The car radio spurts the final notes of a song as soon as restaurant owner Bobby Barton starts the engine.

The fried fish sandwich, which he says is the most popular dish for delivery orders, is safely tucked inside a take-out container on the passenger seat. He knows just where he's headed since he delivered to this same customer last week, and he's off.

This summer, Perrie, LLC, Leisure World's restaurant contractor, began offering delivery service from the Stein and Terrace Rooms. It had been a frequent request from customers.

"We probably have had it asked [of] us like 30 times a year," Barton says.

It was not easy to begin because of the restaurant's small staff. The restaurant managers, Ed Richardson and Barton, decided to pilot the program during lunch hours, as during dinner they're busy operating the Clubhouse Grille in addition to the Stein and Terrace Rooms.

They are considering expanding the delivery service into weeknights in the future with the addition of staff members. Richardson expects evening service will be more popular. Already, many people who order in the latter part of delivery hours are buying dinner.

While the delivery service is a convenient way for all residents to satisfy their hunger, Barton says it's been especially popular with grandparents ordering food for themselves and young chil-

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Comcast Xfinity Installations Begin

Internet and Cable TV Provider Offers Deal on Digital Phone Service

Phase one has begun for Comcast Xfinity's internet and upgraded cable TV equipment installation; technicians are scheduled to be in residents' homes in Turnberry Courts, The Fairways North and The Fairways South through the end of next week.

Phase two of the installation process is set to begin the week of Sunday, Sept. 29, and a postcard will be mailed from Comcast Xfinity to homes scheduled for this phase (The Overlook, Mutual 19-B, Villa Cortese and Creekside) about two weeks prior to the start of installation. The postcard explains how to schedule the installation appointment.

The equipment installations are part of an eight-year bulk rate agreement Leisure World signed with Comcast Xfinity early last month that will provide high-speed internet and upgraded cable TV service to all homes in Leisure World.

Digital Phone Service

As part of the agreement, Comcast Xfinity is offering Leisure World residents its Xfinity Voice Unlimited plan at a promotional rate of \$24.99 per month for 24 months.

Xfinity voice is a digital phone service commonly known as VoIP, or Voice over Internet Protocol, that allows users to make telephone calls from their landline phones using their home's internet Wi-Fi connection.

Residents who switch their phone service to Comcast

Xfinity's Voice Unlimited plan could see at least a \$15 savings on their monthly phone bill during the 24-month promotion period or beyond, depending on the phone provider they currently

have, said Comcast project manager Marla Mitchell.

Once Comcast Xfinity installs Voice Unlimited on a resident's landline phone, the phone is still operated by a person as if it were analog — a hand-held, pushbutton phone remains a handheld, push-button phone.

Installation and Fee

Comcast Xfinity's Voice Unlimited plan is opt-in; residents who do not want the service installed do not have to purchase it.

For residents who do want to opt in to the plan, a Comcast technician will install the plan's technology in a resident's home

Walkers and joggers can get in their daily dose of exercise, safe in the knowledge that a shady spot or bench for resting is right around the bend.

Grab your favorite pair of athletic shoes and take a stroll around one of these four walking paths.

The Broadwalk:

- nearly one-mile loop in Montgomery Mutual
- bordered by Leisure World Boulevard and Gleneagles Drive
- walkers should park their cars in the main lot or on South Leisure World Boulevard, not in the courts

Mutual 9:

- roughly o.6-mile of pathway that stretches between The Inter-Faith Chapel and Connecticut Avenue
- grazes the backyards of single-family homes
- slight inclines and plenty of shade; an excellent
- choice for residents who want to comfortably enjoy the outdoors with minimal exertion
- walkers can park their cars along South Leisure World Boulevard, or use The Inter-Faith Chapel's parking lot if no events are scheduled at that time

Mutual 10:

- roughly 0.9 loop located just south of Leisure World Boulevard and sandwiched between Connecticut Avenue and Kelmscott Drive
- cuts between single-family homes, personal gardens and manicured lawns

The Greens I and II:

- nearly 0.9-mile course encircling the mutual's first three buildings
- offers scenic views of the golf course
- more than 15 benches along the pathways provide walkers plenty of respite

Get Your Flu Shot at the Medical Center's Pharmacy

P eople age 65 and older who contract the flu are at risk for more serious complications, according the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. Getting a seasonal flu vaccine each year by the end of October is the best protection.

