# Coming Building Takes Shape

Project construction on the coming Administration
Building is currently on schedule, says Tom Snyder, senior project manager in the Physical Properties Department.

Roof framing on the building is complete on the lower level and expected to continue through October on the upper level, which has perimeter and interior wall framing in process. Rough-in mechanical and electrical work and sprinkler system piping is in process on the lower level.

WSSC's water supply connection is expected to begin in mid-October, extending from the Leisure World Shopping Plaza parcel to the new building. Traffic flow will be affected, with two-way travel necessary on one side of the Leisure World Boulevard median when trenching work begins. Residents will be asked to detour around the Boulevard loop road if possible.

Parking and traffic at the Administration Building parking lot will also be affected. The building's sanitary sewer connection is expected to begin across the lower golf parking lot in late October and continue into early November.

#### **Looking Ahead**

The final phase of the project is scheduled to begin in April 2024, after Leisure World of Maryland Corporation staff moves into the new building. This third phase will include demolition of the existing Administration Building, construction of the new parking lot that will include 18 ADA parking spaces, and construction of new sidewalks, curbs, gutters and paving.

The entire project is projected to be completed by summer 2024. Management will continue to keep residents updated on the status of the project's construction work.

## Board Approves 2024 Community Budget

The Leisure World Community Corporation (LWCC) board of directors passed a resolution at its regular meeting on Sept. 26 approving management's 2024 operating budget as presented.

The budget covers the funding needed to provide necessary services for Leisure World operations in 2024, according to the resolution's rationale. It was developed by management with input from the Budget and Finance Committee to ensure a well-balanced budget.

The budget amounts to \$16,634,585, a \$520,323 or 3.23 percent increase from 2023. In 2024, the Trust portion of each unit's monthly assessment will be \$244.91.

#### **Golf Carts**

The board passed a resolution authorizing the purchase of 36 golf carts from Capital Golf Carts at a cost not to exceed \$160,000, with the funds to come from Replacement Reserves.

"The golf cart model selected is a fuel injected cart that has low emissions and lower operating costs," according to the resolution's rationale. "These carts will be around for many years and will give us sufficient time to put the new infrastructure for electric carts in place, should we want to go in that direction."

Income from golf cart rentals is approximately \$100,000 annually, so Leisure World expects to recoup this investment within two to three years, the rationale stated.

#### **Board Rules Amendment**

The board passed a resolution amending its board rules. The amendment states that "new resumes for committee members being reappointed shall not be required."

"It was generally agreed at the August 2023 board meeting that it was not necessary for committee members to submit a resume for re-appointment to the same committee for a second year," states the resolution's rationale.





## With AEDs, Every Month is Heart Health Month at Leisure World

ebruary is officially National Heart Health Month, but with so many automated external defibrillator (AED) devices readily available on Leisure World Trust property, heart health is a priority all year

An AED is an easy-to-use medical device that can help those experiencing sudden

cardiac arrest by analyzing the heart's rhythm and, if necessary, delivering an electrical shock, or defibrillation, to help the heart re-establish an effective rhythm, according to (www. redcross.org).

by Leisure World News The Security and Transportation Department recently audited the AED devices that are in Trust property buildings to ensure they're working properly. The batteries in the devices were replaced, and they are now all fully functioning, says Security and Transportation director Jim Rudnick.

An AED is activated by pressing a button on the device, and a series of voice prompts give step-by-step instructions to the person using it. A person does not need medical training to use this lightweight, portable device.

### Chief Financial Officer Simon Suran Joins Management Team

hen Siman Suran began his new job as Leisure World's chief financial officer (CFO), gradually settling into his role was not an option: It was mid-July, right at the heart of the process of preparing the community's 2024 budget.

"[General Manager Bob Kimble and I] had to reconstruct everything that made sense" in the previous budget, he said, and in addition, "we had to change the whole presentation regarding revenues and expenses."

Even without getting a running start, he eagerly plunged into the challenge.

#### **Diverse Experience**

Before joining the Leisure World management team, Suran spent two years as the vice president of finance and accounting with the National Association of Manufacturers (NAM). There, he worked under the guidance of Fortune 500 company CEOs and CFOs who were members of the NAM's board of directors and finance committee.

Before his time at NAM, Suran spent eight years with National Hospice as vice president of finance, business strategies and technology.

His other experience as a finance and business executive extends across the nonprofit, public accounting, government, telecommunications, manufacturing, both within the U.S. and internationally.

He was born and lived in

the Fiji Islands for his first 27 years, then worked as CFO and controller for various companies across the South Pacific.

#### Leisure World Goals

In his new position at Leisure World, Suran is eager to apply his knowledge in accounting, business and technology. He sees "a tremendous opportunity to make Leisure World more sustainable and viable; there's an opportunity to streamline operations here," he said.

