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Landscapers Switch to Natural Weedkillers as Part of Efforts to Reduce Environmental Hazards

A natural herbicide has replaced Roundup on Leisure World's grounds following a California court ruling against Monsanto, Roundup's manufacturer. The ruling found Monsanto in error for hiding the possibility that glyphosate, the active ingredient, may cause cancer in workers who spray the popular weedkiller, though scientific findings have been mixed.

"Glyphosate is a strong product, and that's why it gets such a bad rap," says Mike Angles, chief operating officer of McFall and Berry,

Leisure World's landscaping contractor.

McFall and Berry now uses the gentler product, Finalsan. The switch was made in mid-August after coordination between McFall and Berry and the Landscape Advisory Committee.

Angles explains that unlike the synthetic glyphosate, Finalsan is derived from fatty acids naturally found in animals. The manufacturer considers it safe for humans and animals to walk in treated areas as soon as the soapy liquid has dried.

Finalsan is less widely produced than Roundup and costs much more. But because weed control makes up only a small portion of McFall and Berry's services, Leisure World is not currently charged more for landscaping in its common spaces as a result of the switch.

Natural products like Finalsan are also generally less effective than their more potent counterparts, but McFall and Berry tested Finalsan's effectiveness on its own land. "We found that Finalsan is as effective as Roundup on most weeds and in most applications," Angles says.

Treating the Rest of the Yard Finalsan is a non-selective

Blind Chess Player Uses Forethought to 'See' Game

Bobby Bobo is concentrating.

It's his move on the chessboard. But instead of using his eyes to find the piece he wants to move, he uses his hands.

Bobo, who has been completely blind since childhood, uses a special chessboard designed for the visually impaired. Pointed and smooth tips allow players to distinguish between the white and black pieces, and their pegged bottoms fit neatly into round holes on the board, allowing Bobo's hands to roam freely over the pieces without disrupting their placement.

Although to the casual observer Bobo's chessboard



may seem like the key to his success in the game, he says the "real" chessboard is in his mind, just as it is for every other player.

"You have to think moves and moves ahead," he says. "If I take this bishop or if I allow [my opponent] to take my bishop, what are the consequences down the road?"

His opponent on this day, Chess Club president Bernie Ascher, agrees.

"Bobby has to keep a picture of this in his mind as the game goes along. A lot of the strategy is in thinking five or six moves ahead," Ascher said.

From Chess to Computers Bobo has been playing chess

GOOD TO KNOW: SIGN UP ON RESIDENT WEBSITE

Would you like to be part of the community from the convenience of home?

At Leisure World's login-based resident website, (residents. lwmc.com), users can view and download important documents, search their mutual's website or simply check out the news alert at the top of the website's welcome page for the latest news and information about the community.

But before residents can access (residents.lwmc.com) to take advantage of its myriad information and resources, they must first sign up as users.

Signing Up

Sign up on the website's welcome page by clicking on the "Sign Up" link and filling out a four-step, self-explanatory form with their name, address and other basic information.

Password

Users must create their own sign-in names and passwords. Passwords must be a minimum of six characters (letters, numbers, symbols or a combination thereof).

For example, "Apple\$75" is a password that meets all the requirements, whereas the password "opal" does not.

Choose a sign in name and password that are meaningful and easy to remember.

Once signed up, any user who forgets his or her sign in name or password should navigate to their mutual's website and select the 'Forgot Your Sign In Name or Password' link. Residents who do not know their mutual website address can search for it using the search bar at the top of the page.

Renters

Residents who rent their property at Leisure World, or who have recently acquired their property from a former resident or deceased relative, must contact their mutual's property manager or mutual assistant to provide proof of occupancy/ownership before they can sign up as a user on the resident website.

Bobo has traveled extensively across the country, from Boston to Hawaii, teaching people how to use computer programs.

herbicide. While it is suitable to use in spaces such as flowerbeds and curbs where the spray will not come in contact with plants other than weeds, McFall and Berry has been using other environmentally safer substances on Leisure World lawns for 18 years.

A growing portion of McFall and Berry's clients have become interested in less-harmful herbicides. Responding to the increased awareness of chemical hazards, the company started experimenting about seven years ago with a greater variety of alternative products.