Beginning Tuesday, Sept. 24, a flu shot walk-in clinic will be available to all residents on Tuesdays from 9 a.m.-5 p.m. at the pharmacy in the MedStar Health medical center building. Bring a photo ID and insurance card.

Residents can also get a flu shot at the pharmacy on any other weekday between 9 a.m.-5 p.m. if they schedule an appointment with the pharmacy by calling (301-598-1005).

Patients who have an upcoming appointment with their primary care provider (Dr. Feldman, Dr. Ozanne-Johnson or Dr. Share) can receive a flu shot during their scheduled appointment.

Residents who are 65 years and older will receive the FLUAD vaccine, and residents who are younger than 65 will receive the FluLaval vaccine. FLUAD adds an additional ingredient to boost the immune response and increase the vaccine's effectiveness.

The pharmacy's flu clinic will replace the flu clinic that was typically provided once a year to residents in Clubhouse I by the MedStar Visiting Nurse Association.

The medical center is located at 3305 North Leisure World Boulevard, adjacent to the Physical Properties Building. Residents coming to the medical center for a flu shot should enter through the main entrance, located at the rear of the building and facing the garden plots.

Golf Course Renovation Proposal Available for Viewing

Saving Water: Conservation Tips for Any Home

With the Washington Suburban Sanitary Commission's (WSSC) recent change to its rate structure leading to an increase in residents' water bills, adopting water conservation methods in the home can help adjust for the increase and save money.

Less water usage can mean more savings, and conserving water also helps conserve energy and preserve the environment.

Repair Leaks

One of the most effective actions a homeowner can take to conserve water is to have leaks repaired. Even small leaks can waste significant amounts of water.

Leaks inside a toilet can

waste up to 200 gallons of water a day, according to the Maryland Department of the Environment's website, but the good news is that homeowners can easily detect toilet leaks by adding just a few drops of food coloring to the water in the toilet tank. If the colored water appears in the toilet bowl, the toilet is leaking.

The Physical Properties Department (PPD) at Leisure World offers service agreements that include plumbing services. For details, call PPD Monday through Friday from 8:30 a.m.-4:30 p.m. (closed everyday from noon-1 p.m.) at (301-598-1500).

Residents can also download and print a copy of the service agreement by signing in to (residents.lwmc.com) and clicking on Physical Properties Department under the Amenities & Services dropdown menu.

Bathroom

Since the bathroom, where leaks are likely to occur, is also where most of a home's water is used, it's the place where the most can be saved as well, according to WSSC's website.

Residents may consider purchasing and installing low-flow aerators or showerheads to conserve water, but here are some simple tips to follow now that are free of charge:

- Fill a sink with water instead of letting water run when washing, brushing teeth or shaving
- Use a glass of water for rinsing teeth
- Take showers instead of tub baths
- If your shower has a singlehandle control or shut off valve, turn off the flow while soaping or shampooing
- Don't use the toilet as a garbage disposal or trash can

Kitchen

Residents can economize in the kitchen by running their dishwasher only when it's full and avoiding using extra cycles. Here are some other ways residents can modify their kitchen routines:

- Use a garbage disposal sparingly (but never without using running water), or use a garbage can or compost heap instead
- Use a brush and bowl full of water to wash vegetables
- Thaw frozen food in a refrigerator rather than under running water
- Cook vegetables with a minimum amount of water and save cooking water for soup stock.

• Do not pre-rinse dishes before putting them in a dishwasher

Laundry

On average, about 22 percent of indoor residential water is used to wash clothes, according to the Maryland Department of Environment's website, so even small changes to a person's routine can make a significant difference to the amount of water used in the home. Here are some ideas:

- Operate the washing machine only when it's fully loaded
- Use the proper water level or load size selection on the washing machine
- Presoak heavily soiled items. Always use a minimum amount of detergent

If buying a new washer, purchase one with conservation features. Choose a washer with a load size selector or variable water level control.