When asked recently about specific goals he hopes to achieve, he quickly listed several - working closely with mutual boards of directors and the Budget and Finance Committee, finding financial solutions that work in the best interests of residents and the community, ensuring all department heads have a comprehensive understanding of their own budgets, enhancing inter-departmental cooperation – before taking a phone call from the president of one of the mutuals' board of

His side of the phone conversation revealed even more.

"I want to show how everything was done before, and how I'll change it," he told the caller. "We'll have a dialogue and come to an agreement ... I want to show you guys what we are doing."

He continued: "With transparency, I want to build confidence back with respective boards and residents so they can know what they're paying for is put to good use," he said.

Lt. Irvin Smith, community action coordinator for MCFRS. He has been a member of MCFRS for more than 19 years. He received a Bachelor of Arts degree

in criminal justice from the University of Maryland.

After the speaker's presentation, the forum includes a question-and-answer period, during which members of the audience may ask questions of the speaker. The audience

will then move to another room for a breakout session at which refreshments will be served and various Leisure World and Montgomery County organizations will have a table of handouts along with representatives to answer questions.

The event is free, and residents are encouraged to invite family and friends who do not live in Leisure World

to attend. Masks are optional. Registration is not required.

### Fire Prevention Week

National Fire Prevention Week, Sunday, Oct. 8, through Saturday, Oct. 14, is a good time to reflect on fire prevention and fire safety for the Leisure World community.

From 2010 to 2020 in Leisure World, there were two civilian fire fatalities, two civilian fire injuries, three fire service injuries and multiple structure fires of various types, for a total recorded fire loss for all fires of \$4,707,675, according to MCFRS.

The history of National Fire Prevention week began with the Great Chicago Fire (Oct. 8-10, 1871), which burned through Chicago, destroying large areas of land, killing more than 300 citizens and leaving thousands of people homeless. To raise awareness of the horrors of preventable fires (and bring fire safety to the forefront of public consciousness), the first presidential proclamation of Fire Prevention Week was established by the 30th U.S. President, Calvin Coolidge, in 1925.

The theme for National Fire Prevention Week 2023 is "Cooking safety starts with you! Pay attention to fire prevention." Cooking fires are the number one cause of home fires and home fire injuries, according to the American Red Cross.

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## More Electric Vehicle Charging Stations Open Within Leisure World

7 illa Cortese has joined The Greens II in offering electric vehicle charging stations (EVCS) for electric and hybrid vehicles for use by all residents and their guests.

The charging stations are located across from 14809 Pennfield Circle, Villa Cortese building 4. The Red line shuttle bus stops at that building.

The Villa Cortese chargers are level 2, the most common type found in residential, commercial and municipal settings. Vehicles take four to 10 hours to charge, depending on the size and the charge level of the battery.

#### **How to Use**

Registration with the mutual is not required to use the EVCS, but users must open an account with ChargePoint, the operator of the stations, and install its app on their smartphone.

The app is available from Google Play and the Apple App Store; information about the app is available at (chargepoint.com) > For drivers > Meet the Charge-Point app.

Users can use the ChargePoint app to determine if a charge head is free, to make reservations and to pay their bill. When users want to start a charging session, they hold a fob from ChargePoint on their smartphone or against the reader on the station until it beeps.

The initial rate for charging is 31 cents per kWh delivered to the vehicle while charging. The total cost of a charge depends on the type and size of the battery in the vehicle and how much energy it used before starting a charging session.

If users fail to be courteous and thoughtful of other drivers, Villa Cortese's board may adopt a penalty for remaining parked in the EVCS station after a charging session ends. But it hopes that this step will be unnecessary.

#### **Acquiring an Electric Vehicle**

Montgomery County is making it easier to purchase electric vehicles (EVs), according to a September

County Executive update. The county launched the **EV Purchasing Co-op last** year – an effort to engage and educate residents who are interested in making the switch to EVs. More than 1,100 county residents have already joined this co-op and have pledged to go electric, according to the update.

As a result, local dealerships are lining up to offer incentives on the County's EV purchasing Co-op Dealership Incentive website, (https:// bit.ly/3EPlNV7). It could be a great resource to check if in the market for a new vehicle. 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# Residents With Technology Expertise Encouraged to Apply for Committee Membership

(LWMC) senior management in areas of technology such as telecommunications, information technology (IT) networks, computer systems and software.

Electric vehicle charging stations (EVCS), computer literacy for residents, and oversight of the Comcast Xfinity bulk TV and internet agreement are also part of the committee's mission.

While the Committee is not responsible for the functioning of Comcast Xfinity service or LWMC's telecommunications or IT services and systems, it does act in an advisory capacity and assists LWMC management with projects, such as its recent oversight of the upgrade to the sound system in the Clubhouse II Auditorium. It also advises about EVCS policy and the services of Shipshape IT, LWMC's IT services provider.

In the fourth quarter of 2023, the committee continues its focus on replacement of the business phone system used by LWMC employees. Issues for 2024 include renewal of the Comcast Xfinity bulk contract for cable TV and internet, IT support for mutual property managers and mutual assistants

and designing programs that can help residents learn how to use devices such as smartphones, computers, tablets and voice assistants.