In the past five or so years, the company has completely forgone strong chemical-based herbicides in Leisure World's common areas, such as clubhouse and medical center grounds as well as Mutuals 7, 12 and 19A. These areas instead receive treatments with products such as the ironbased Fiesta and the soybeanbased Preen.

Another product, Trimtect, causes shrubs and evergreen trees to use their nutrients to strengthen the plant rather

Accessibility for All

A relatively new member of the Chess Club, having moved to Leisure World with his wife, who is also blind, just this past

in the spring. According to Angles, about 750,000 praying mantises and ladybugs have been released in Leisure World over the years.

Residents have noticed the abundance of these beneficial creatures, and the release of the ladybugs in the community is often a well-attended spectacle.

If a chemical treatment is needed, McFall and Berry uses natural substances, generally soaps and oils, that cause minimal harm and are not dangerous to humans. In March and early April, the contractor may apply an oil to plants that prevents eggs from hatching, and in the summer, use a different type of oil that behaves as an insecticide.

July, Bobo was happy to find a community of folks who love chess as much as he does.

"I'm busier now living here than I was before," he says.

He's also noticed a growing number of blind and visually impaired residents in the community; his mutual is even considering adding braille to its doors and mailboxes.

And perhaps soon, too, more chess players will find themselves using the type of accessible chessboard that keeps Bobo in the game.

"In the long run, [the game] doesn't depend on who has the best sight, but who has the best vision," he says.

Integrated pest management, according to Angles, has become standard across the industry. McFall and Berry adopts new, safer landscaping practices as the times change.

When Montreal, Canada, introduced a ban on many synthetic landscaping products, McFall and Berry contacted landscaping companies in Montreal to ask what they were using. The company also obtained the lawn herbicide Fiesta from Germany for testing before the product even became available in the U.S.

The elimination of Roundup has simply become the latest manifestation of the drive for safer landscaping.

LWCC, LWMC Oppose Complaint Filed to CCOC

I n response to a resident's complaint filed against them to the Montgomery County Commission on Common Ownership Communities (CCOC), the Leisure World Community Corporation (LWCC) and Leisure World of Maryland Corporation (LWMC) have filed a motion with the CCOC to counter the complaint.

The original complaint, filed Aug. 28 by Sheryl Katzman, claims that LWCC "[failed] to hold election(s) in violation of State of Maryland Homeowners Association Act."

The LWCC maintains its position that its directors are chosen by each mutual in accord with LWCC bylaws, as has been done for about 40 years.

County code requires that while a CCOC complaint is being processed a community association "must not take any action to enforce or implement the association's decision [i.e. the subject of the CCOC complaint]."

Katzman later filed a motion stating the LWCC violated this automatic stay by conducting business at its regular board of directors meeting the morning of Aug. 28.

LWCC and LWMC's responding motion, filed

Sept. 14, requests that the CCOC lift the automatic stay. It also states that "[Katzman's] complaint is predicated on an erroneous understanding of Section 11B-106.1(a) [of the Maryland Homeowners Association Act]."

The CCOC is required to issue a decision to either grant or deny the responding motion by Thursday, Oct. 4.

Katzman's complaint to the CCOC parallels a lawsuit filed by nine residents in July against LWCC that alleges its board of directors is illegally seated. As of Sept. 19, LWCC had not received service of the lawsuit.

In the required "desired actions" section of her CCOC complaint, Katzman requests that the CCOC coordinate with members of an unofficial club, JustUs, to dissolve the LWCC board of directors, reorganize community governance, and prevent current and past LWCC directors from holding a seat on any future LWCC board.

NEW ADMINISTRATION BUILDING

On Sept. 7, I asked our administration to give us the facts about structural flaws in the Administration

I'm pleased to say that I got a prompt response from the Leisure World Community Corporation executive secretary/treasurer Henry Jordan, who sent me a copy of a letter sent to residents earlier this year (although I don't remember getting it).

The letter listed a number of possible code violations, including asbestos and mold issues, safety/fire code requirements, and upgrade of electrical, mechanical and plumbing systems. It also stated that "foundation leaks have been discovered and water has penetrated into the underfloor ducting" and that "in 2017 and 2018 the mold situation has become more evident."