Outside the Home

Watering lawns and gardens can double normal household water use during the hot, dry summer months. Consider adopting the following behaviors to conserve water year-round:

- Equip a hose with an automatic shut-off nozzle
- Use a broom, not a hose, to clean driveways, steps and sidewalks
- Water a garden during the coolest part of the day. Do not water on windy days
- Use mulch around shrubs and garden plants to reduce evaporation from the soil surface and cut down on weed growth
- Adjust irrigation system (sprinkler, etc.) settings as needed to reduce watering time duration and frequency

The Folks Who Order

Barton's minivan pulls into a parking lot. He brings the food up to a townhouse. The recipient greets Barton and thanks him for the food.

When he returns to his car, a passer-by on the block gives him a smile. "One of us is in the wrong place," she says. Barton responds in his friendly way and encourages her to come to the next live music event at the restaurants.

The charismatic Barton, who has worked at Leisure World since he was a 14-year-old busboy, has spent ample years accumulating attachments to clientele. He is full of stories and memories of the residents he's met. As he passes a townhouse on the way back to Clubhouse I, he fondly recalls nights in the Stein Room chatting with the

man who used to live there.

An Attractive Service

The number of delivery orders the Stein and Terrace Rooms get per day ranges from zero to 20. One day, Barton happened to receive orders from three customers who live in unit 319 of three different mutuals.

"I thought about [using that number] to play some keno or something," he jokes.

He's noticed a good degree of interest in food delivery from the community. Homebound residents have asked for copies of the menu to be delivered to them so that they can begin using the service, and in-person diners sometimes pick up menus to give to their less-mobile neighbors.

The restaurant delivers for a \$4 surcharge within Leisure World from 11 a.m. to 3 p.m. on weekdays.

All 'Walks' of Plant Life

Horticultural Efforts Keep Landscape Lively

The sunshine is beating down, so the Landscape Advisory Committee (LAC)'s Green Team agrees to keep this late August walk on the short side. It's an important time of year for the LAC, since September ends planting season.

The Team's three members join Aaron Tenley from the Grounds Department and Joe Seamone, a horticulturalist from Leisure World's landscaping contractor McFall and Berry Inc., to inspect the vegetation around Leisure World and offer new ideas for plantings.

LAC's Green Team is one of the Committee's three colornamed teams responsible, in coordination with the Grounds Department, for ensuring that a different part of Trust grounds is growing strong.

A walk with them is a reminder of Leisure World's self-governance ethos. Residents have a hand in not only the policies that govern the community, but also in the tangible landscape: the ferns growing from a tree stump at Daffodil Park, the planted medians of Leisure World Boulevard.

Inspecting the Grounds

The Green Team, with Tenley and Seamone, assembles by the Administration Building on Aug. 20 and moves with an acute eye across the landscape under its charge.

They come to a camellia in front of Clubhouse I. A camellia is an evergreen shrub with a typically dense bouquet of flowers, but this one is brown and shriveled.

"That's why we walk," one of the members says. Member Carolyn Oakford jots in a notebook, and she and the others discuss what might have gone wrong.

"Maybe it wasn't watered enough?" a team member says.

"A camellia doesn't need that much water," another responds.

At Clubhouse I's outside

terrace, Oakford describes her idea for removing a shrub called a photinia at the end of the bed and installing instead an azalea uprooted from the opposite bed. The photinia was here from before the terrace was fully planted, and now she feels it looks out of place.

Seamone can see why she'd want to do away with the photinia but suggests replacing it with a new hydrangea. He says the azalea bed looks good with its current odd number of shrubs, and another hydrangea would match the hydrangea that is already in the photinia's bed

Notes are made, and the LAC works with the experts to come to a consensus.

Trees Standing Tall

The group proceeds into the welcoming shadows of oaks on the sidewalk of Rossmoor Boulevard. Tenley remarks on the respite from the heat.

Leafy branches are hanging down from the tree by the main gate. Seamone recommends removing the tree's lower limbs; its canopy is thick enough that it will still provide plenty of relieving shade. And a trimmed tree will also give people a clearer view into Leisure World as they enter, he says.

