Growing Edibles in Leisure World's Garden Plots Community

Every year, Leisure World's garden plot cultivators prepare dishes incorporating the crops they grew, and bring them to a potluck, which took place this year on Aug. 15.

Over the years, the potluck's regulars have become familiar with each other's cooking. One gardener is asked to bring her biscuits year after year, and avid gardener Mary Lalley has fans of her green tomato pie, a sweet dessert made with unripe tomatoes.

Gardeners of many backgrounds bring an ethnically diverse selection of dishes, including Jewish, American Southern, German, Chinese, Hungarian, Polish and more. It's an event that embodies the cooperation and camaraderie shared among them.

Familiarity in the Field

Because of her job, gardener Tzeenan Lo generally doesn't attend the Garden Plot Group's events such as the potluck, but her fellowship with other gardeners is experienced out in the soil and sunlight.

Each household looks after its own plot, but the communal nature of gardening is still there: gardeners adhere to a set of collective guidelines – such as regulations about the height of structures so as not to block sunlight to other

93-Year-Old Veteran Competes in His First Senior Olympics

B ob Blumberg has spent a lifetime living ahead of the curve.

In the '60s, long before FitBit had everyone "counting their steps," he used his lunch breaks as a researcher at Oak Ridge National Laboratory in Tennessee to go jogging, brushing off the local pipefitters and mill workers who taunted him from the sidelines.

The large, Pollock-esque painting that hangs in his Leisure World dining room was not gifted to him from a professional artist, though to the untrained eye it looks as if it could have been; but rather, it is a 2003 Blumberg original, the result of a hobby he took up in his retirement with no formal training and only discarded house paints.

And last month, the 93-year-old World War II veteran made the leap to state-level sports competition at his first-ever Maryland Senior Olympics (MSO), winning silver in singles table tennis. His sole opponent, the only other competitor in the 90-94 age category, beat him just 3-2 in a five-game match.

"I got this medal by coming in second in a two-man race," he jokes.

Community's Tree Canopy Needs Revitalization

Leisure World's tree canopy has been shrinking for the last couple of years because of the natural life span of the pin oaks that were planted along the community's streets 50 years ago and the demise of the American elm from Dutch elm disease.

Recently, the emerald ash borer, a type of beetle, has destroyed most of the community's ash trees, according to Richard Jones and Aaron Tenley from the grounds maintenance department. And even winters have been harsh enough to kill some crepe myrtles.

Tree Removal

The Landscape Advisory Committee values the community's trees; they are a treasured part of Leisure World's landscape. However, diseased trees have to be removed before they contaminate others.

This year on Trust property, Leisure World's landscaping contractor McFall & Berry Inc. has had to remove six oak and ash trees in Daffodil Park, two pin oaks along Leisure World Boulevard and three pine and ash trees in Pennfield Park. The trees had to be removed because they posed a safety hazard to residents.

Tree Planting

In the fall, the Committee has made arrangements for McFall & Berry Inc. to plant an overcup oak in Daffodil Park, alongside another planted by the Garden and Environmental Club and, in the spring, two sunset maple trees.

The Committee also plans to have McFall & Berry Inc. plant five willow oaks to replace the pin oaks that were removed along Leisure World Boulevard, and to address the crepe myrtles in the Boulevard's median strips.

It is not advisable to replace trees in the summer because of heat and drought; therefore, they will be planted in the fall when the chance of survival is greater, as temperatures lower and more rain enables the roots to take hold.

Deer Population

The growing population of deer is another threat to the community's diminishing flora. The dozens of deer that inhabit Leisure World have eaten all the understory plants and thousands of dollars worth of purchased

plants, Tenley said.

The Committee continues to explore alternative, deer-resistant plants to minimize the damage. Fawns learn to eat what is available, even deer-resistant plants, such as vucca.

"Deer are foragers so they will often taste-test, and, if really hungry, will eat most anything," according to the Environmental Protection Agency's online blog.

Future Plans

Leisure World has 69 trees that need to be replaced,

according to the grounds maintenance department's five-year health plan for Trust trees.

The high cost of their removal has placed a financial strain on some mutuals, organizations and the Landscape Advisory Committee, who help to maintain Trust property.

Since trees are an asset that are to be taken care of by the whole community, the Committee plans to look at an overall long-range plan for their maintenance, removal and replacement.

plots – and work alongside one another.

"We're all just gardeners," Lalley says, "all on the same level, all doing the same thing."

Friendliness predominates over formality; people know each other only by first name. She says they are also united by their age, which can make garden work a challenge.

