Comcast Xfinity Introduces 'Demo Days'

omcast Xfinity has scheduled informational sessions, dubbed "demo days," to help residents better use their cable TV services and devices.

Residents will learn more about how to use their X1 Voice Remote, and Comcast Xfinity representatives will engage in product demonstrations to show residents how to navigate their cable TV service.

The X1 Voice Remote is a remote control that allows its user to find what he or she wants faster by using voice commands to change channels, search for shows, get show recommendations and more.

The informational sessions are free, but registration is required. Residents may pick up tickets for a session at the Comcast office in the Harbor Room of Clubhouse I, which is open Monday, Tuesday and Thursday from 10 a.m.-6 p.m.,

Wednesday from 10 a.m.-7 p.m. and Friday from 10 a.m.-3 p.m. All informational sessions are held in Clubhouse I and are scheduled for 11 a.m.-12:30 p.m. and 4-5:30 p.m. on the following days:

Residents Receive Internet Service and Cable TV Upgrades

he doorbell trills inside a Creekside condo on a Wednesday morning in October, and homeowner Allen Solomon springs from his balcony's chair and heads to the front door.

A friendly-looking man wearing a Comcast Xfinity ID badge clipped to his belt loop and a ball cap emblazoned with "Comcast Xfinity" slides his toolbag through the home's entryway, gives a greeting to Solomon's wife, Syril, and begins inspecting

outlets.

A similar scene is playing out in phases across Leisure World as Comcast Xfinity technicians upgrade residents' cable TV equipment and install internet service as part of the community's new bulk rate agreement with the company.

For the Solomons, Comcast Xfinity's scheduled visit is a welcomed upgrade to the services - internet, cable TV and phone - they've enjoyed using in their home ever since they moved to Leisure

World from Westchester County, New York, about 10 years ago.

"We decided we were going to have the full suite of services, and Comcast was able to provide that," Allen says. "We've had Wi-Fi since the day we moved in."

Avid internet users since the technology's inception, the Solomon's bought their first home computer in 1990 and have both used computers for their work lives since the '70s.

Hispanos de Leisure World

José Soto isn't just the Hispanos de Leisure World's bingo caller, but the "bingo singer," in the words of Hispanos' vice president Loty Goldenberg. The Spanish letters and numbers, ring out in his big voice during the Group's bingo games in Clubhouse I.

These bingo games are a time for members of Hispanos de Leisure World to build closeness with their ethnic community and speak their native language with other members of Leisure World's Hispanophone population. The Group mainly comprises people born in Latin America, according to Group president Maria Blanco.

Soto adds personality to the games and garners laughs with his quirky bingo calls. The number eight is pronounced 'oito' instead of 'ocho'; the year of his birth is "a year of much light." New players sometimes need a bit of assistance keeping up with him, Goldenberg says.

Friendships Made and Kept

When she arrived at Leisure World with her husband, Goldenberg didn't know anyone else in Maryland. The very first Leisure World News edition she read announced the formation of the Hispanos. Goldenberg attended the Club's first meeting in 2007 and stayed because of the connections she made.

The Hispanos are foremost a social group whose emphasis is on making friends, according to Blanco. They have comforted each other through distress and difficulties such as spouses' illnesses; they provide companionship to the lonely.

When Goldenberg meets other Hispanic residents, she encourages them to join. She's discovered some in her own apartment building. "Eventually you hear them speaking Spanish," she says. They reveal their native tongue in speaking to building staff, for instance.

While the members share a language, a word as pedestrian as "bus" can vary widely among Spanish dialects.

Members have also learned about each other's cultures. On Leisure World's 50th anniversary in 2016, they shared artwork from their native countries.

A Full Calendar

The Group's special events include a Christmas party, to which members bring their families, and the yearly Friendship Festival in the summer, when Hispanos meet around the Clubhouse I lanai and bring dishes from their respective countries.

Once a year, they also see a production at the Olney Theatre.

The Hispanos also invite performers to Leisure World, and these shows attract residents both within and outside the Hispanic community. Goldenberg had encouraged "everyone she knew" to attend the recent performance by local artists Claudia Gargiulo and the D.C. Latin Ensemble.

Her neighbor, who was going to be out of town for a week during ticket sales, even asked her to buy her a ticket on her behalf because she didn't want to miss the show. Those who attended were impressed.

"People are still stopping me and congratulating us [for bringing the group]," Goldenberg says.