Trees are numerous at Leisure World, and the population is growing. Ten to 15 years ago, a tree count yielded that there were about 300 trees on Leisure World Boulevard alone. So far in 2019, the Grounds Department has planted more than 20 trees on Trust property and many more in mutuals.

Tenley is waiting for a proposal sent to Tree Montgomery, a Montgomery County program to increase tree cover, to be approved. If the proposal is successful, the County will provide Leisure World with 30 shade trees free of charge that can be planted by the main entrance and other Trust grounds.

Tree Montgomery allows Leisure World to save money on landscaping and increase its plantings. The Grounds Department has received trees from

the program in previous years. If the proposal is successful, Leisure World is likely to receive the trees in spring of 2020.

Planting for Resilience

The Green Team members agree on pruning the trees by the main gate. Now they discuss with Tenley and Seamone whether Rossmoor Boulevard's pin oaks should be replaced by willow oaks, as is the plan for the dying pin oaks near Villa Cortese. Tenley says willow oaks thrive next to roads better than pin oaks.

It is important to remove weak or dead trees because other than producing the impression of neglect, they are at risk of falling and causing injury, according to Tenley. While the Grounds Department doesn't necessarily plant a new tree wherever one dies, it adds more trees than it removes so there is a net increase.

Survivability is one of the factors the LAC and Grounds Department take into account when choosing plants. When trees die, they often consider alternatives that are more likely to survive and thrive.

Longer-lasting conifers such as white cedar are supplanting Leyland cypresses, which, according to Jones, have a short lifespan. Hollies have been a frequent choice, having recently been planted in Mutual 13 and Montgomery Mutual for example, because deer does not eat them.

Environmental problems are threatening tree health. Ash trees, most of which are part of the area's original flora, have been lost to the emerald ash borer, described by the USDA as a non-native beetle that has destroyed large numbers of ash in the U.S. in the past two decades.

Sugar maples in The Fairways South and Mutual 13 are also dying. Jones suspects the maples, which are found at higher elevations in the wild, are sensitive to climate change. It has become necessary to select trees that tolerate warmer conditions.

"Back in the '50s, you couldn't grow crape myrtles around here," Jones says. "They froze out." The thriving crape myrtles that bloom in August around Clubhouse I and elsewhere are a hot pink reminder that temperatures are rising.

The ginkgo is another ideal choice for its adaptability and resistance to disease and pests, Jones says. The species has persisted for ages and is thought to be the oldest tree species alive.

"And they're beautiful; they turn golden yellow in the fall when the frost hits them," Jones says.

The LAC is considering ginkgoes for the future parking lot of the new Administration Building, according to LAC chair Dora Pugliese. Other trees on the tentative list include Chinese elm, basswood, red and paperbark maple, thornless honeylocust, zelkova and Japanese pagoda.

Landscaping work is never finished, Tenley says. Designing gardens, choosing plants and staying attentive to problems are an ongoing process to keep Leisure World beautiful.

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on the same day that their internet and upgraded cable TV equipment is installed; a separate installation appointment for Voice Unlimited is not needed.

Residents who want the service installed should tell the Comcast Xfinity representative when they call to schedule their equipment installation for internet and upgraded cable TV service after receiving their postcard from Comcast Xfinity in the mail.

Residents should not to cancel their current phone service until the Comcast Xfinity technician has set up the Voice Unlimited plan's technology in their home.

Residents who currently have the Voice Unlimited plan have until approximately mid-November to call Comcast Xfinity at (855-638-2855) to ask for the \$24.99 promotional rate.

After 24 months, the cost of the Voice Unlimited plan will increase to the retail rate. Residents can either choose to keep the plan or opt out of it.

Residents who do not want to purchase the Voice Unlimited plan can change their mind at any time during Comcast Xfinity's eight-year bulk rate agreement with Leisure World, but the promotional rate only applies for approximately two months,

after which time a resident can purchase the plan at retail rate.

Features

The Voice Unlimited plan features three-way calling, call waiting, caller ID and more, and includes unlimited local and nationwide long distance calling, including calls to landline and mobile destinations in Puerto Rico, Canada, China, Hong Kong, India, Mexico, Singapore and South Korea, among others.