Lo, too, finds the garden ripe for friendship. "We have a lot of fun," she says. "People have the same kind of interests. We all like outdoors; we like fresh air; we like planting and playing with dirt."

She works on her vegetables on weekend mornings. When she sees another gardener she knows, they say hello and offer each other some of their produce.

Many Chinese gardeners at Leisure World appreciate the same ethnic foods, she says, but doubts that her non-Chinese friends would enjoy crops with names such as "hairy melon" and "bitter melon" quite as much.

Trading Taro and Tips

Just as harvests are shared, "we share seeds, and we share secrets," Lo says.

Some of her crops come from others, such as her taro, which her friend gave her as a sprouting root. In turn, Lo gave some taro plants to another gardener. When Lo's eggplants weren't successful in their first year, a friend advised her to grow them in pots instead of the ground.

Even the mulch provided by Leisure World is perhaps symbolic of the culture of sharing. When trees are cut down in Leisure World, they are processed into woodchips and distributed.

Many gardeners become attached to their plots after the labor of working their soil and nurturing their plants, Lalley says.

Pretty soon, though, the air will cool, and gardeners like Lalley and Lo will close the summer by exchanging the seeds and tubers they've saved, as they chatter about what they'll grow and share with each other next season.

Countdown to Competition

Blumberg had known about the MSO for some time; his good friend competes in the swimming event. But he never thought of competing himself until his fellow Ping Pong Club members John Gervais and Courtney Jones encouraged him to consider it.

"They just came up to me one day and said, 'Bob, you're good enough for the Senior Olympics. And if we help you out and give you a little practice, then you could probably get a gold medal," he says.

It didn't take much for Blumberg to decide they were right, and he started preparing for competition.

"Every time I got a chance I would practice with one of those two guys to sharpen up my shots," he says.

Gervais and Jones, who both play competitively, shared with Blumberg the ins and outs of the MSO's competition rules, helped him fill out the application and even drove him to the event. Gervais is consistently impressed by his stamina.

"It's really amazing. [Blumberg] comes most every time the Ping Pong Club meets and he stays for two hours," Gervais says.

Getting Into the Game

Blumberg began playing table tennis regularly about 12 years ago when he joined the Club after moving to Leisure World with his wife. It offered him the level of activity and camaraderie he was looking for.

"[We] clown around a bit," he says of himself and his fellow Club members, adding that the sport provides players with good exercise and helps improve concentration and hand-eye coordination.

As for 2019's MSO competition, Blumberg will apply, but with only one competitor challenging him at this year's games, he wonders whom he'll face-off with next year.

In the meantime, he says, he'll continue to enjoy the friendly, informal games at Leisure World that helped him fall in love with the sport.

FISH is a non-profit, volunteer organization, but is not a tax-deductible eligible organization. Its only expense is an annual volunteer lunch. Volunteers' "payment" is the good feeling they receive from helping others.

What Is FISH?

FISH is an all-volunteer organization that lends donated, assistive items and medical equipment to residents and employees.

Volunteers are at the FISH office in Clubhouse II from Monday to Friday, 10 a.m.-4 p.m. (except holidays). The office phone number is (301-598-1345). The E&R staff assists callers before and after hours.

Lost and Found

FISH also houses lost and found items turned into E&R.

Make sure to tell the volunteer if looking for a lost item.

Loans

FISH suggests a short-term loan, but does not strongly enforce a time limit.

Residents who have stored away an item that they are no longer using, such as a commode, walker or even a wheelchair, are asked to return it to the FISH office.

Borrowers are also asked to remind other household members that an item belongs to FISH. Items that belong to FISH have a sticker on them that reads "property of FISH" and an inventory number.

Giveaway Items

All the equipment FISH lends out is donated. FISH also accepts other useful medical items, which are stored in the basement of Clubhouse II, near the FISH storage area. Residents and employees may take these items without returning them.



Tucked between Nicaragua to the north, Panama to the south, the Pacific Ocean to the west and the Caribbean Sea to the east, Costa Rica may truly have it all: a year-round, tropical climate, quiet rural areas, hillside villages, modern cities, Caribbean beaches, Pacific coastline, rain forests, lush valleys and mountains.

Although Costa Rica is a small territory, it makes up about five percent of the Earth's biodiver-

The Costa Rican saying, "pura vida," is the country's unofficial motto, and it literally translates to "pure life." But it really means, "life is good," and is used in everyday conversation as a greeting.