No other flaws were cited. There was no reliable estimate for the cost of repair, but the letter said that "nearly \$100,000 had to be spent in required...repairs during the recent upgrading/rehabilitation of Clubhouse I...Because Clubhouse I was built at about the same time as the Administration Building, it's reasonable to believe that similar structural problems exist."

Are they really going to spend \$6 million for a new building when repairing the existing one would cost \$100,000, according to their own estimate? Even if the cost of repairs is double or triple that, it still seems foolish.

Of course there are other concerns, such as space and access, but if more space is needed, why not use the space occupied by a real estate firm (which, in my opinion, shouldn't be there in the first place) or by Montgomery Mutual (which could supply its own space as other mutuals do)? The loss of rental income would be a pittance compared to \$6 million. As to access and parking, it has been satisfactory for 50 years, but, if needed, it could surely be improved without tearing down the whole building.

I wonder if part of the reason is the large amount of money in our Resales Fund, which collects two percent of every home sale at Leisure World. As I once said, if you give them the money, they will spend it. Maybe this resale tax should be eliminated, or at least reduced to one percent as it once was, before they spend more. But that's another issue. I think we should be very concerned about this \$6 million project. It's our money.





However, FISH also receives other donated items, such as incontinence aids, cushions, accessories for oxygen tanks and diabetic equipment, which are placed in the Clubhouse II basement and are free to anyone. Other giveaway items available include canes, elevated toilet seats, crutches and easy-reachers.

FISH Information

FISH's inventory includes wheelchairs (both large and small), walkers, commodes and shower chairs. New equipment is often lighter and has new features that make it more convenient. One of the better things about FISH is borrowers are free to try out something before spending money or committing.

FISH recommends a short loan period – one to three months. Residents who need to keep an item for longer as asked to call FISH president Beth Leanza at (301-598-4569).

All FISH members are volunteers – most do not have medical training, so be sure to check with a doctor or therapist before using a piece of medical equipment.

Volunteers are in the FISH office Monday to Friday (except for major holidays) from 10 a.m.-4 p.m. The office phone number is (301-598-1345).

FISH is always looking for new members. If interested, contact Beth at (301-598-4569). FISH suggests completing a training/ orientation session with a current volunteer.

Charitable Collections

Some organizations, such as the Kiwanis Club and Lions Club, have collection boxes in the FISH office. Kiwanis helps Ronald McDonald House by collecting can tabs. The Lions collect eyeglasses and hearing aids.

Residents or groups who want to start a collection, even for a short time, can contact FISH. Be sure to include your contact information on the collection box.

FISH also houses lost and found items. E&R staff members answer calls received before and after hours and on weekends. Let the staff member know you are looking for Lost and Found. A staff person can check for an item or let residents into the office to have a look.

Sept. 26: Learn About the **Relationship Between Trees and Water Quality**

n Wednesday, Sept. 26, Aubin Maynard, environmental planner for the Metropolitan Council of Governments, speaks on the importance of trees for maintaining good water quality in streams and river tributaries. The meeting is at 2:30 p.m. in Clubhouse I.

All of the streams coursing through Leisure World property flow into Bel Pre Creek, which in turn goes into the Northwest Branch and then into the Anacostia River.

What can residents do to help insure that Leisure World's stream water quality does not negatively affect life further downstream? Come to the LW Green meeting on Sept. 26 to find out!

'Trees in Trouble'

On Aug. 29, LW Green sponsored the showing of a film entitled, "Trees in Trouble." The film focused on one community in Cincinnati, Ohio, that is struggling to preserve its highly acclaimed and admired reputation as a city of trees.

Urban and suburban forests are being threatened by many dangers, including climate change. The film explained that invasive pests, such as the emerald ash borer, are another major threat.

This particular pest is rapidly spreading in the Mid-Atlantic States as well. It has infected many of the ash trees in Leisure World, approximately 95-100 percent according to the grounds and maintenance department.

Many of these may be removed unless they are judged suitable for an injectable insecticide, which, if done quickly enough after initial infestation, is the best chance to save some of the ash trees. A certified arborist or licensed tree expert can make

the diagnosis and direct the treatment.