Keep in mind that power outages or routine maintenance will occasionally cause the internet to go down, at which time residents with the Voice Unlimited plan will be without landline phone service, typically for up to a few hours, according to Mitchell.

Information and updates about Comcast Xfinity's installation are provided as they become available via the community's communications platforms, which include Leisure World News, the robocall system, the resident website, (residents.lwmc.com) and closed-circuit TV channels 972 and 974.

Pro-Install

Comcast Xfinity's agreement with Leisure World includes free pro-install by a Comcast technician, so residents are encouraged to schedule their equipment installation appointment with Comcast after they've received their postcard in the mail.



Allowing a Comcast technician to install your internet equipment and upgraded cable TV service ensures that you'll receive the internet and cable speeds you'll be paying for.

The Comcast technician will also provide residents with an overview of the services in their home and help them set up their SSID (name of Wi-Fi network) and password so that it matches their previous carrier, a service Mitchell says Comcast Xfinity doesn't normally provide to its customers.



GOOD TO KNOW: RIGHT-OF-WAY AT FOUR-WAY STOP SIGNS

Some intersections in and near Leisure World are marked with four-way stop signs. According to Federal Highway Administration guidelines, multiway stops may be considered for installation where the amount of traffic on all intersecting streets is similar. It is important that drivers pay attention to these signs and heed the rules to avoid collisions.

Remember that under Maryland law, drivers should yield the right-of-way to the driver who is at or arrives before them at an intersection.

If multiple vehicles arrive at the intersection at the same time, the driver on the right has the right-of-way.

Still, the Maryland Driver's Manual reminds motorists not to go forth unquestioningly when the rules grant them right-of-way. Drivers should be observant of the situation at hand and proceed safely.






In addition to the fun music and period dress, there will be hors d'ourves included with purchase of a ticket, along with a silent auction, raffle, door prizes and cash bar.

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





Ninety percent of chronic knee pain is due to patella tracking problems and stiffness in the ankles. Her program uses certain exercises to realign the patella, reduce stiffness in the ankle joint and strengthen the stabilizing muscles around the knee. To this end, Moten will teach specialized stretches.

Residents will get to use

a yoga strap while sitting down and learn how they can reduce the pain in their knees by following her step-by-step program. The program's benefits include pain reduction and decreased fluid in the knee, which results in easier stair climbing, standing up and sitting down.

FISH is a volunteer organization that accepts donations of assistive equipment and lends them to residents and employees of Leisure World.

Located in Clubhouse II, the FISH office has wheelchairs, tub stools (shower chairs), commodes and walkers. The office is open Monday through Friday from 10 a.m.- 4 p.m., except major holidays. The office phone number is (301-598-1345).

FISH has so many generous people who donate their equipment that the organization rarely has to ask borrowers to return items. Borrowing equipment from FISH is a great way to find out what you like and don't like about an item before deciding whether or not to purchase it.

Most FISH volunteers do not have any medical training, so the organization strongly suggests borrowers consult a doctor or therapist before using an item. FISH does its best to make sure the equipment is safe to use.

Free Items

FISH also accepts other items that it gives away to residents and their guests such as incontinence supplies, accessories for walkers such as baskets, canes and elevated toilet seats. They are kept in the front area of the FISH office.

FISH no longer accepts any foot braces, oxygen tank tubes, diabetic equipment or CPAP machines. If donating items to FISH, do not leave them outside the FISH area in the basement on Clubhouse II.

Want to Help?

FISH is always looking for new members, so if interested in volunteering, contact its president, Beth Leanza, at (301-598-4569). FISH suggests a training/orientation session with a current volunteer.

Charitable Collections

Some organizations such as Kiwanis Club and Lions Club have collection boxes in the FISH office. Kiwanis helps Ronald McDonald House by collecting can tabs, and the Lions collect eyeglasses and hearing aids.

Clubs that would like to start a collection, even for a short time, can contact FISH. Also, be sure to include contact information on the collection box.





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
Oct. 31: Former Department of Justice Civil Rights Attorney Discusses the Possibility of Impeachment

hen reading the news or watching television, much of the information presented has recently centered on the possible impeachment of the U.S. president.