The Club's monthly film screenings in Spanish with English subtitles are also popular with non-Hispanic attendees.

The Disney film "Coco," which takes place in Mexico, recently received a large turnout. Some moviegoers are Spanish language learners seeking to exercise their listening comprehension. Goldenberg is pleased to introduce people to Latin American film, which she says gets little exposure in the U.S.

The Hispanos meet on Fridays at 3 p.m. in Clubhouse I. Their monthly movie screenings are open to all residents.

Tech Day has become a regular event at Leisure World, assisting residents who need that extra bit of help to master their technological devices. At the same time, the students earn service credits at their schools.

Solomon's home by helping Allen move the couple's coffee table and couch a few inches away from the wall to make the cable splitter inside the wall more accessible.

Ortiz unscrews the wall's plate that was hidden behind the couch, and a ball of jumbled wires tumbles out.

"I didn't realize there was that much gear back there," Allen says. Ortiz explains he will be replacing the Solomon's modem and one of the cable boxes today.

Each home's installation and upgrade may vary depending on whether or not the home is already a Comcast Xfinity subscriber and the level of service it's already receiving.

But regardless, per the community's new bulk rate agreement with Comcast Xfinity, every home in Leisure World has received or will receive (2) two-way HD digital cable terminals, (2) X1 voice remote controls, (2) digital transport adapter one-way receiver terminals and remote controls and (1) Wireless Gateway modem compatible with Comcast's Xfinity xFi service.

Residents can also purchase other Comcast Xfinity products and services such as the digital phone service known as VOIP (Voice over Internet Protocol) - which the Solomons have at an additional cost.

In the Home

"Can you do me a favor?," Ortiz asks Allen. "Can you turn on your televisions? I'm going to disconnect something here and

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I need to know which [cable] is which."

Solomon dashes around the house turning on TVs. "Do you need more light?," Allen asks Ortiz, as the sound of "The Price Is Right" audience applauds from the kitchen TV.

"There's an order for this type of equipment," Ortiz explains, all business as he kneels in the crook between the wall and couch while disconnecting


the splitter's cables one by one to identify which cable connects to which TV.

"This [TV] froze," Allen chimes in from the bedroom.

Ortiz, Allen and Syril then head into the kitchen to check out the TV's picture-quality. "Come on down," the show's announcer shouts, as if in unison with their arrival. Allen is happy to see the pixelation has disappeared.

"Both high-def boxes are working fine," Allen says, and Ortiz moves on to checking the home's landline phone for a dial

He points to what looks like a black box in his hand. "This is a magic box; it knows everything," he says with a grin. The black box he is holding is a cable meter

used to measure digital signal strength inside a home.

The box reads the signal and Ortiz uses a smartphone to see its signal level. Registering a flat line is typically a bad sign in other contexts, "but not in cable," Ortiz says.

The signal readings are saved on a Comcast Xfinity server, so if there's a problem in the Solomon's home in the future, Comcast Xfinity will know when

'It's a good way for us to do the job the right way, so we don't have to come back," Ortiz says.

"That's one reason I've gone with Comcast's VOIP," Allen says. "It's not the cheapest, but Denny here will be back if something happens that I don't understand. Other providers

provide you the service and say, Go with God.'"

We check everything," Ortiz says as he kneels on the floor to make sure the coaxial cable is flush to the wall to prevent pixelation.

As he wraps up his two and a half hours with the Solomons, moving the living room couch and coffee table back to their original spots, he even helps Allen install the Xfinity xFi app on his iPhone and shows him how to use it. The app allows Comcast Xfinity users to manage their home's Wi-Fi network.

The terms of Leisure World's new, eight-year bulk rate agreement for internet service and upgraded cable TV begin on Wednesday, Jan. 1, 2020.

Q&A

Q: I've heard the new bulk rate cable TV and internet agreement will make my monthly fee increase by \$55. Is that true?

A: No. The bulk rate agreement increases each unit's monthly fee by approximately \$30. The old bulk rate was \$29 per unit per month and included cable TV only. This rate will increase to \$55 (plus 3.75 for taxes and fees) and will include upgraded cable TV and internet service. The new rate for both cable TV and internet service takes effect Wednesday, Jan. 1, 2020.

Comcast Xfinity recently changed its channel lineup, removing the Turner Classic



Movie (TCM) channel from the bulk rate package and placing it in an entertainment/sports package.