The Technology Committee takes its mission seriously and tries to provide valuable assistance to the community. Its limited roster of seven members is an efficient, functional group that is bringing technological leadership to Leisure World. Its membership is limited to those residents who have technical aptitude and competence, but its meetings are open to all.

Applications for membership are welcome during committee membership recruiting season, which ends Sunday, Oct. 15.

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## Committee Recommends Approval of 2024 Community Budget

**¬**he Budget and Finance Committee (BFC) reviews Leisure World financial reporting and assists management in developing the community's operating budget.

The Committee also advises the Leisure World Community Corporation (LWCC) board of directors on financial matters and recommends actions prior to their approval.

#### **Budget**

The 2024 budget cycle is coming to a close. The BFC worked with management this summer to develop a balanced budget that would sustain community services while at the same time ensuring fiscal restraint.

The budget recommendation sent to the LWCC board of directors by the Committee endorses management's budget of a 3.23 percent increase, which

is slightly above the budget cap of 3.1 percent imposed by Trust bylaws. The impact to owners should be minimal since the expected increase for those relying on Social Security or Federal pensions should also see a similar increase in their income matching the increment to the Community Facilities Fee, or Trust portion of their monthly asssessment.

Not to minimize these costs to owners, each mutual will also have budget increases specific to their residential needs, and this will likely raise monthly costs beyond what Leisure World charges each unit through its Community Facilities Fee.

#### **Looking Ahead**

The BFC's work is still incomplete. The 2022 draft audit report has finally been issued by the community's outside accountants. A preliminary review of the report indicates a brighter picture

than Leisure World's Accounting Department revealed as of Dec. 31, 2022. The BFC along with management will review the results and determine the amount mutuals may be receiving based on a potential surplus.

Lastly, at the September BFC meeting, management introduced a draft capital budget for 2024 that includes major replacements and enhancements for community facilities. Some proposed enhancements were challenged by members at that meeting, and this budget will be further explored at the meeting on Wednesday, Oct. 18, at 10 a.m. via Zoom.

#### **Consider Applying**

The BFC has begun the process of recruiting new members to join the Committee and volunteer their services in 2024. The application deadline is Sunday, Oct. 15, which is only a few days away.

Check (residents.lwmc.com) for information describing the level of expertise and experience required to join this committee.

Meetings are held monthly except during the summer months when budget development requires meeting more often.

#### **DEER-AUTO HAZARD**

was driving my little Prius on Leisure World Boulevard within the speed limit when a mature doe suddenly leaped in front of my car. I swerved and managed not to hit her. Once in Wyoming, I did hit a doe, which crashed through my windshield and destroyed the front of my vehicle.

While driving from Clubhouse II on the day of my near accident, I saw more than 20 deer grazing near the road; there were more in the shadows. I fail to understand why Leisure World management allows residents to take risks colliding with deer.

I understand that our deer are charismatic. For example, I stopped my car earlier this year on the Boulevard to

allow two fawns, just born, to wobble across the road like Bambi on the iced pond. I smiled with pleasure the entire time I watched the babies and their mom.

But cute fawns have no bearing on the issue I bring up — our driving safety with a large deer population that could be controlled if the desire were there. I believe that the Leisure World deer count may be far greater than the ecological carrying capacity of our green space. We should do some research to determine if the herd is oversized and, if so, determine what needs to be done. Could someone sue if they had a car-deer accident because the herd is too large, and management knew it all the time?

be high. Given that, once management gets the information on our deer herd size versus grazing space, I recommend we have a community informational meeting and. after a community referendum by individual vote, come to a proper decision. It might take time to get it all together, but it seems the prudent thing to do.

Indeed, if our deer were carrying Lyme disease and residents and their dogs commonly contracted it, I suspect the herd would have been culled already as a public health measure.

Let's not have someone unnecessarily killed or maimed due to a car-deer collision.

#### TIME TO UPGRADE THE PPD KEY **CUTTER?**

n Aug. 7, I went to the Physical Properties Department (PPD) warehouse to get a duplicate key cut. The new key wouldn't open my lock, so I returned to PPD a few days later for a re-do, which also didn't open the lock. After two more visits to PPD resulted in unsuccessful duplicate keys, I got a refund.

The PPD warehouse employees (Steve and Kalil) were apologetic that they had not provided satisfactory service and for the inconvenience to me. The employees were certain that they were using the correct key blank and were mystified about not being able to cut a workable key for me. In my opinion, they did the best they could.

Later, I was able to get an establishment outside of Leisure World to cut a workable duplicate from the same key I had presented at PPD. Thus, I am inclined to attribute the flaw to the PPD key-cutting machine, not the skill of the warehouse employees. Perhaps the PPD key cutting machine, including its age, should be thoroughly assessed. A reasonably-priced upgrade to an automatic/electronic version may be worthy of consideration.