Just what is involved and what is provided for in the Constitu-





tion on this topic is the subject of the Center for Lifelong Learning's (CLL) presentation by Howard Sribnick entitled "Impeachment" on Thursday, Oct. 31, at 2 p.m. in Clubhouse I.

The Emoluments Clause of the Constitution, the provisions in the U.S. Constitution

law limiting political contributions by foreign nationals and the historical interpretation of the term "treason, bribery and high crimes and misdemeanors" will be discussed.

Sribnick will also review how these provisions have been applied to past presidents and the role that partisan politics has played in the decision to initiate impeachment proceedings.

> The presentation will conclude with a discussion of the Constitution's provisions regarding impeachment

as they might relate to the current president, and will provide information on the likelihood of the House of Representatives voting to impeach and the Senate voting to remove.

He will also discuss the impact of a decision to initiate impeachment proceedings on Congress' ability to pass needed legislation, American foreign relations and military commitments, and the 2020 Presidential election.

About the Presenter

Sribnick served in the U.S. Department of Justice where he worked as a trial attorney in the Civil Rights Division, assistant director in the Civil Fraud Section of the Civil Rights Division and as counsel to the Inspector General.

He served as the Inspector General of the Federal Trade Commission before retiring from federal service in 2008. He has taught courses on the history of the U.S. Constitution and landmark cases of the U.S. Supreme

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No Chess in the 2020 Olympics

apan is preparing for the 2020 Olympics, which will start next July in Tokyo. Construction will cost about \$12.6 billion, well above the original estimate of under \$7 billion, according to budget figures reported in Reuters on Dec. 21, 2018.

Japan is adding space at Haneda and Narita airports, building trains to connect them, rebuilding the Olympic stadium to seat 60-80,000 and constructing other venues.

In July, at least 100 people gathered in the Japanese capital to protest the hosting of the Games. As reported by Reuters, protestors argue that the Olympics should be banned worldwide because it contributes to poverty and harms the environment.

Some protest because they believe the money could be spent elsewhere, such as for victims of the 2011 earthquake, tsunami and nuclear disaster, who are still struggling.

Japan's Board of Audits recently reported that the total cost may reach \$25 billion, but the estimate includes certain questionable items labeled as

Olympic costs, such as satellites to improve weather reporting.

Hundreds of thousands of tourists will be attracted to Japan to watch some 12,000 athletes from more than 200 countries compete for medals next year. Those who stay at home can watch the action on NBC, which has coverage of the 2020 games, extended to 2032 with a \$7.75 billion contract.

The International Olympic Committee (IOC) added five sports to the Tokyo agenda, but not chess. IOC added baseball (absent since the 2008 Olympics) along with four sports new to the Olympics: surfing, karate, skateboarding and climbing, bringing the total to 33 sports.

Earlier this year, as in prior years, the IOC rejected chess for the 2020 Olympics because of its lack of physical activity. The Fédération Internationale des Échecs (FIDE), the International Chess Federation, with members from 189 countries, immediately filed a request for inclusion of chess in the 2024 Olympics.


French members of FIDE believe chess has a better chance for the 2024 Olympics because it is the centennial of the 1924

Paris Olympics and the centennial of the International Chess Federation itself.

FIDE points out that there are 600 million chess players in the world and that several million people play online every day. Moreover, in line with the Olympic campaign to improve its appeal to youngsters, 68 percent of the members of the French Chess Federation are under 18 years old. For the 2024 Olympics, FIDE would highlight the faster forms of chess, such as Blitz (where each side is limited to five minutes to complete the game) and Rapid (where each side has a total of 15 minutes with moves every 10 seconds).

Tickets to the 2020 Olympics are now on sale through 40,000 shops in Japan (convenience stores, ticket agents) and online. Outside Japan, authorized ticket resellers will sell tickets in each country. Registration and a Tokyo 2020 ID are required to purchase tickets.

Prices vary from about \$18 to more than \$2,000. The most expensive tickets are for the opening and closing ceremonies (from \$220 to \$2,680), and for the 100-meter men's final (\$1,200), according to the Truly



Tokyo newsletter. Qualified groups can buy tickets at about \$18. Half the tickets will cost less than \$70.