The TV channel lineup is subject to change without notice per the terms of the bulk rate agreement.

Three different sessions, all tailored to residents' concerns, will be held in the morning, afternoon and evening. James Resnick, MCFRS senior outreach and education manager, will serve as coordinator and master of ceremonies for all three sessions.

All sessions are free, but residents are asked to register by calling the Clubhouse I E&R office at (301-598-1300). Residents are welcome to bring guests from outside Leisure World if the guest names are given to the main gate, available at (301-598-1044), in advance.

Morning Session

At the morning session from 10 a.m.-noon in Clubhouse I, MCFRS fire chief Scott Goldstein and assistant fire chief Dee Howard Richards will discuss "Interactions Between MCFRS and the Citizens of Leisure World."

They will talk about fire and emergency medical service and other all-hazard responses; what residents should expect of MCFRS; and what residents can do to improve the services that MCFRS delivers.

Afternoon Session

At the afternoon session from 1-3 p.m. in Clubhouse I, Mary-

They will also have an opportunity to write questions, comments and compliments on index cards to drop in a suggestion box. MCFRS personnel will review these remarks and provide answers to the questions within the following few days.

OUR LEISURE WORLD RESTAURANT FAMILY

have lived here for nine years and have often eaten at the restaurants in Leisure World. Until recently, I did not know the history until the owners gave me a quick lesson. The restaurant has been through several management companies.

The restaurants have all had major changes to bring the function and décor into the 21st century. The décor is refreshing and more modern. The Clubhouse Grille in particular has a great bar where you can eat and drink comfortably since you can get closer to the bar. The bar area is set up for happy hours and seems to be very popular for the different organizations that want an informal gathering.

The Terrace and Stein Rooms offer comfort food and specials on any day of the week. Saturdays have the "hamburger special" that attracts throngs of people. I have had each of the burgers and like them all, though my favorite is the "Clyde Burger," which is about three meals for me. The Terrace Room is bright and cheery, with a buffet that has a variety of hot and cold food.

If you haven't tried the Clubhouse Grille, you have missed out on very fine dining. I have eaten there often and enjoyed every item on the menu. I always compliment the chef and the owners. This season, my favorite was salmon piccatta, but I also liked the beef short ribs. I especially like the tables and chairs, which give more room between the tables.

You'll often see the current owners there trying to keep pace with the details of restaurant life, including deliveries, inventory-taking and catering to groups. The Clubhouse Grille has special waitresses able to determine your needs even before you sit. I've seen them serve to the blind very carefully, which is very important. They get you to a table that is perfect for your dining pleasure.

Along with them, get to know the other Grille staff who take great pride in knowing each customer and what they drink. You'll notice that the servers in the rooms are consistent and personally know their clientele.

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We Need to Talk: Family Conversations with Older Drivers

A ccording to the Federal Highway Administration, in 2017 there were approximately 28 million licensed drivers age 70 and older in the U.S.

And while there has been a decline in fatal accidents caused by older drivers, functional impairments (physical, cognitive and visual), along with medications associated with aging can interfere with one's ability to drive, and increases the risk of a crash, according to the Insurance Institute for Highway Safety. Yet a person's desire to maintain his or her independence keeps the

older driver on the road.

This three-session course, sponsored by AARP Driver Safety, guides families in determining when it is time for their loved ones to hang up the keys. While knowing when the time is right can be hard, surveys show that more than half of the older drivers whose family asked them to retire from driving said they listened to and followed the suggestion of others.



Registration and Space

Merchandise may not be placed on chairs or next to, or in front of, tables and racks. Space is limited; items placed around the rented space impede traffic and are a major safety concern and therefore will not be permitted. Tables, chairs or racks cannot be brought into the sale. (Display racks that fit on top of rented tables may be brought in).

Fair vendors may begin bringing in their merchandise at 8 a.m. The market opens to the general public at 9:30 a.m.



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

Get Your Flu Shot at the Medical Center

A flu shot walk-in clinic is available to all residents on Tuesdays from 9:30 a.m.-4:30 p.m. at the pharmacy in the MedStar Health medical center building. Bring a photo ID and insurance card.

Residents can also schedule a flu shot with the pharmacy on another weekday by calling (301-598-1005). Pneumonia, shingles and tetanus vaccines are also offered on clinic days or by appointment.