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## ELECTRIC INFRASTRUCTURE AT LEISURE WORLD

In a July 21 Thoughts and Opinions letter, I discussed the lack of information given to residents during and about electric power outages. Since then, there have been several more outages for hours at a time, and while we were told to contact the Main Gate to report and to get information about power outages, the gate personnel had no accurate information.

Providing reliable and accurate information may be beyond the guards' capabilities, but if that is the case, Leisure World management needs a plan that will alert them to power (or other emergency) issues, get repairs underway-and to communicate with residents rapidly, accurately and regularly.

But, besides communication, there is still the fundamental question as to why there have been so many outages of late — at least three in the areas of Mutuals 16 and 18 and at least two long-term outages at other mutuals. While I have no accurate data, my sense, and that of others, is that the number of Leisure World power outages has increased considerably. However, I have seen no information as to why this is happening or what is being done about it.

The fact that we are having many more outages and that they last for hours, if not days, is very disturbing. What can residents do when their homes are without power for 10, 20, 40 or 72 hours? Some can go to neighbors, family or hotels, but this is very inconvenient, and for longer outages, there can be problems such as food spoilage and lack of temperature control in homes. Most importantly, many residents cannot leave their homes easily, especially if they need specialized and hard to move medical equipment. Thus, having reliable power is a real necessity for some residents.

The Leisure World Strategic Plan made it clear that, as the community's facilities age, its infrastructure also ages. The plan also suggests that we should anticipate infrastructure failure and be proactive to prevent it. A critical part of this infrastructure is our electric power system!

Pepco is responsible for power until just before it enters our homes or condos, and it seems that this is where most of the power failures arise. Thus, it is necessary to get Pepco to fully evaluate and upgrade its infrastructure within Leisure World. Upgrading our power cables may be costly, but the costs will be much higher if we have massive future failures.

I would like to offer several suggestions to our leadership.

First, they should prioritize power issues by strongly pushing for a complete evaluation by Pepco and then pressure them to think and act in terms of preventive upgrades and repairs. This should be as high a priority for our community as more "visible" infrastructure such as roads, drainage, etc.

Second, it is not clear who at Leisure World deals with power outages, communicates with Pepco and works to protect the health and safety of residents. In the recent outages in Mutual 16, it took several days for residents to even get a communication from management about the outage, and it was not particularly useful!

The point is that while we cannot prevent outages, Leisure World needs to be far more proactive to protect and help residents. I have heard that general manager Bob Kimble reached out to contacts at Pepco to try and resolve issues in some of the recent outages, but I have no idea if these contacts made a difference (there was nothing about this in Leisure World News). I applaud Mr. Kimble's attempts, and hope he continues this until he gets the response needed by our community.

Indeed, perhaps what we need is for our leadership to insist that we have a very high-level contact at Pepco who can expedite solving our problems and ensure that evaluating and upgrading our power infrastructure is at the top of their priority

list. Perhaps Mr. Kimble, on behalf of our approximately 8,500 voters, should reach out to our state and local representatives and get their very active involvement to help their voting constituents.

## MORE ON THE MEANING OF 'ACTIVE ADULT'

In a recent Thoughts and Opinions letter, a writer suggested "it is time to

start advertising Leisure World for what it was really meant to be...an age 55-plus active adult retirement community...not a continuing care community," and, "It is unfortunate when people move in at an age when they can't participate in all the activities the community offers."

Some thoughts about those comments:

- "All" activities? Was that a typo?
- Leisure World is advertised as an age 55-plus active adult retirement community.
- Obviously, a person does not have to participate in Leisure World activities to be considered an active adult! For example, they could be a consultant working online, or they could be babysitting grandchildren.
- The writer conflates age with participation. Participation is determined by interests, health, situation, schedule, support, ambulation, disability, volunteering or working, traveling, entertaining, Covid-cautiousness, friends, finances, obligations and responsibilities. An older person might be entirely able to participate, whereas a younger person might not.
- Which is it? Is the writer suggesting people not move here if they are above a certain age, or if they cannot participate?
- Obviously, an able-bodied person of any age will grow older and may develop health issues. Does the writer believe there should be an upper age limit? Will she move out before she reaches that age?
- Non-participants are nevertheless paying a full condo fee, in effect subsidizing others.
- Imagine if realtors were to tell prospective residents they should not move in if, due to disability (not age, because aging does not preclude participation) they "can't participate in all the activities." They would be in violation of the Fair Housing Act, Title VIII of the Civil Rights Act of 1968, U.S. federal legislation

that protects individuals and families from discrimination in the sale, rental, financing or advertising of housing. The Fair Housing Act, as amended in 1988, prohibits discrimination on the basis of race, color, religion, sex, disability, family status and national origin. Note the word, "disability."

The Lions' Vision Support Group's next meeting is on Wednesday, Oct. 11, at 2 p.m. in Clubhouse II. The speaker is Neely Oplinger, executive director of the Metropolitan Washington Ear (MWE).