Following the film, the more than 40 attendees entered into a wide-ranging discussion about trees in Leisure World. Several participants expressed distress over the large numbers of mature trees that have been cut down in

recent years. Some questioned whether there is a current census of trees within Leisure World (both Trust property and that

of all mutuals). The

grounds and maintenance department conducted a census for Trust property trees in 2018.

Another question was whether Leisure World has a certified arborist on site examining the trees on a cyclical basis to determine their health and treat any problems before they might worsen. Currently, Leisure World has a licensed tree expert. Leisure World's landscaping contractor McFall & Berry Inc. has a certified arborist that is on call and available to Leisure World.

Film Follow-up

As a direct follow up to this film, LW Green invited Laura Miller, arborist with Montgomery County Department of Environmental Protection, to speak on Sept. 12.

She discussed county programs that deal with the dangers trees are encountering and what residents can do to increase and preserve the presence of shade trees in the community.

She also explained "Tree Montgomery," an innovative program offered by Montgomery County Department of Environmental Protection that can help residents of multi-family dwellings, (such as mutuals), to plant more canopy trees on their property.

Can't Read Your iPhone? Help Is Here

Residents with limited vision may not be able to read this article, but the following information about magnifying iOS devices (iPad and iPhone) screens, when followed and practiced, can make it possible to use their devices again.

Zoom Controller

To set up an iOS device, turn on zoom controller in Settings > General > Accessibility > tap "Zoom", > then tap to turn on (green) the following: Zoom, Follow Focus, Smart Typing and Show Controller.

Return to any screen and look for Zoom Controller on the screen (a circle with a ball in the center surrounded by four solid triangles). To move it around, lightly drag it. Now the user can:

• Zoom in and out – Tap the circle and a menu in black background appears with the following major options.

- Choose Region This allows the user to select full screen zoom or window zoom (magnifying glass).
- Resize Lens This allows the user to make the magnifying window as large as needed by using the anchor points and dragging them.
- Choose Filter Used mostly for individuals with color-re-

lated vision problems. Experiment to find what's best for you.



When the magnification window is on, it will also magnify your typing so you can better see what

vou write. Note: When Follow Focus is enabled, the keyboard does not get bigger.



Model Railroad Club Club Holds First Authentic Operating Session

The Rossmoor Model Railroad Club has been in existence for about 10 years, and it now features large layouts in HO, N and O gauge, taking up several large cages in the basement of Clubhouse II.

The Club holds two open houses each year, and installs and manages a large G scale display in the Administration Building during the holidays. All this, but its never really had authentic 'operations.'

The toy train layouts of our generation's childhood, and the layouts of many adult modelers,

primarily run trains around in circles. In fact, the Club has always done that during its open houses, and will continue to do so.

Simulating real railroad operations requires knowledge and skill, as do the real railroad operations themselves. It's challenging work, and that's why engineers, conductors, schedulers and other railroad employees are well compensated. True model railroad enthusiasts don't run trains in circles; they operate.

Train Operations

The Club's large HO gauge layout was designed to support

real train operations. Like an actual railroad, it has supplier industries such as mines and factories, and customer industries that use the products of the supplier industries, including manufacturers (needing raw materials) and distributors and retailers, who often depend on delivery from their suppliers by railroad.

While trucking is used extensively for many local and regional deliveries, freight railroads are major factors in distribution of large, heavy goods, particularly over longer distances.

Simulating Railroad Operations

Over the last year, the Club has been working on developing the facilities to fully support simulated railroad operations, including development of hidden yards so that arrival of trains from distant locations can be simulated, thoroughly cataloging the Club's rolling stock (engines and freight cars) and developing manifests and supporting systems. The Club also expanded the layout to include additional industrial destinations.

It all finally came together on Sept. 6, when a number of Club members gathered during the Club's regular hours in the basement of Clubhouse II.

One of the members had prepared manifests the day before, indicating what cars had to be delivered to or picked up from industries along its route and where the cars that were picked up had to be delivered.

Highlights from the Day

The day's operations started with a Great Northern EMD SD7 road-switching engine leaving the storage yards with three boxcars, a refrigerator car (reefer), two cement cars and a caboose in tow.

It traveled many scale miles to its destination, the distant town of Mill Valley. There, it picked up two loaded Great Northern boxcars from Berwick Furniture, a manufacturer, and two additional ones from Atlas Machine works.