Patients who have an upcoming appointment with their primary care provider (Dr. Feldman, Dr. Ozanne-Johnson or Dr. Share) can receive a flu shot during their scheduled appointment.

Residents who are 65 years

and older will receive the FLUAD vaccine, and residents who are younger than 65 will receive the FluLaval vaccine. FLUAD adds an additional ingredient to boost the immune response and increase the vaccine's effectiveness.

The pharmacy's flu clinic replaces the flu clinic that was typically provided once a year to residents in Clubhouse I by the MedStar Visiting Nurse Association.

The medical center is located at 3305 North Leisure World Boulevard, adjacent to the Physical Properties Building. Residents coming to the medical center for a flu shot should enter through the main entrance, located at the rear of the building and facing the garden plots.

Oct. 26: Prescription Drug Take Back Day

The biannual National Prescription Drug Take Back Day is held on Saturday, Oct. 26.

Leisure World is designated as an official site for this event, at which residents may turn in their discontinued, outdated or unused medications at the MedStar Health medical center pharmacy, located at 3305 North Leisure World Boulevard.

The disposal service is free and anonymous. Keep in mind that needles, illicit drugs, thermometers, inhalers, aerosol cans, hydrogen peroxide, lotions and liquids are not accepted.

This service is provided for the safety and convenience of residents. Medications that may be ingested by accident or misused pose a health hazard to residents, children and pets.

Medical center staff and the Health Advisory Committee have received an overwhelming response from residents at past Drug Take Back Day events, and they hope to have a similar response for this event. The Committee encourages all residents to dispose of their unused, outdated and discontinued medications.

The National Drug Enforcement Agency implemented a National Prescription Drug Take

Back Day in 2010. Each year, two days are designated as drug take back days — one in April and one in October.

The Health Advisory Committee and the medical center pharmacy have established an ongoing Prescription Drug Take Back program in which residents may dispose of their unused medications throughout the year.

A green collection bin is located in the pharmacy's waiting room, and residents may drop off medications there Monday through Friday any time between 8:30 a.m.-5 p.m.

Chronic pain is a big problem all over the U.S., and Leisure World is no exception. Not only is it difficult to treat, but also treatment frequently includes the use of dangerous opioid drugs.

The Medicare open enrollment period runs through Saturday, Dec. 7, 2019. During this time, anyone enrolled in Medicare can change his or her prescription plan (Part D).

It is important those enrolled evaluate their Medicare Part D every year as formularies, prices and their medications can change. And evaluation may be done by researching the current plans on the (www.medicare.gov) website.

Residents who need assistance finding the appropriate Medicare Part D have two ways to get help. One is to contact their local Senior Health Insurance Program (SHIP) office at (301-590-2819) and ask for a Part D worksheet, or pick up a worksheet at the MedStar Health medical center in Leisure World.

Another option for residents is to contact the Leisure World Social Services Department at (301-598-1559) to have a Part D worksheet sent to them. The social workers can then assist the resident in finding the right plan for them.

Also, be aware that the State of Maryland has a program called Maryland Senior Prescription **Drug Assistance Program** (SPDAP) that helps people pay the premium for their Part D program. A resident whose total gross income is below \$37,470 (single) or \$50,730 (married) might be eligible for this program.

The program is available throughout the year. Assistance and applications are available at the Social Services Department in the medical center, located at 3305 North Leisure World Boulevard.

any Ceramics Club **1** members enjoyed a special technique class in carving in greenware on Aug. 24. The class was taught by Ghodsieh Vakili, a longstanding member of the Club and an expert in ceramics.

Vakili's talents are not only in carving greenware, but also in painting original designs on bisque and hand sculpting whimsical pieces in clay. Much was learned from

her expert demonstration and instructions on how to carve in greenware.

Ceramics Process

The process of creating a ceramic piece begins with tracing a design onto the greenware that has dried just a bit more than leather-hard. Greenware is what the clay is called once it is taken from the mold.

After tracing the design onto greenware using a special carbon paper for use on clay, the member paints the design with three coats of Cover Coat paint, and the ceramic piece is then fired to make it permanent.

Now that the design is painted, the member uses a stylus to carve around the outer edges of the larger portions of the design, leaving thinner portions with no carved lines. Any lines such as veins in leaves are done with a smaller stylus to create thinner lines.

The finished results are quite stunning, giving a 3-D appearance to the design. By

the end of the class, all 12 Club members had made true works of ceramic art.