The non-profit organization provides reading and information services for blind and visually

impaired people. "It's a lifeline; that's what we hear from listeners," Oplinger said in a recent interview. "For some people, it reduces the feeling of isolation and the frustration of not being able to do everything."

MWE volunteers read aloud key stories from local papers and magazines so they can be digitized, broadcast and then heard by listeners 24/7 using special free radios provided by the organization. A separate Metropolitan Ear telephone service provides listeners with even more information.

MWE also offers audio descriptions for local live theater performances, enabling blind and visually impaired people to better enjoy the arts.

#### **Guidance and Peer Support**

The Support Group's articles often offer information

about issues related to low vision. However, the information does not replace regular consultations or visits with eyecare

professionals.

Feel free to join the Support Group's meetings whether visually impaired or fully sighted. If residents have questions, members either have or will find the answers. Vision loss is often frightening, but members have experienced it, survived and even thrived.

The Support Group helps residents and their loved ones navigate through vision loss. Remember that once a person's visual impairment is accepted, he or she can find the tools and learn the skills needed to live a normal life.

# FISH Accepts Donations and Lends Assistive Equipment

Friends In Sickness and Health (FISH) is collecting cardboard tubes (toilet paper and paper towels centers) for a resident who donates them to a classroom.

The FISH office also has a drop-off box for the Lions Club to collect eyeglasses and hearing aids. It also has a box to collect pop tabs from cans to raise funds for Ronald McDonald House, which provides low-cost accommodations for families that have a child receiving cancer treatment far from home.

#### **About FISH**

In addition to collecting for causes, FISH's primary mission is to accept donations of assistive equipment such as wheelchairs, shower chairs, commodes and walkers and lend these items indefinitely or give them to residents.

FISH lends equipment for as long as the borrower needs it – no fee, and no prescription needed. FISH volunteers try to ensure donated equipment is safe to use but encourage residents to check with a medical professional before borrowing an item. Donations are sanitized.

Don't like an item? Just return it to the FISH office. A person such as a neighbor or family member is welcome to borrow an item on a resident's behalf. He or she will only be asked to provide the borrower's name and phone number.

Keep in mind that FISH is not a 501(c)(3) and cannot issue receipts for donations.

#### **FISH Office**

To get to the FISH office, walk directly down the corridor from the Lifestyle office toward the Ceramics Studio. The FISH office is near the end of the corridor on the left. The parking lot around the back of Clubhouse II near the tennis courts is the one closest to FISH.

The FISH office's schedule is available online at (https://rb.gy/xk33qa). FISH is open Monday to Friday (except major holidays) from 10 a.m.-1 p.m., 1-4 p.m. or both sessions.

Call the FISH office at (301-598-1345) or visit (https://rb.gy/xk33qa) to see if a volunteer is on duty. Donating, returning and borrowing items is best done when a volunteer is there.

#### **Medical Equipment**

Much like FISH, Maryland Durable Medical Equipment Re-use accepts donations of medical equipment that it lends to people. An appointment is needed, and the borrower must fill out a loan form. The organization does not enter private homes. For information, call (240-230-8000).

#### **Lost Something?**

FISH also houses lost and found items that are turned in to the Lifestyle office. The items are stored in the FISH office's closet. The volunteer on duty can search the closet for your lost item. Among other things, the closet has a few phones and lots of orphan earrings.

Volunteering with FISH is not complicated – it just involves some simple filing. And it feels so good to help someone! A kind, generous attitude is the most important attribute for a FISH volunteer to possess.



The Landscape Committee plans to produce a map and a detailed description of each of these areas.



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
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# Oct. 11: Collector Presents 'Amethyst Country: Rio Grande do Sul, Brazil'

more multiracial, inclusive and engaged democracy that allows people to listen to and respect one another's humanity and voice.





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
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# Need to Get Rid of Your Digital Junk? Here's How

hile some seniors are not quite ready to sign on, it is clear that the age of technology is here to stay, and there is a growing pile of digital trash to prove it.

So, it's not surprising that those residents of Leisure World who have happily embraced technology may find themselves

wondering what to do with a box full of outdated computers,

pads, pods, phones and cables, not to mention unrecognizable black boxes whose origins are long forgotten.

The answer could be Leisure World Tech's recent partnership with Phoenix Computers, a non-profit organization located in Rockville that provides recycling services for computers and related equipment.

"Phoenix Computers refurbishes donated equipment and redistributes it to low income and disabled users at affordable prices," said David Merritt, vice president of Leisure World Tech. "We now have an agreement with them that enables Leisure World residents to use their services."

In the past, the Technology Resource Center accepted used equipment, but in most cases the volunteer staff was not able to salvage it for reuse, Merritt said. "Phoenix Computers is set up to deal with donations and to get refurbished devices into the hands of people who need them. The center is no longer accepting used equipment."

Giving old equipment a new purpose also keeps it out of landfills where toxic chemicals used in the manufacture of the devices can leach into the soil and groundwater. "It is estimated that every week more than 16 tons of computer equipment is thrown into local landfills," according to Phoenix Computer's website.