Costa Rica's lush biodiversity provides plentiful opportunities to take photos while bird watching, observing the flora and fauna, spotting volcanoes and hiking through the country's national parks.

The "camera bugs" on the trip will also enjoy capturing images of the country's rainforests, sunsets, beaches, waterfalls and mountains, as well as the locals' activities.

- 1. Save water. Turn off the faucet while lathering your hands and quickly turn it off again after rinsing. Turn the faucet off while brushing your teeth, and quickly turn it off again after rinsing.
- 2. Reduce greenhouse gas emissions. Do not idle a vehicle. Turning the engine off when not moving (except in traffic) reduces carbon dioxide and other pollutants in the air.
- 3. Avoid buying too much, cooking too much and throwing away food. Food waste is respon-

sible for a great amount of greenhouse gas emissions. See (www. savethefood.com) and (https:// lovefoodhatewaste.com/) for more information.

- 4. Consider planning meatless Mondays. Livestock farming, particularly raising cattle for slaughter, is a significant source of methane, a potent greenhouse gas. Visit (www.meatlessmonday. com/the-global-movement/) for more information.
- 5. Reduce plastic pollution. Buy produce not bundled or bagged in plastic. Recycle clean frozen food bags, bread wrappers and other plastic items at the plastic recycle bin outside grocery stores. Bring your own bag when shopping and, when dining out, say "no" to a plastic straw.






The Ping Pong Club congratulates members

Blumberg won a silver medal in the 90-94 age group, and Gervais and Hearst won silver in the doubles competition, 70-74 age group.


Added Play Time





Playing Chess Without Sunscreen

Don't look now, but the sun is on fire.

Scientists know this because they can detect sun storms and sudden explosions that release flares into space, traveling at millions of miles an hour.

If they reach Earth, solar flares pose a danger to power grids and communications, but these streams of magnetic energy are harmless to humans wearing sunscreen. And Earth's surface is well protected by Earth's magnetic field and atmosphere (polluted or not).

Solar flares are quite common. The frequency of solar flares depends upon activity on the sun's surface. Large explosions of magnetic energy in small regions of the sun's atmosphere produce solar flares. At least 50 solar flares have occurred thus far in 2018.


Solar flares are relatively small compared to solar storms, which are huge. Storms release coronal mass ejections (CMEs). As of March 18, only three solar storms occurred this year.

"The amount of energy released by a flare can be equivalent to millions of 100-megaton hydrogen bombs exploding at the same time – 10 million times greater than that released by a volcanic eruption," according to NASA.

However, "it is less than one-tenth of the total energy emitted by the sun every second," notes the University of California at Berkeley.

X-rays and ultraviolet radiation emitted by solar flares can be harmful to humans it they penetrate Earth's atmosphere. In the ionosphere (the uppermost part of the planet's atmosphere), they can trigger radio blackouts around the world and can present radiation hazards to spacecraft and astronauts.

Solar storms don't just affect technology. Geomagnetic storms adversely affect humans, increasing the risk of strokes, causing headaches and disrupting sleep cycles, otherwise known



as circadian rhythms. They are also associated with depression, dizziness, confused thinking and erratic behavior.

Solar flares have been known at least since 1859, when they were seen and reported independently by two astronomers in Britain. The flares cannot be seen by the naked eye on Earth. They can be observed only through telescopes, space x-rays and thermal imaging equipment.

The solar flares released by the sun this year were hardly noticed in Leisure World. The community's chess players are immune to solar flares, unless they are playing on a computer and the power is disrupted. In Clubhouse II, chess continued as usual without interruption during this period.

In one game, however, solar flares might have been a factor, prompting a player to make a bold series of moves to win the game. As shown in the diagram on this page, White's defense of the King depends heavily on the Queen. White's Bishop has just captured a Black Pawn at g7. Black followed by moving the Queen to c4. It is White's turn to move. White can win the game in four moves. Do you see it?

While you are figuring it out, note that chess is played on Monday, Wednesday and Friday from 1-4 p.m. in Clubhouse II. Membership is free. For further information, call Club president Bernie Ascher at (301-598-8577).

SOLUTION: White shifts his Queen from defense to offense, moving it to d1 and checking the King. Black's only safe space for the King is at h4. White then checks the King by moving the Rook to h3. Black moves the King to g5. White moves the Queen to h5, checking the King. Black's King can only move to f4, whereupon White moves the Queen to h4. Checkmate!

So, do not wait for telescopes. Do not wait for sunscreen. Do not wait for the end of solar flares. Play chess now!


