti, was the only Jewish-American Marine to receive the Medal.

The last Jewish-American to receive the Medal was Korean War veteran Tibor Rubin in 2005. He was believed to have been overlooked for 55 years because of discrimination.


Goldberg is a 30-year veteran of the U.S. Air Force. Initially an enlisted bandsman, he subsequently applied for Officer Candidate School, was commissioned as a 2nd lieutenant in 1961 and became a navigator, flying cargo transports.

Later he became a weapons systems officer, flying both the F-4 Phantom the F-111 Aardvark, earning two Distinguished Flying Crosses for valor and 17 Air Medals.

Upon his retirement from the Air Force in 1985, he joined the CIA, retiring after 16 years in 2002 and earning a Career Commendation Medal.

Not yet ready to retire, he went back to school, earning a doctorate in modern European history from the University of Maryland in 2012, which subsequently led to his being named docent/historian at the National Museum of American Jewish Military History in Washington, D.C., where he lectures on the participation of American Jews in the U.S. military since pre-Colonial times.

He is active and an officer in several veterans' organizations. He will soon begin his third tour as the Department of Maryland's National Executive Committee representative for the Jewish War Veterans of the U.S.


After many years as legislative and political director for the National Labor College in Silver Spring, Maryland, he retired.





Can't Read the Screen? Accessibility Can Help

A pple has special settings designed to make computer use accessible to as many people as possible, including those with physical limitations.

Accessibility is already on the iMac, which can significantly improve many residents' lives. Help your friends and neighbors with low or impaired vision by bringing this to their attention. As always, it is best to follow along on the iMac as you read.

Here are two quick fixes that may suit your needs:

• Several programs (Pages, Numbers, etc.) have a dropdown Zoom box in the top left corner. Click on it to select a zoom of the window between 25-400 percent

Apple

- Another option is to select the text and hit command
 - + (plus) or command
- (minus) to make incremental changes in font size.

Full Screen Zoom

Is the entire screen (not just the window) too small to read? To enlarge the view of the whole screen, including the toolbars at the top, click the Apple logo at

top left > Click System Preferences > Click Accessibility (blue circle with person icon).

Click Zoom on left side. Then on the right side, check the box "Use keyboard shortcuts to zoom." Make sure Zoom style is Full Screen, and then exit Accessibility. You have just enabled the following three short cuts: Command Option 8 – Toggles Zoom on and off of the entire screen

- Command Option = (equal)Progressively Zooms in
- Command Option (minus)
- Zooms out

Adjusting Full Screen Zoom

Users can enable the default full screen Zoom using Command+Opt+8, but what if the zoom is too little or too much? Here's how to personalize the magnification: Apple logo > System

Preferences. > Accessibility > Zoom. Then select Options (bottom right, next to Fullscreen).

Drag the sliders at top of the new window to customize the minimum and maximum zoom, and then click OK. Now the user can automatically zoom in that far when they press Command+Option+8.

Magnifying Glass

Maybe the user would rather have an On Screen Magnifying Glass similar to the one they're used to holding in their hand. To

create this virtual magnifying glass, click the Apple logo at top left > Click System Preferences > Click Accessibility> Click Zoom on the left side.

Then on the right side, check the box, "Use keyboard shortcuts to zoom

then, in the popup menu at the bottom, select "Picturein-Picture." Command+Option+8 toggles the magnifying glass on and off.

Two Countries United by One Game

E xpecting immense crowds for the big July 14-15 weekend, France placed 110,000 police on duty to maintain order. On July 14, France celebrated Bastille Day, its national holiday. The next day, it celebrated a 4-2 victory over Croatia in the World Cup final.

Commemorating the day in 1789 when 900 people stormed the infamous Bastille prison, Bastille Day was celebrated by the French with a military march of thousands, with thousands more lining the Champs-Élysées. The seizure of the Bastille symbolized freedom from the monarchy and independence for France.

In the parade, about 4,300 soldiers marched along with 220 vehicles and 250 horses. In the sky, 64 jets released red, white and blue smoke, the colors of the French flag. Also, 30 helicopters flew overhead.

Two mishaps occurred. At Place de la Concorde, where President Emmanuel Macron reviewed the parade, two motorcycles collided, and in the flyover, one of the jets released red smoke instead of blue.

The next day, massive and sometimes unruly crowds in the streets of Paris watched on TV screens as the French soccer team defeated the Croatian team in Russia, winning the World Cup for the first time in 20 years.

Soccer is like American football, except that players cannot use their hands or tackle one another, and there are no goalposts. The ball is round and the players run continuously up and down the field, chasing and kicking the ball and often kicking each other – and trying to kick the ball past the opponent's goalie who guards a netted cage. In the scoring, a goal is worth only one point, not six.

Croatia also celebrated the World Cup. It was a moral victory for a small, new country. Croatia is slightly smaller than West Virginia, created in 1994 with the breakup of Yugoslavia. The

country is crescent shaped (almost gerrymandered) with a long coastline on the Adriatic, across the sea from Italy.

Its population is only 4.5 million compared to France's 66.5 million, making France 15 times larger. If the final score were proportionate to the respective populations, France should have won 30-2.

So, Croatian fans celebrated. They will have to wait until October to celebrate their national holiday though, which commemorates the invention of the necktie, for which Croatia takes credit.

July 14 also happens to be a non-official holiday – International Nudity Day – celebrated in New Zealand and about 30 other countries. Since public nudity is illegal in most places, people celebrate this holiday by staying at home in the nude or by visiting nude beaches.


Some celebrate by wearing "Nude T-Shirts" with clever sayings, such as "We can bare

it." Nude T-shirts – that's an oxymoron, isn't it?

Advocates of nudity claim it has health benefits, such as maintaining higher levels of vitamin D in the body due to more sun exposure; better blood circulation unrestricted by clothing; and lower risk of Alzheimer's disease because walking barefoot stimulates neurons in the brain.