Phoenix accepts many different types of computers, working or non-working. Peripherals, such as keyboards and mice, must be in working condition. For more information, call (301-881-4500) or visit (www. phoenixcomputers.info/index.

Donated equipment must be taken to the organization, which is located at 11910-G Parklawn Drive in Rockville. The center is open on Mondays and Wednesdays from 10 a.m.-4 p.m. Donations may be tax deductible.

**¬**he Democratic Club's membership meeting is on Wednesday, Oct. 18, at 7 p.m. in the Clubhouse I Crystal Ballroom.

The meeting will focus on defending our LGBTQ+ neighbors. They have faced increased hate activity in the past few years, including having some school systems and libraries ban inclusive books. Several Leisure World clubs are participating, including the Progressives Club, LW LGBTQ Alliance and Unitarian Universalists of Leisure World.

The meeting's featured speaker is Montgomery County Council President Evan Glass, along with advocates from the LGBTO+ activist community.

Be sure to note the meeting's different time and date.

### **Full House for Winning** Wednesday

The Club had a full contin-

gent of volunteers for its first Winning Wednesday." These "Winning Wednesday" parties continue Oct. 11 and 25 from 1-3 p.m. in Clubhouse II.

EMOGRATIC Club members and other residents write postcards, letters, emails and texts to constituents in neighboring Virginia, which holds its state legislative races on Tuesday, Nov. 7. Both its state House and Senate chambers are nearly equal and are within a few votes of switching parties.

Do the Club's efforts produce results? "Swing Blue Alliance focused its 2020 voter outreach efforts on sending vote-by-mail applications to Democratic voters who were less likely to vote," according to the organization's website.

Some key findings:

• A postcard with a tear-off application for an absentee ballot increased overall

turnout by 2.6 percent in **Broward County (Palm** Beach), Florida

• Vote Forward, an organization that writes letters to

> voters, found that partially handwritten letters across a variety of election contexts generally provided a small turnout boost of up to 3.4 percent

Is that important? In 2022, 18 House seats and four Senate seats – and control of the Senate and House – were so close that they weren't decided until several days after the election.

Those who can't stay at the Winning Wednesday parties can instead take materials home to complete. The program continues on the second and fourth Wednesday of every month until the end of 2023.

### **Newest Board Member**

E. Felicia Brannon, the Club's newest board member, has an extensive background in health and transportation issues. Prior to moving to Leisure World, Brannon spent more than 30 years specializing in government and community relations, working in the nonprofit, public, private and academic sectors.

Her most recent position prior to moving the Leisure World several years ago was as the executive director of community and local government relations with the University of California, Los Angeles (UCLA). In that capacity, she provided leadership and counsel to UCLA's senior administrators and departments in the areas of transportation, planning and land use management, as well as sustainability and student affairs.

Additionally, she worked to increase UCLA's visibility in the community to strengthen the school's relationships with local government officials and related community groups. Brannon spent much of her time on difficult local Los Angeles transportation issues. She also served as chair of the board of directors for Habitat for Humanity in Los Angeles.

Since moving to Leisure World, she has taken on local transit issues, working with District 19 delegation and local leaders. As a member of the Democratic Club's legislative advocacy committee, she testified in Annapolis in favor of a bill establishing a "rare diseases" advisory panel and raising awareness of secondhand smoke health issues, while also serving as a member of the Maryland Advisory Council on Health and Wellness.



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# **Great Speakers Coming to Club**

ext month, the Republican Club will hear from Tom Royals, a candidate for the Maryland's 4th Congressional District.

The Club will also hear from Gilberto Zelava from the County Board of Elections and Leisure World resident and Montgomery County Republican Central Committee member Bob Fenichel, who will discuss the Republican National Committee's "Bank Your Vote" campaign.

### **School Board Protests**

At the Club's September Meeting, Lindsey Smith of the Montgomery County Chapter of Moms for Liberty discussed the recent protests at the Montgomery County Public Schools' school board.

Parents are protesting the implementation of the curriculum that the Club believes

pushes an LGBTQIA+ agenda and presses students to question their sexual identity at all grade levels.

She said the curriculum is part of the Maryland State Department of Education "blueprint" that was required to be implemented into each county by 2023. Club members learned that some parents are pressing for "opt out" options, but the Board of Education is refusing their request.

Smith said that it is very difficult to "opt out" when these agendas are so embedded in the reading. English and other core subjects, she believes.

Some questioned whether the group was pushing "book banning" and "hate mongering" against LGBTQIA+ students. Smith responded that the opposite is true. She said no one is proposing banning any books; they are opposed to

teaching values that they feel are in conflict with those of the majority of county parents and creating confusion in young children that are not mature enough to comprehend what is being discussed.

Smith also noted that only three members of the Board are up for election in 2024 (one "at large" member and one each from Districts 2 and 4).