It also picked up two empty cement hoppers from Empire Cement (a cement distribution facility) and left two full ones for

them to unload. It then picked up an empty reefer from an icing plant. It picked up two loaded reefers at the Swift Slaughterhouse for distribution to their customers, and left the empty one from the icing plant.

Finally, some switching was required to get all of the cars behind the engine, with the caboose at the end. Once these maneuvers were complete, the train started on the long journey home.

Scale miles later, it arrived in the yard from which it had departed, depositing cars loaded with goods destined to customers and empty cars ready to be loaded by suppliers. The cars were routed by other trains to their final destinations, mostly represented by the hidden trackage.

To go beyond the electric trains of youth and learn what real scale model railroading is about, attend one of the Club's working and operating sessions held every Monday and Wednesday from 5:30-7 p.m., and Thursday from 2-4 p.m. at the train yards in the basement of Clubhouse II.

on numerous boards and advisory groups.

Recent polls have shown a large number of undecided voters, particularly among Democrats. The Oct. 1 forum is an opportunity to hear the candidates and ask some tough

questions.

Everyone Loves a Chess Player in Uniform

t is becoming an annual event.

On opening day of the college football season, many colleges unveil new uniforms. This year, the University of Maryland impressed the fashion world again with new, flashy football uniforms, resembling multi-colored slices of the state flag. Fashion critics might call it Picasso's rendition of the Maryland state flag.

The new, bold uniforms are designed by Under Armour, a sports apparel company founded in 1996 by Kevin Plank, a former special teams captain of the University of Maryland football team, when he was 23 years old. The company has a 10-year contract expiring in 2024 to supply the uniforms.

Plank has not forgotten his alma mater. In 2014, he pledged \$25 million to help the University build a Terrapin Performance Center for Maryland sports.

The uniforms are popular because they are made from special sweat-absorbing material and endorsed by star athletes. To market its products in the U.S., Under Armour advertises heavily and pays millions for endorsements. The company imports shoes and other sports apparel manufactured in several countries, mostly China, Vietnam, El Salvador and Mexico. About 97 percent of clothing sold in the U.S. is imported, according to the American Apparel & Footwear Association. Apparently, the jazzy uniforms have not improved the University's football record; the team has had losing records for the past three years.

Would chess players win more often if they wore uniforms? If so, what is an appropriate uniform for chess?

Some residents may remember the famous chess scene in the movie "To Russia with Love," in which James Bond and his opponent wore tuxedos in an elegant hotel ballroom. Of course, they played brilliant chess.


If players wear tuxedos or suits and ties to intimidate their opponents, what happens if both players wear the same uniform? Does that cancel the "intimidation effect?"

Here are some ideas for chess-wear.

• Eyewear – Goggles with blue glass will prevent opponents from discovering that you are sleeping between moves.

- Neckwear Stuffed pillows will enable players to sit tall while relaxing.
- Gloves Fingerless gloves will facilitate movement of pieces on the chessboard.
- Jerseys T-shirts with bright, bold colors (such as those of the Maryland state flag) can cause opponents to strain their eyes, not realizing why their eyesight is weakening during the game.
- Knee-wear Kneepads will prevent players from banging up their knees when bumping their legs against the table.
- Footwear Using athletic shoes with spikes to touch the opponent's legs casually under the table will make sure the opponent is unable to take naps between moves.
- Beachwear Casual clothing, such as beachwear, will make the opponent speed up moves, yearning for a quick end to the game to maximize vacation time.

At the Chess Club, members wear plain street clothes – no helmets, protective kneepads or shoulder pads, and never tuxedos. In the game shown on this page, Black's King is wide open, but it is Black's turn to move. Black can win



by checkmate in two moves. Do you see it?

The solution follows the usual message that the Chess Club meets on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays from 1-4 p.m. in Clubhouse II. Membership is free. SOLUTION: Black moves the Rook at e4 to e1, checking the White King and forcing the King to move to h2. Black then moves the Pawn from g2 to g1, promoting it to a Queen. Checkmate!

So, do not wait for a fashion statement. Do not wait for imported chess uniforms. Do not wait for clothing endorsements by star chess players. Play chess now!