Through the special technique classes conducted by the Ceramics Club, members can develop their talent in ceramics and produce their own lovely ceramic pieces.



Mexico, to avoid U.S. sanctions, is working to address the border crisis.

Mexico has provided a safe zone where migrants are fed and protected while their asylum requests are processed in the U.S., according to a July 19 article in the San Diego Union-Tribune to which Bersin contributed.

Milk was elected a member of the San Francisco Board of Supervisors in 1977, becoming the first openly gay man elected to a major public office.

His compelling message to the LGBTQ community was to "come out wherever you are." His prescient belief was that the visibility of members of the community was key in the struggle for civil rights and equal protections under the law.

LGBTQ Issues

On Oct. 10, Alliance members gathered to watch the CNN/ Human Rights Campaign "Power of our Pride" Town Hall featuring 10 of the top Democratic candidates for the Presidential nomination. The event was the first time ever that a major U.S. political party hosted and broadcast a candidates' town hall focused specifically on issues pertaining to the LGBTQ community.

On Oct. 8, the U.S. Supreme

Court heard arguments on whether or not LGBTQ people are to have employment protections against discrimination in the workplace. Currently in many states, people can be fired because they are LGBTQ.

Several members of the Alliance gathered on the steps of the Supreme Court to advocate in favor of employment protections for LGBTQ people.

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
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Jokester Sets Pace for Comedy Club Pun Parade

'Check' or Treat! Time for Halloween Knights

H alloween, the holiday that gives us an excuse to wear silly costumes and eat sugary candies, is one of the most commercial of U.S. holidays.

According to the National Retail Federation (NRF), the week before Halloween is the second busiest shopping week of the year. Consumers spend billions of dollars on candy, costumes, pumpkins and decorations.

Children of all ages dress up in masks and costumes and walk from house to house, seeking handouts. Parents usually accompany the younger ones. The threat is implicit: persons who do not give treats will suffer bad consequences. The term "trick or treat" entered the lexicon only as recently as the 1920s, according to Smithsonian Magazine.

This year the NRF expects
Halloween spending to reach
\$8.8 billion, of which \$2.7
billion will consist of decorations; \$2.6 billion, candy; and
\$390 million on greeting cards.
Twenty-nine million people will dress in costumes at a cost of
\$3.2 billion. These are impressive sales figures, considering
Halloween is not a gift-giving holiday.

Celebrants largely have forgotten the original religious purpose of the holiday. Halloween began hundreds of years ago as the Festival of Samhain in an ancient Celtic region in Britain. Held at the end of summer, the Celts believed it was the easiest time to communicate with the dead.

Around the world, people celebrate Halloween in different ways and sometimes on different days.

Ireland and Scotland celebrate the Festival of Samhain with bonfires, games and traditional foods such as barmbrack, an Irish fruitcake.

Japan has an annual children's parade (the Kawasaki Halloween Parade) with thousands of participants who must register and pay a fee in advance.

Mexico and parts of Latin America celebrate Día de los Muertes (Day of the Dead) on Nov. 1 and 2, when souls of the dead return to Earth to be reunited with their families and join the festivities.

During Pangangaluluwa, children in the Philippines go from door to door in costumes, singing and asking for prayers for those stuck in purgatory.

Every two years, Nigerians celebrate the Awuru Odo Festival for up to six months with feasts, music and masks, honoring the return of the dead to the spirit world.

World travelers (about 1,000 each year) visit Romania to celebrate Halloween by attending tours and parties at Count Dracula's castle in Transylvania.


Chess has not escaped the commercialization and spirit of the holiday. Players can buy novelty chess sets with Halloween characters: pumpkins, skeletons, mummies, vampires, wizards, witches, zombies, ghosts, goblins and ghouls. A set may sell for

hundreds of dollars, but can be used all year round (once the players learn how to tell the pieces apart from each other).

Also, Halloween has infiltrated chess itself with a variation of the four knights opening named for the holiday: "The Halloween Opening," or "The Halloween Gambit," or "The Halloween Attack."

The Chess Club does not celebrate Halloween, as games are usually played during the safety of daylight hours. In the game pictured on this page, it is White's turn to move. What is White's best move?

SOLUTION: White moves the Bishop to h6, uncovering the Queen and checking Black's King. Black can interpose the Rook at g4, but White's Queen captures the Rook, forcing the King to move to h7. White then moves the Queen to g7. Checkmate!