### **Term Limits**

The Club also heard from Laura Benson, a volunteer for the Committee for Better MoCo Government, a non-partisan group formed to limit the number of terms a MoCo County Executive may hold.

Residents of all affiliations (individuals and businesses) have been very supportive of the 2T ballot initiative;

10,000 registered voter signatures are needed to get the initiative on the ballot in 2024. County Council members are currently subject to three terms (12 years).

Currently, the County Executive can serve three consecutive terms (12 years) and the ballot initiative would reduce that

> to two consecutive terms (eight years). The current County Executive, Marc Elrich, was elected to the position in 2018. He had previously served three terms (12 years) on the

S everal Leisure World groups jointly present a forum addressing assaults on the LGBTQ community and measures to defend the rights of individuals from those assaults. The forum is on Wednesday, Oct. 18, from 7-8:30 p.m. in the Clubhouse I Crystal Ballroom.

All are welcome; registration is not required. The groups presenting the forum include the Progressives Club, LW LGBTQ Alliance, Democratic Club and Unitarian Universalists of Leisure World.

Speakers include Evan Glass, Montgomery County Council president; Tramour Wilson, senior director of advocacy and community engagement at The Pride Center of Maryland; and Brigida Krzysztofik, chief of staff for Del. Bonnie Cullison.

### **About the Speakers**

Glass is the first openly

LGBTQ+ individual to serve on the Council. In 2020, he worked to pass the Montgomery County LGBTQ+ Bill of Rights, which strengthens the County's legal protections for lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender and queer residents by expanding the County's anti-discrimination code to include gender expression and HIV status.

The LGBTQ Bill of Rights explicitly bans LGBTQ+ discrimination in healthcare facilities, nursing homes and personal care facilities.

The Maryland Pride Center has been working since 1977 as a catalyst uniting and empowering sexual and gender minorities in Maryland and advocating for a better quality of life for the entire community, according to its website. Cullison played a key role in the successful 2012 effort to legalize same-sex marriage in Maryland. She also co-sponsored the Youth Mental Health Protection Act which was signed into law in 2018 and bans "conversion therapy" for minors. (Conversion therapy aims to change a person's sexual orientation or gender identity and has been

widely condemned by mental health professionals).

# Focusing on Health in the New Membership Year

WAAAC opened the 2023-24 year at its membership meeting on Sept. 6 with welcoming drums, renewed fellowship, plans for operations in the new year and a focus on health.

The latter included remarks by George McFarland, MSW, and Dr. Nkossi Dambita, program manager and clinical director, respectively, of the African American Health Program (AAHP).

The AAHP is a program of the Montgomery County Department of Health and Human Services and is administered by McFarland and Associates. According to its FY 22 annual report, the AAHP seeks to work with groups such as LWAAAC,

as well as individuals, to "...create a better, healthier future for Black/ African American County residents."

Both McFarland and Dambita urged LWAAAC members to partner with the AAHP in their efforts and become more engaged and intentional in their own healthcare. LWAAAC encourages members to begin their new health awareness by observing "Healthy October."

### **Second Thursdays**

One option available to help LWAAAC members monitor their health is "Healthy Thursdays," a collaboration that began pre-pandemic between the AAHP and LWAAAC.

Specifically, on most second Thursdays of the month, the program administers screenings for high blood pressure, as well as cholesterol and glucose levels, by AAHP outreach staff under the direction of community health worker Juliette Williams.

Robina Barlow, the AAHP's plant-based nutritionist and Food for Life instructor, offers

coaching on the preparation of "tasty, uncomplicated," plant-based recipes, according to Gail Cooper, LWAAAC's liaison with the AAHP. Cooper, who has been in this role for about two years, was pleased with the good turnout on Sept. 14, referring to it as a "step in the right direction."

The Thursday program was offered only by Zoom during the Covid pandemic, but attendance seems to be building back to pre-lockdown, in-person levels.
















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# Special Relatives' Influence Lives On in Writers' Stories

The Sept. 7 meeting of the Writers of Leisure World began with a surprise announcement: John Moens will publish his favorite stories in book form.

Woody Shields has saved more than 140 stories by Moens, and the Group reviewed the stories and ranked the essays. Moens is to select his favorites for the book.

Diane Reynolds read "Shocking," a summary of three shocking incidents, two of which were potentially fatal. Joe Fleckenstein concluded "The Snow Queen Contest," and a kerfuffle breaks out among the story's contestants and judges.

Three special people were lauded in other manuscripts shared: Viola Stendardi recalled "My Grandmother" while Richard Eisner focused on an equally special person, "Mom," and Jane Silverman read "A Rose for Alia."

Stendardi's grandmother, Guiseppina Del Pizzo, boarded a ship in 1906 Italy bound for America with an infant in her arms. The infant grew up to be Stendardi's mother.

English was Eisner's mom's second language, but she spoke it with perfect diction. He recalled her reading to him while he sat on her lap at the age of three. She encouraged him to always take responsibility for his mistakes.

"During COVID, [Alia] sang with me, played games with me, filled my life with noise... She was my outside world," Silverman wrote of her then three-year-old granddaughter. A professional artist, Silverman displayed a 3-D portrait of Alia; the hands in the portrait hold paper flowers.

Joel Katz described an

"Emergency Pit Stop," noting it was embarrassing to be in a group of bicyclists when nature called. Beth Leanza is now able to sleep comfortably with a CPAP, but before that, she experienced "CPAP Confusion," chronicling one mishap after another.

In chapter two of "Hell and Texas" by Moens, Toby and

Hattie cross the dreaded Nueces Strip to escape slavery in Texas. By the end of the chapter, they find freedom and marry.

Shimmering sidewalks weave through "Our

World," as Carole Muller looks down from her office window. And yet, people continue to pollute the only home we have. She asked her sister why she needed a large SUV. "It is fun sitting up there looking down on people."

Patricia Williams previously read chapters from her book on a serial killer entitled "Buried Beneath," but her poem "Shame" deals with killing on a smaller scale. "I face my accusers – Juneau, the dog, Polly the parrot. 'How could you?' they ask. Polly is horrified. I love animals. I collect

them. I commune with them. How can I ever face them again when last night I ate a pigeon?"

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# No More Ticker Tape

W hen Bobby Fischer won the world chess championship by defeating Russia's Boris Spassky in Iceland in 1972, New York City did not give him a ticker tape parade.

However, Mayor John Lindsay did present him with a gold medal before about 1,000 people at a City Hall ceremony. In turn, Fischer gave the Mayor a pocket chess set, and commended the game as mental exercise.

Lindsay was opposed to ticker tape parades, which were expensive. Costs of these events vary, but the two-hour event generally costs about \$2 million, with \$1.5 million coming from New York City tax dollars and \$450,000 from private donations (mainly from the Downtown Alliance), according to the Wall Street Journal. Most of the costs are for police overtime and sanitation cleanup.

The volume of trash collected after each parade also varies. As reported in a 1984 New York Times article, according to New York City sanitation records, cleaners collected 5,438 tons of trash after the two-day VJ Day celebration in 1945, whereas they collected only 43 tons in 1979 after Pope John Paul II's parade in a driving rain. Evidently, there is more in the trash than ticker tape.

When he took office in 1966. Lindsay announced that he would discontinue the parades and conduct "more informal receptions," according to New York's Downtown Alliance. During his tenure, though, Lindsay presided over three ticker tape parades, all in 1969:

- Apollo 8 astronauts Frank Borman, William A. Anders and James A. Lovell, Jr., the first men to see the far side of the moon (Jan. 10)
- Apollo 11 astronauts Neil Armstrong, Buzz Aldrin and Michael Collins, landing successfully on the moon (Aug. 13)
- the New York Mets, winners of baseball's World Series (Oct. 20)

Before Fischer received his medal as a Cold War hero, another Cold War hero did receive a ticker tape parade in 1958: Van Cliburn, winner of Moscow's Tchaikovsky Piano Competition. He is "the Texan who conquered Russia," exclaimed the cover of Time Magazine. Cliburn is the only musician who ever received a ticker tape parade.

The ticker, invented by Edward Calahan in 1867 and improved by Thomas Edison, who patented it in 1871, transmitted stock price information by telegraph on a one-inch paper ribbon. After usage, stock market firms discarded the

tape, but saved some to toss from windows during Broadway parades.


The ticker and the tape became obsolete in the 1960s, replaced by TV and computers. Nevertheless, in the 1960s, New York parades continued without ticker tape, using confetti and other paper instead.

The first parade cele-1 brated the dedication of the Statue of Liberty in 1886. It was not a planned event, but an estimated one million people attended. "Wall Street workers spontaneously began throwing ticker tape out of their office windows to celebrate" and viewers walked to the Battery to see the unveiling of the statue in the harbor.

"French and American flags waved in the air, guns fired, cannons blasted, church bells rang and cheers echoed through the streets," as noted by the Downtown Alliance.

Attended by seven million people, the largest parade was in 1951, honoring Gen. Douglas MacArthur. In 137 years, New York hosted 206 ticker tape parades, most honoring heads of state, military leaders and soldiers, winning sport teams and athletes.

Yet the parade seems to be going out of fashion. New York



held only four since 2000, none since 2019. The parade apparently is becoming as obsolete as the ticker tape itself.

On the other hand, chess, with 605 million players worldwide, is in no danger of obsolescence.

In the game pictured on this page, White can win in two moves. Do you see it? The solution follows this reminder that the Chess Club meets on Monday, Wednesday and Friday from 1-4 p.m. in Clubhouse II.

SOLUTION: White moves the Knight to f4, checking the King. Black moves the King to g5. White moves the Rook from c6 to c5. Checkmate!

So, do not wait for ticker tape. Do not wait for confetti. Do not wait for financial information. Play chess now!




